BOISE COURT FINDS AGAINST SETTLERS OF IRIGUI PROJECT

M. H. Wood, Manager of Little Lost River Enterprise, Wins Decisive Victories Involving Conduct

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, July 25 (AP)—M. H. Wood, manager of the Little Lost River project, today won two decisive victories in the supreme court in contests with certain settlers opposing his conduct of the project.

The supreme court affirmed in all respects the Boise county district court's decision in the case of Wood and others against Wood, the Blaine County Investment company and the Blaine County Canal company.

Case No. 11,000, further progress of litigation involving the project ever since its formation in 1910. Its course has been the center of contention between the settlers and the management which culminated several months ago in a suit brought by Wood against the Blaine County Investment company.

In the suit instigated by Hansen, demand was made for an accounting, for removal of Wood as director, and an injunction to prevent carrying of any other than treated water through the canal system on the project. On the matter of the accounting, the supreme court held that Wood had made proper reports of money collected and spent, and found no support for the settlers' contention that he had illegally collected an excessive fee for operating and maintenance expenses.

Rather than Wood's \$72 company, Owsa, \$502 company \$16,000 as claimed by the shareholders, the supreme court held that the Blaine County Investment company had advanced when it was wronged by contractor operations.

On the matter of the accounting, the supreme court held that Wood had made proper reports of money collected and spent, and found no support for the settlers' contention that he had illegally collected an excessive fee for operating and maintenance expenses.

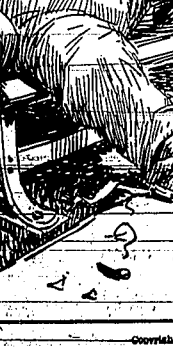

Senator Thomas B. Love, One of 11 Candidates For Governorship, Places Hope in Anti-Smith Work

(By The Associated Press) DALLAS, Texas, July 25.—Texas Democrats who left the party two years ago to vote for Herbert Hoover for president, tomorrow will have a chance to return to the fold and elect the boss that gave the state a Republican governor.

Senator Thomas B. Love, Dallas, one of the 11 candidates for the party's nomination for governor, pitched his campaign for favor in connection with the anti-Smith fight. He designated himself the "anti-Tamm" candidate in Texas.

Love's first primary opponent, Mrs. Minnie A. Ferguson, retreated from a second bid to these months and is attempting a comeback.

It was believed possibly \$50,000 funds would participate in the republican and democratic primaries, when nominees for state offices were to be selected for the November election.

Jim Young, Kaufman, former congressman, leader of the regular faction in the party, was the Hoover supporter.

Love had his name on the ballots by virtue of a supreme court decree ordering the state Democratic executive committee to put it there after it had ruled that persons who were not loyal to the party in the 1928 crisis could not become candidates for state office this year.

Although he had no opponent for renomination, United States Senator Morris Sheppard had not made an active campaign for re-election to Texas a few days ago, after adjournment of the senate.

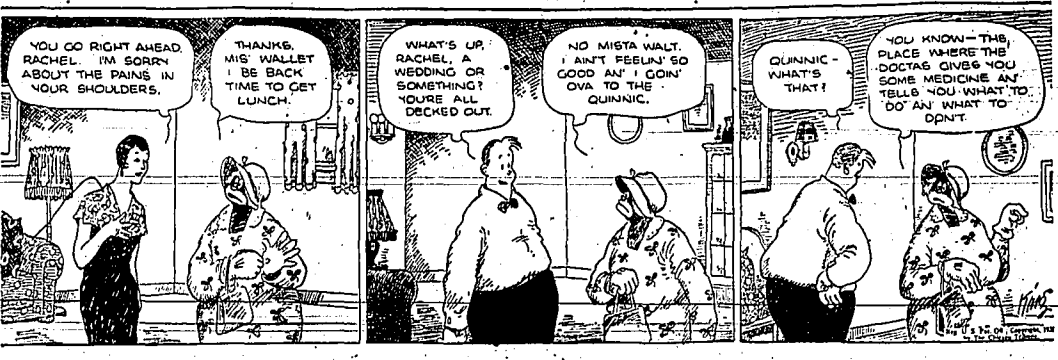
