

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS CONCLUDE SESSION

J. D. Wood, Idaho Commissioner of Public Works, Takes Secretarial Post

BALZ LAKE CITY, July 2 (AP)—All officers of the Western Association of State Highway Officials were re-elected at the conclusion of the fourth annual convention here today.

The officers are: Henry T. Wood, chairman of the executive committee, Wyoming state highway engineer, vice president, J. D. Wood, Idaho state commissioner of public works, secretary; Mr. Wood, Mr. Wood, L. H. Hicks of the Bureau of Public Roads, D. C. Watters, Montana, and W. C. Davidson, New Mexico, members of the executive committee.

The election followed adoption of seven resolutions drafted by a special committee headed by Mr. W. M. Warden. The resolutions in substance follow:

Expressing appreciation for congressional adoption of the Dorell bill, enabling a greater cooperative construction program than heretofore, and the Cotton-Oddie legislation which has supplied sufficient additional funds for improvement of necessary stretches of National forest highways.

Favoring authorization at the session of congress concerning the member of a sufficient amount to meet the needs of the public land states for the purpose of work in the basic highway act.

Want More Funds
Urging congressional appropriation of \$25,000,000 a year instead of \$5,000,000 for national parks highway work so these highways may meet the present traffic requirements with a reasonable completion under present government standards of construction.

Recognizing the necessity of a more complete secondary transportation service within the national forests for the purpose of protection, development and community service. RAILWAY ASSOCIATION ACTS TO END MISHAPS

DENVER, July 2 (AP)—Formation of a corps of safety experts on every railroad, or packers engaging in stock exchange business, was outlined before the American Railway Association safety session, by Mr. Jeffers, vice president of the Union Pacific railroad.

PORTLAND'S "WILDCAT" ANSWERS TO COMPLAINT

Mount was one of several prominent Portland business men whom Duncan is alleged to have attacked over the radio.

BUILDING PROGRAM RECEIVES STIMULUS

Treasury Awards Contracts For \$32,480,000 For New Government Construction

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Speeding up President Hoover's program for expanding public building construction to relieve unemployment, the treasury has awarded contracts for \$32,480,000 of new government construction since January 1.

The announcement of the program of a building program at the treasury tonight in a statement which said in the last six months had been awarded a total of \$22,000,000 in new contracts. The treasury has had 2,300 others for repair, remodeling, equipment and miscellaneous projects for \$8,480,000. Fifty-six projects costing \$10,000,000 were under way last January, bringing the total of the government's building activities to \$72,480,000.

The expanded program contemplated that \$2,000,000 worth of government construction would be started during the present year as the government's contribution to relieve business depression and unemployment. At the present rate at which treasury plans to be completed within the year.

Governor Christianau and Governor H. C. Baldridge, Idaho, appealed in calling upon their fellow executives to stand out strongly in resisting the law.

The house received the senate measure shortly after noon, and considered it under a parliamentary rule to disagree to all the amendments. It was sent to conference on a viva voce vote after a test vote of 194 to 116 was recorded.

In urging the house to disagree to the senate amendments, Chairman Johnson of the house veterans' committee, said if the senate amendments increasing the cost to the government by several million dollars annually, were accepted by the house, the measure undoubtedly would be disapproved by the president.

He contended responsibility for failure of enactment of a veterans' bill would devolve on those who would force the house to accept the senate amendments.

On the other hand, Representative O'Connor, Democrat, New York, charged President Hoover vetoed the house bill, and had informed the house Republicans it was the only one he would resist. He declared it was dangerous for a chief executive to dictate to congress what kind of legislation he desired.

Reviewing the house action in sustaining the veto of the Johnson bill—the New-Yorker—said Representative Tilson, Connecticut, the Republican leader, "took the floor and asked the house to vote against his better judgment because the president had threatened to veto it."

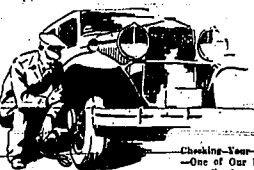

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"SAFE AND SANE"
One might very well wish that the typical effluvia over-spread of the "safe and sane" Fourth of July movement were as accurate as they are enthusiastic.

Persistence of dangers is not a cause for abandoning the struggle to overcome them; but there is room for very serious question whether we have gone about in the most effective way to bring about a "safe and sane" Fourth of July celebration.

The manner of celebration in Twin Falls now is not much different than it was say many years ago, before there were any prohibitory regulations, and before even very much was claimed for the "safe and sane" celebration movement.

We have adopted a regulation, which, within limitations, prohibits sale and use of fireworks in Twin Falls.

But it does not prevent a lively traffic in fireworks outside the municipal limits, and all the agencies of the law are ineffective to prevent use within the city of explosives that are sold indiscriminately just outside its borders.

