# Missourian Plans to Establish 20 Farms to Aid Unemployed

## INDUSTRIALIST ANIMS TO FIND METHOD OF ASSISTING LABORER

Theodore Gary Believes Solution of Problem Lies in Return of Life of Agriculture

TENANTS TO WORK FOR SELVES HALF OF TIME

Owner of Large Estate Believes 400 Acres Will Support Two Score of Persons

Macon, Mo., July 12—Back-to-the-farm is the way to solve unemployment and bring agricultural relief, believes Theodore Gary, Missouri industrialist.  
To prove his point, Gary plans an experiment to give 20 couples an opportunity to work for themselves and eventually to own their own farms and homes.  
Gary is acquiring 20 farms of 20 acres each near Macon, Mo. From will have a comfortably furnished house, a cow, pigs and chickens, and tools and machinery will be supplied.  
It won't be necessary for the couples who take up life on the farm to have credit tenants to supply a small rental or part of what they make and as they progress will eventually own their own farms from the payments.  
Few Acres Enough  
Gary's idea is that a few acres will provide sustenance for a family, facilities for livestock and ground to raise fruits and vegetables, and that the remainder may be devoted to crops that will produce money for rent and such things as the family will need in the way of clothing, food and household conveniences.  
Half the time the men tenants will devote to the land and the other half they will work at various occupations on Gary's "Okkibi" estate at 40 cents an hour. The plans call for all-time work both winter and summer.  
To Encourage Individuals  
An agricultural adviser and a home economist adviser will be employed but individual effort will be encouraged.  
The project will employ a man, Gary, and it takes hold in the right way in a comfortable living.  
"With the doors of employment closed against so many, the hand holds out a friendly hand offering food, my helpers—and I intend—put in our best efforts toward making this, in a small way, a solution of the unemployment problem."  
"We hope to demonstrate its success so it will be used in many other places."

# Earl Sande Rides Gallant Fox To Victory

### 1930 Super-Pony Furnishes Thrill For 60,000 Fans

American Falls Master Rider Sends Mount Across Goal One-Fifth Second Below Record for Track

By CHARLES W. DUNNLEY (Associated Press Sports Writer) CHICAGO, July 12—Gallant Fox, 1930 super-pony of the American turf, gave his every inch of himself today to win the \$70,000 Arlington classic today.

Before a swelling crowd of possibly 60,000, the dominant son of the French stallion Sir Gallahad III—three-year-old stake of the year by a neck in a desperate fight with Gallant Knight, Ned O was lifted six lengths back in the field of six. # Archeologist In Nevada Hunts For Bones Of Prehistoric Man

## FINDER OF GYPSUM CAVE SEEKS MORE RELICS IN CAVERN

### Dr. Mark Harrington Discovers Dry Shelf, Possibly Bed of Long Extinct Human Beings

#### MUSEUM WORKER PLANS TO CONTINUE EXPLORING

#### Excavators Find Many Evidences of Pleistocene Age, 20,000 Years Ago, in Hollow

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, July 12.—Dr. Mark Harrington, discoverer of Gypsum cave in Nevada and its 20,000-year-old relics of man in the Pleistocene age, hopes to find the old man's dry grass



found in the cave, and possibly his skeleton. A dry shelf, upon which the pre-historic man may have made his bed, has been located beneath the debris of 200 centuries in the Nevada cavern.

Dr. Harrington, archeologist of the Southern museum in Los Angeles, will continue his digging this autumn.

He described the outline of the dry shelf, which has been partly uncovered, as "very marked." Its level floor consisted of broken rock, the dust of ages and layers of debris left by long extinct groups of plants.

Wooden flints, long tubes of arrow cane drilled with sets of four or six holes, were among the finds made before the exploring party abandoned work for the summer.

About 800 artifacts identified here, were fashioned by occupants of Gypsum cave.

"The human evidence was found in every one of the five rooms of the cave and an overall view," Dr. Harrington declares, "has associated with the bones of the Pleistocene animals, the bones of the man with the Pleistocene man whose peculiar dent points were found two years ago in the cave at Polson, New Mexico."

"Here we have the weapons, tooth sticks and campfires, and with the bones of the pre-historic man, and two distinct types of pre-historic human, and of two Pleistocene animals."

Dr. Chester Stock, paleontologist of the University of California at Berkeley, has identified the bones of an entirely new species of camel.
