



# Federal Spokesmen and Kansas Governor Debate Farm Aid

## BOARD'S GOSPEL OF SLASH IN INCREASE GETS EXPLANATION

**Chairman Legge, Head of Board, Answers Challenge of State Executive For Action to Lift Prices**

(By The Associated Press) **ODGE CITY, Kans., July 10**—The federal farm board's gospel of wheat acreage reduction today was formally presented to Southwest Kansas for discussion. "Invading the heart of this hard winter wheat area, the federal spokesmen, Secretary Arthur M. Hyde of the department of agriculture, and Alexander Legge, chairman of the farm board, and an opponent of wheat acreage reduction, Governor Clyde M. Reed, Kansas, traversed a route made yesterday in a year's time, according to the report of the government overseer here. Minimum temperature for the same period was 100 degrees of an inch.

Secretary Hyde, in the opening speaker, said hot weather was the proper time to "evangelize." Advocating the voluntary curbing of wheat acreage from what production, however, he assured his hearers that the government would "compel the Kansas farmer to do what he doesn't want to do." Chairman Legge, answering a challenge by the Kansas governor that the board will increase the level of wheat price, said the board would spend \$1,000,000 a month to carry over 50,000,000 bushels of last year's surplus crop and that the board would not buy any more of the grain. Mr. Legge urged wheat farmers to "sit tight," expressing the opinion that they would do so the market would improve 25 cents a bushel.

**Points to Change**  
Secretary Hyde pointed out the industrialization of agriculture had resulted in many new farm problems and urged the farmer to plan for profitable production. "The opinion of wheat reduction is not a subject which will find solution in economics, not politics," he said. "We American agriculturists adopt a system which will make a profit for the producer."

**Renewing his attack on farm production, Governor Reed said that the board seem to have increased the power with which it is empowered to solve the deplorable farm problem.**

**No characterized as "unsound and unnecessary" the proposals for wheat acreage reduction in production, which, he said, would result in its depopulation.**

The governor asserted that "never before this week had been suggested that it was to eliminate a surplus was to limit production."

Adding, "If there hadn't been a surplus there wouldn't have been any need to limit the farm board," he said, "should be permitted to have their share of foreign trade." Governor Reed called upon the board "to do it."

**Accusing Governor Reed of having a political motive in opposing the reduction of wheat acreage, the man Legge said: "When you want people to vote for you, you tell them what they want to hear."**

### WASHINGTON BLAZE SLOWLY CONSUMES OLD PAPER MONEY

Funeral Pyre of Large-Sized Bills Burns Day and Night on Dump Grounds of 'Capital of Country'

(By The Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, July 10.—A steady blaze from the capital's city dump grounds, day and night, marks the passing of billions of dollars.  
For months a funeral pyre of the wrecked bills of the old currency has been blazing. It is estimated that eight of the old paper money now "has literally" "piled up in smoke."

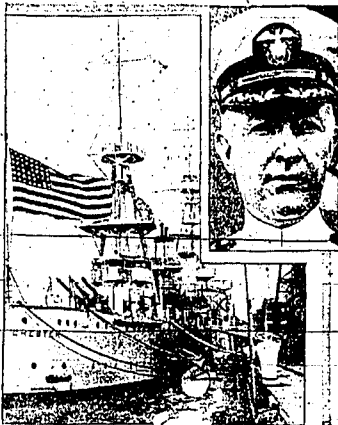
Seven or eight tons of it have been destroyed daily. The prediction of treasury officials, the old bills, in less than a year from the time they became "doomed dollars" last July, now are almost certainties.

"Funeral Pyre"  
The one-time purchaser paper for the luxuries and necessities of the era quite a funeral funeral before it passes into nothingness, however.

As an old fire or twenty-year, battered and worn from years of journeying, comes limping into port, it is received at the treasury department and put into trucks which are carefully sorted.  
No one except treasury officials knows how many trucks there are. The bills are taken back to their old home, the place where they were born, for the funeral services.

Back to Birthplace  
Their birthplace was the bureau of printing and engraving—here they are placed in a big macerator. The machine makes short work of the green and yellow backs.  
Regardless of their history their end is the same—a shapely mass of dirty white pulp. Mystery, romance, and tragedy lingers in those mysterious reeled trucks.  
The big macerator works day and night grinding up currency. Old money always is coming into the government treasury and being disposed of in this way. Launching the

### ALUMINUM DISH PROVES HARMLESS FOR VITAMIN

PITTSBURGH, July 10.—Mellon Institute of Industrial Research announces that aluminum cooking utensils without harm from the dish to vitamin C.

