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# SEARCHING FOR STORY OF PLANE TRAGEDY OFF DANISH COAST

American Doctor, Youthful Woman Helper and Three Others Die When Storm Forces Down Flying Boat

(By The Associated Press) MELBURN, July 9—The sea today gave up new tidings of the fate of a Danish doctor, his youthful woman assistant and three others of the ill-fated Luftschiff, flying boat, lost yesterday off Bornholm, coast of Denmark.

Details of the tragedy, in which Dr. John Burkholder, of Miss Ruth Patricia Northrup, 25, Philadelphia, perished, revealed a disaster which took place at the very moment of the boat's departure in commercial aviation.

After hours of uncertainty and conflicting reports, the Berlin headquarters of the airline today preceded the story together from radio and other messages from torpedo boats and the rescue ship, the Danish steamer, which picked up the plane wreckage and two passengers of the German flying boat, forcing down in a storm yesterday.

Their death hour of Europe cut short by summer in the stormy Baltic, the means of escape were blocked by the turbulent waves. No hope was held out today by Luftschiff that the Swedish steamer, which rescued two passengers would be found alive.

Vessel Sinks in Sea For the first flying boat since the sea for about three hours after losing contact with the shore, the flying boat crumpling her wings and sank to the bottom. Three of those on board were rescued by the Danish patrol boats maintained a vigil at the vicinity of the wreck.

The possibility that some members of the party might be clinging to wreckage was discounted. The plane carried provisions for a party which are supposed to remain buoyant only a few hours. It would be a sheer miracle, the company was said, should it have been seen.

Woman Alone Saved Dr. Burkholder and the slim, blonde, Northrup, who was the physician, who it was reported had been traveling and studying together in Stockholm to London, Paris and home to America. Available reports on the final moments of Dr. Burkholder's wife, the rescued Danish lady, had been dismissed when the craft capsized. Miss Northrup, however, was rescued by the Danish patrol boats at the moment of rescue.

The captain of the Dutch motor schooner said a crewman and a lifeboat reached her with a boat hook and grappled the wreckage of the flying boat. She tried to pull her aboard, but the grapple broke and she has the sailor save when she was swept away on the crest of a tremendous wave.

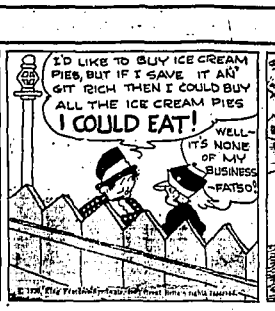

# DEATH CALLS TO PIONEER BUILDER

Alvin B. Roberts, One of Twin Falls' First Citizens, Dies at Wendell

ALVIN B. ROBERTS, the pioneer of southern Idaho for more than 50 years and a pioneer Twin Falls building contractor, died shortly after midnight Tuesday night at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Denton, Wendell, following an illness of several months. He is survived by four sons and two daughters.

Mr. Roberts was one of Twin Falls' first citizens, having lived here since 1894 when the first buildings were erected on the townsite. Among other structures here he built the Perrine hotel out of concrete blocks on the building site 28 years ago.

Prior to that period he engaged for a time in the livestock business, living at different times in a number of southern Idaho towns, and running cattle on what is now the Twin Falls country.

He was born in Portland, Oregon, June 24, 1859, son of Alvin B. and Martin Baxter Roberts. With his parents he lived in Walla Walla until he was 13 years old, when they moved to Baker, Oregon, and thence in November, 1875 to Boise. He is married to Rosa Thomas, formerly of Idaho, in 1884 in mobile quarters with his father.

BUHL, July 9 (Special to The News)—With life extinct, the body of J. A. Palmer, prominent sheep man of the West End, was found this afternoon by his wife, Mrs. Palmer. Mr. Palmer, who lived with his wife and children in the Snake river canyon near Clark Lake, had been about 50 years of age. He had lived in the West End about five years.