The regulation does at least withhold encouragement to children to hold their eyes out and set houses afire, and it does impose a paper prohibition against children acquiring and using equipment to play gunmen and handie.

But it is quite questionable whether the existence of such an unenforceable prohibition is not worse in its effect than the situation it was designed to remedy.

It reduces traffic in fireworks to the level of bootlegging, and a whole juvenile population deals with forbidden things, knowing them to be forbidden.

In passing the prohibitory measure we have perhaps taken the easiest way to cope with a problem that is admittedly a serious one. But we have not touched the desire to use fireworks, nor, apparently, have we been able to do much about enforcement of the prohibition.

One may wonder whether an intelligent campaign of education might not bring more satisfactory results.

THE STATE WE LIVE IN

ERA OF PLACER MINING
The tales of the mining camps at Pierce, Elk City and Florence, have been written many times, and in as many ways. Less is recorded of Warren, although its story has points of interest, including the production of not less than \$100,000,000.

Warrens was discovered in 1852; its little party was made up of men from Florence, but the later miners at Warren were mostly California and different type than the earlier prospectors. The California men as a class were more orderly, industrious and thrifty.

Warrens lay 27 miles south of Florence, across the big canyon of the Salmon. The diggings were so rich as at Florence, but the area here was greater and it had a far longer life.

It soon became apparent that Warren, while perhaps not less certain, was not so sudden an affair at Warren; it was not a prospector's paradise.

It took more to get gold at Warren, and without gold a man could dig a hole three miles long. Warren kept the leading boom and was carrying \$3 per meal.

The population at Warren went to 12,000, then declined by 1870 to 5,000. At its height of the canyon, Chinamen finally got possession of the shrimmed diggings, but Warren was not mining activity to this day.

At Elk City in 1851 one Moses Spilwin picked up an Indian hint of placer gold to be found farther south, and in the following summer he and George Grimes found the gold vein. The first strike was at "Hogem," later known as "Pioneer."

Grimes was killed by Indians immediately succeeding the discovery, with his last breath imploring Spilwin not to let them scalp him. "Old Chief" Montezuma was a friend of 1852. The last extensive dig of placer in Idaho was the Lone Creek field in the Salmon mountains in 1890.

The legends of placer gold in Idaho would furnish material for a library. During the ten years succeeding Barnum's discovery at Pierce, Idaho was a placer-mining state. As such, it was a world of itself, with a unique population. Not bad people by any means, the men with pick and pan. Grimes was not under the present. But a different people they were. Restless, reckless, fearless, visionary. Many among them did very little actual mining. They were obsessed, not so much by the love of gold, as by love of the search for gold. Does the reader easily see the difference? There is certainly such a distinction.

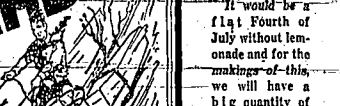

Americans Clinch Men's and Women's Singles Championship

Four Stars From States Place in Wimbledon Frays

"Big Bill" Tilden, Wilmer Allison, Mrs. Helen Wills Moody and Elizabeth Ryan Complete in Final Round

WIMBLEDON, England, July 2—American today made sure of winning the British tennis championships in both men's and women's singles by placing "Big Bill" Tilden, Wilmer Allison, Mrs. Helen Wills Moody and Elizabeth Ryan in the final round.

Thus the final for Wimbledon's two most coveted crowns—on Saturday will be all American affairs. No foreign nation ever before has been able to monopolize both singles titles in the history of this tournament, which goes back to 1877.

For the last six years the famous "Mackays" of France won the Wimbledon crown in the men's division and five of their six times two Frenchmen battled for the honors in the final. But today the American champion Tilden, the oldest of his old rival, Jean Borotra, by scores of 6-4, 6-4, 6-0, 7-5, completely clinched the title, and the French stars began on Monday when his young countryman, Wilmer Allison, upset the defending titleholder, Henri Cochet.

Allison Stops Dogg Allison himself qualified to meet Tilden in the final by stopping his team Davis cup team mate, Truman John Dogg, Santa Monica, California, 6-3, 4-6, 8-6, 7-5, in another thrilling semi-final this afternoon.

The day's sensational developments included the collapse of plucky little Cecilie Aussem, Germany, who suffered a badly sprained ankle in the third set of her match with Ryan and was forced to withdraw, the American winning by default after having taken the first set, 6-3, losing the second, 4-6, and fighting on even terms 41-41 in the third.

Mrs. Moody, the defending champion, became the only woman to win Wimbledon here since Madeline Hense Mathieu, France, 6-3, 6-2. She is heavily favored to defend her title, although a veteran, 33, who has lived in this country so long that she is regarded almost as an English player.