In the same experiment the institute found that winter milk from cows fed from silos is virtually as strong in vitamin C as the best summer milk from cows on pasture.

With the election of E. F. Creelmore, vice president and general manager, to membership in the New Orleans cotton exchange, the cooperative body now takes the position as a trader on the floor of the exchange, and will become one of the largest operators.  
Creelmore's first act was to receive and sell the first bale of the 1930 crop. Over 20,000 feet of floor space will be required by the association for its offices.

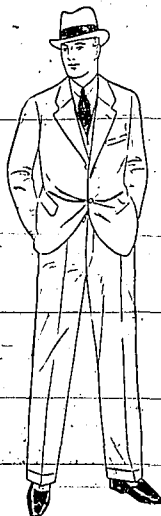

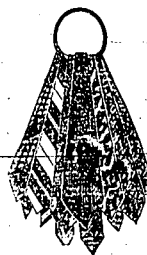

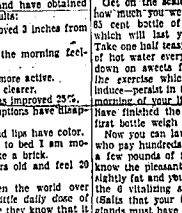

# Device Promises to Warn Ships Nearing Unseen Icebergs

## MICROPHONE TO BE USED UNDER WATER GETS FIRST TRIALS

Scientist Claims "Ice Ear" Registers Presence of Menace to Boats Miles Away

## MYSTERY SHROUDS NEW SENSITIVE INSTRUMENT

Dr. Howard Barnes, Professor of Physics, Brings Valuable Means of Protection

MONTREAL, July 10.—A one-man scientific expedition will explore the iceberg lanes this summer with a new "ear" which promises to warn ships intelligibly of large miles away in fog, storm or darkness. This "ice ear" was discovered last summer and hushed up by the scientist who made it. With the ear he heard distinctly brass six miles away.

It never failed, but its very perfection explained the mystery. It seemed too good to be true.

So the discoverer is returning this summer to hunt for certain special brags that will show whether the ear is really perfect.

## EARTHQUAKES SEEM TO GIVE RISE TO LIGHTNING

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Scores of thunder and lightning accompanying earthquakes are not simple coincidences, the explanation may lie in a report to the American Geophysical society by Dr. Ross Gunn.

He holds that contraction of the earth's crust gives rise to disturbing magnetic fields, and that "long period" variations of the earth's magnetic field and pseudo-magnetic variations accompanying earthquakes may be related in some manner to the disturbing regions inside the earth.

Dr. Gunn says that the usual earthquake is limited to the earth's crust but that if the earth movement extends into deeper layers a local magnetic disturbance may be expected.

## MAGNESIUM SEEMS AID TO CANCER PREVENTION

PARIS, July 10 (AP)—The use of magnesium in the soil of a crop may have something to do with preventing cancer in persons who live there.

That is the conclusion which may be drawn from a paper by a French scientist, Henri Fischer, which is being shown that cancer is more prevalent in parts of the country where magnesium is lacking from the soil. The paper was read before the French Academy of Medicine by Professor Pierre Debat.

Professor Debat's studies have led him to believe that many ailments of an intestinal and nervous character are attributable to a deficiency of magnesium.

## TOBACCO FOR WRAPPING CIGARS GROWS IN SHADE

BAINBRIDGE, Wis., July 10 (AP)—Tobacco used for wrapping most of the cigars smoked in the United States grows under shade, and practically all the shaded fields are within a radius of 30 miles of Bainbridge.

STUTTGART, Ark., July 10 (AP)—A new, distinctly genetic type of rice is under cultivation in the Arkansas lowlands.

WOLFE W. BABSON, Bay State statistician, declared today that the present depression affords an opportunity for business men and laborers alike to build up a reserve and develop plans for the future.

"When an individual or a corporation borrows money at the bank there is no question as to whether he will have to pay it back, and there is no question as to how much he will have to pay," Babson said.

"However, when a business man borrows money from the bank, he is not only borrowing money but also borrowing the future. He is borrowing the future in the form of business depression, and he is borrowing the future in the form of business depression."

The first cutting of alfalfa is mostly in the stack, secured in excellent condition, and in some sections harvesting of the second crop has begun. The growth of corn has been fostered by the hot weather and there is much improvement in the appearance of this crop. Ranges feed is abundant which fact is reflected in excellent condition of range stock.

