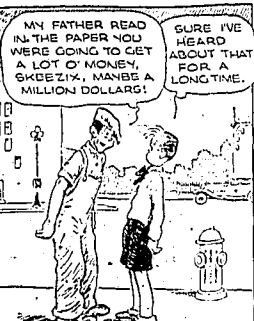
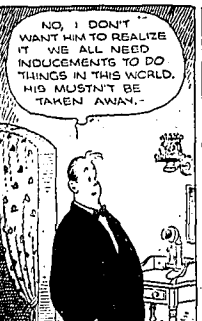

Black Rust Menace in United States and France Tends to Influence Grain Values

HUGHAN (Associated Press Market Editor), CHICAGO, July 8.—Black rust, menacing United States wheat and curtailing wheat yields in France did a good deal to bring about higher prices here today for wheat. The price in wheat values, however, was attended by a new smearing of low price records cutting down materially the ice a market different than that until today has separated recent boom 17 years ago. Brazil's stock exchange quotations were largely blamed for today's fresh downward swing of wheat prices, but enlarged export buying of wheat was afterward a factor in turning the wheat market upward.

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Financial markets were in two frames of mind today. Generally speaking, prices of stocks and commodities declined in the morning and rallied in the afternoon as professional traders sought to bring the volume to the buying side. Net gains in equity shares were small, but some of the early losers had been absorbed, so that the market gave a reasonably good demonstration of its resiliency. Trading was again extremely heavy.

NEW YORK BULL MARKET

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Bull market was easier today than yesterday. The weekly figures on steel operations meant little because of the holiday interruption. With many plants closed over the week-end, the ratio for the industry dropped to 48 per cent of rated capacity against 52 per cent in the previous week. United States Steel, slumped to 55 per cent compared with 62. It was said to trade circles, however, that there had been a moderate pickup in activity as plants which had been closed resumed operations.

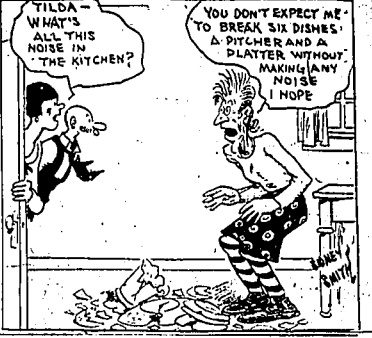
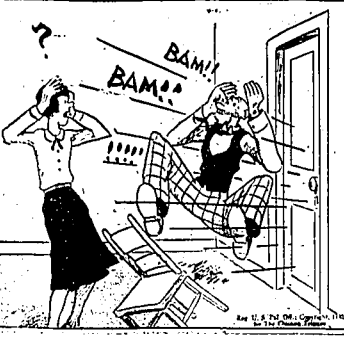
