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NAVAL LIMITATION PACT'S OPPONENTS DEMAND REJECTION

Senator Johnson Brands London Treaty 'Iniquitous And Inequitable,' and Borah Prepares to Fight

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Opponents of the London naval treaty made the first move today by preparing to next week's special session to consider the pact, Senator Johnson, Republican, California, urging its rejection in a formal statement on the ground that it was "iniquitous and inequitable." The fiery Californian, who will lead the opposition to ratification, asserted the treaty was the "first step under the guise of a fictitious limitation of armaments, and in the hope of a peace, to take the United States into the international adventures which our people abhor."

With Walter Newton, his secretary for political affairs, Senator McNary, Oregon, the assistant majority leader, and Senator Eess, Ohio, an administration stalwart, the chief executive today conferred at intervals upon the subject of the treaty. Hoover was expected to go to the Hoover camp over the week-end to discuss the treaty and other matters.

There is the two-story, five-room house which resembles hundreds of other farm houses in the plains country. The barn through which she romped still are there, and the meadows are as green as ever.

"DINKY" ENGINE AT BOISE APPEALS TO INSPECTOR'S HUMOR

BOISE, July 5 (P)—The Boise valley engine which once chugged ahead of a line of cars up and down through Boise, Caldwell, Nampa and points here and there has been officially inspected and perhaps found wanting.

Although J. B. Brown, engine inspector for the interstate commerce commission, refused to comment himself on the powers of the little "dinky," he said it was a "most comical looking thing I ever saw."

The little engine, belonging to the Boise and Western Railroad which runs for a few miles along each side of the Boise river from this city, spends most of its time resting on a length of rail beside the Boise-Nampa highway.

It was there that it attracted Brown's attention while he was inspecting engines of bigger fry in the railroad business. It has a comparatively small boiler but tender and smoke-stack that would do justice to a transcontinental limited. 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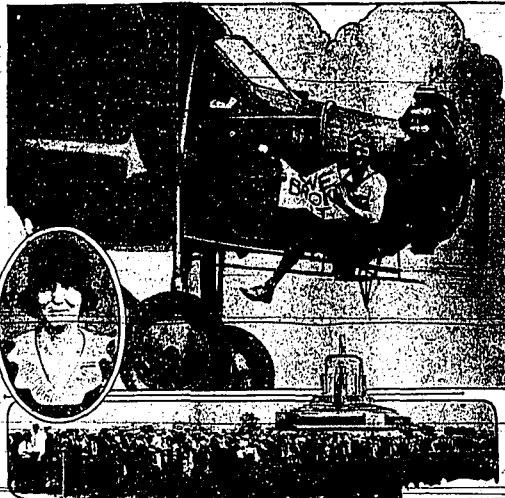