**NORTH IDAHO**—The weather was moderate and threatening during the first half of the week, but it cleared and the temperature rose during the latter half. The various farm and orchard activities went forward normally and without interruption. The cherry harvest, which has gone forward under favorable weather conditions, is in the most advanced stage of the last stages. Wheat harvest has begun in the Lewiston-Clarkston territory and will probably continue into the next few days. Potatoes are still good, but they are beginning to show signs of rot. ## ENGLISH FIND DAILY USE OF TELEVISION TO BE SUCCESSFUL

Reports From Berlin, 900 Miles Away, Tell of Reception of Signals Each Day With Good Results

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 10.—Televisions in England now in on a regular program both, according to word brought back to America by Captain O. G. Hutchinson.

Not only has daily service been established on the broadcast wavelengths, but reports from Berlin, 900 miles away, tell of reception of signals with good results.

(By The Associated Press) LOUCESTER, Va., July 10.—The famed Chesapeake Bay oyster grounds of Virginia, among the richest in the world, are threatened by a strange mildy sweeping the beds of coastal rivers and bays.

Whether the oysters are being attacked by an unknown disease, or by pollution caused by silt which is carried to the oyster beds from the United States fleet against hostile submarines during the World War is not known, but both theories are being investigated by state and federal biologists.

Governor John Garland Pollard, who has made oyster conservation the principal points in his administration, regarded the situation as serious enough to make a personal inspection of the affected area.

Enlists Biologists The governor was accompanied by some of the best known biologists in the country who are now studying specimens taken from the oyster bottoms in an effort to determine the nature of the disease.

Most of the damage appears to have occurred in leased planting grounds, and one large planter has reported that his losses alone will amount to more than \$200,000.

The disease attacks both oyster and shell, the flesh turning black and the shell becoming brittle and decaying. Governor Pollard says it is the first time in the history of the oyster industry in Virginia that thousands of bays in vast areas have been threatened by a disease.

Estimated losses of planters already reach beyond the \$1,000,000 mark.

Chesapeake Bay oysters are sold in the United States east of the Mississippi, and the grounds are among the most valuable natural resources of the Old Dominion.

McCauley, and his wife, William Baker, Burl, died at 10:24 P. M. Wednesday evening at a Twin Falls hospital following an operation performed last Friday for ruptured appendix. Peritonitis was the cause of death.

The deceased came to Burl about two weeks ago, visiting Yellowstone park en route, and had planned to leave for the East on the day of his death.

Dr. Lewis was with a fishing party

at Salmon reservoir when stricken and was rushed at once to Twin Falls. He is survived by his widow, one daughter Maxine, 17, and by a son, Roger, who is attending school in Denver.

The body, which lies at the Rugs undertaking establishment, will leave Burl Friday morning for Colby, Kansas, for interment, accompanied by the widow and daughter. The son will join the family at Denver.

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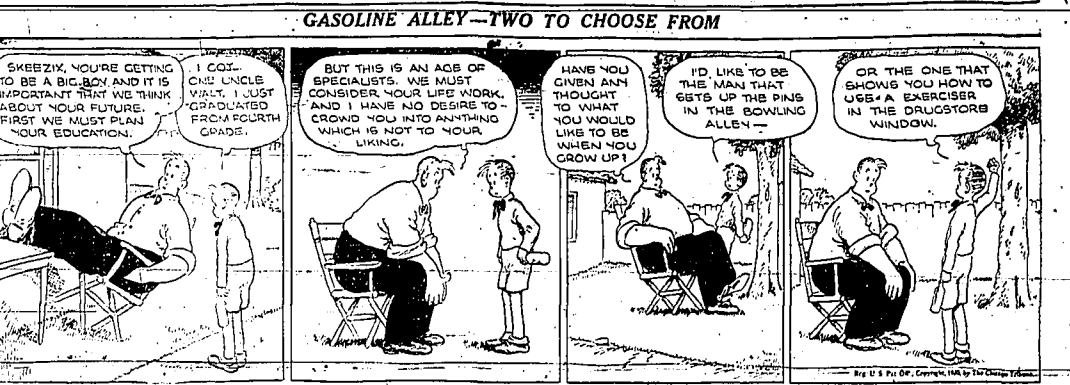

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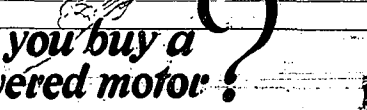