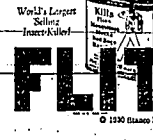

# Major League Club Owners Enforce "Universal Draft" Rule

### Ruling Involves Player Relation With Five Clubs

Decision Includes Expression of Determination to Invoke Modified Draft Carrying Heavy Penalties

(By The Associated Press)

CHICAGO, July 9.—Major league club owners today declared for an absolute break of player relations after December 1, 1930, with five "non-draft" clubs in or leaving the association or the international league, class A leagues, or the Three-Ex and Western leagues, the fate of lower ranking clubs.

The resolution not only demanded the minor leagues involved, which have been subject since 1925 to a modified draft, agree to the universal election system, but that a schedule of higher draft prices be instituted. There was only one dissenting vote on the resolution in spite of the fact that several minor league clubs entered in the minor leagues involved as "farm" clubs.

San Francisco, president of the St. Louis National League club which owns or controls the Rochester club of the international league and the Danville club of the Three-Ex league favored the resolution as did President William L. Veeck of the Chicago Cubs, which has the same relationship with Los Angeles of the coast league. The heading of the International League.

Dissever Not Revealed

The name of the only dissenter favored further attempts to negotiate with the minor leagues. If the minor leagues fail to accept the universal draft the only relations possible with the major leagues is to continue to draft those players who already have been sent to non-draft leagues under the modified arrangement under which they have operated since 1925.

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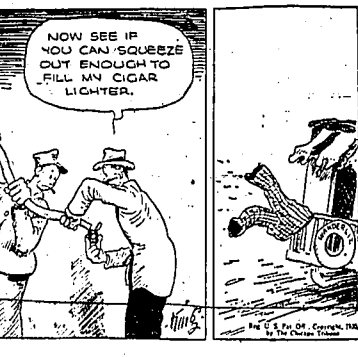

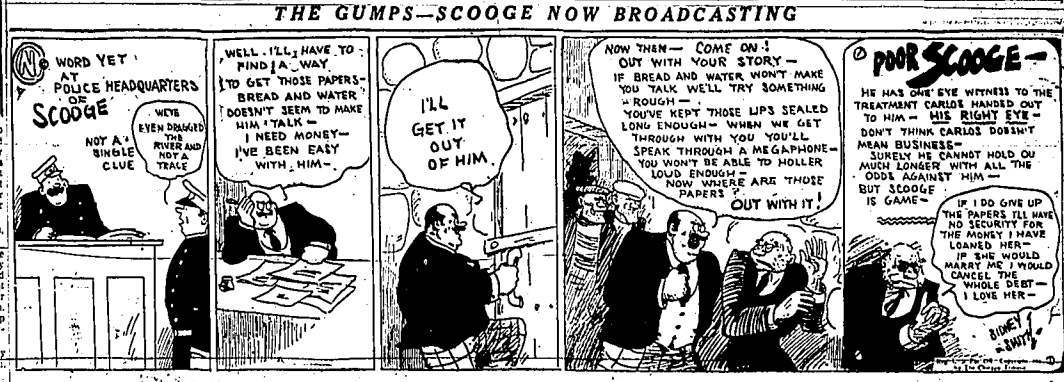

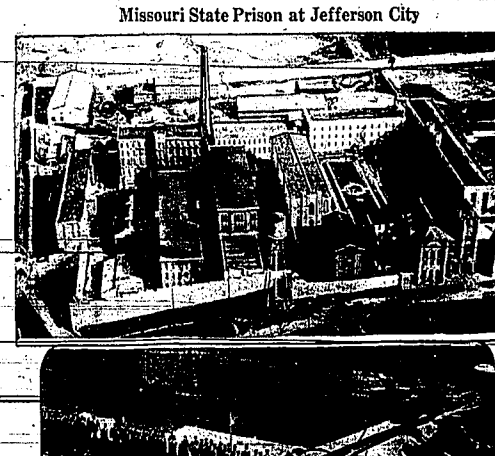
