

NARCOTICS DIVISION AGENTS SMASH RING OF DRUGSMUGGLERS

Officers of Newly Organized Department Descend on Criminals in Three Cities and Make Arrests

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 29 - Descending on huge narcotic rings in three widely separated cities, agents of the newly reorganized narcotics division of the treasury made 20 arrests over the week-end...

At the same time raiders seized large quantities of morphine and heroin and believed they had broken up smuggling operations that brought millions of dollars worth of narcotics into this country each year from Mexico...

The outlandish smuggler, Anzilinger said, was Tony Lepino son of an Italian marquis who lived at his home on Long Island.

With Lepino, known as Black Tony, Fred Decco, son of a lieutenant colonel and his lieutenant also was captured and the agents seized quantities of drugs.

Of the importance of the arrests of two Italians in Norfolk, Virginia, one, "Big" Veracore, Anzilinger said, is that he is a prominent Italian organization and a political leader in his home town.

Shifting the scene of their activities to New York, J. A. Swinford, alias "A. K. King," known as "Red," was arrested in his office in the Woodworth building while preparing shipment of morphine to San Francisco, L. J. Williams, who lived on Long Island, also was arrested in New York.

All the narcotic smugglers were arraigned before United States commissioner and held under heavy bond for trial on charges of violating the narcotic laws.

COOPER, Utah, July 29 (AP) - Lee Gehlach, Little Rock, Arkansas, led a three-hour lead over Lowell Bayless, Cleveland, in the Detroit-Los Angeles all-American air derby tonight when nine of the 11 contestants had arrived at the Ogden airport. Gehlach's total elapsed time was 31:18:17, compared with Bayless' total of 34:31:41. The two leaders were second and third, respectively, on tonight's control point.

WESTERN-PACIFIC LINE AWARDS BIG CONTRACT

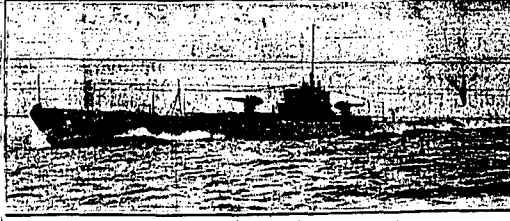

HOOVER ACTS IN ROOSEVELT CASE

Nicholas Roosevelt Receives Access Appointment as Vice Governor of Islands

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP) - Nicholas Roosevelt, New York, today was given a recess appointment as vice governor of the Philippine Islands in the face of opposition from proponents of Philippine independence.

In announcing the appointment after the senate had failed to confirm Mr. Roosevelt at the special session, the president expressed his conviction that the "minimum standard" which has arisen on the islands as to the appointee's attitude would be quickly cleared up.

He asserted Mr. Roosevelt has been staunch in his support of the interests of the Philippine people, sympathetic with them, and enthusiastic over their progress.

The New York man is a second cousin of Governor Theodore Roosevelt of Porto Rico.

After his nomination was sent to the senate, leaders in the Philippine movement attacked his views and urged his rejection. Pedro Quevora, the resident commissioner in Washington, the president of the Philippine senate and the speaker of the Philippine house, was a member of the committee which reported before congress at the last session to give independence, submitted their opposition.

The senate then declined to act upon the nomination until hearings had been held at the next session of congress.

70,000 TURKS BACK DEMANDS OF PERSIA

ISTANBUL, Turkey, July 29 (AP) - At least 70,000 Turkish soldiers ranked along the Turco-Persian and Turco-Irak frontiers, the Turkish government today meant serious business with a note to Persia complaining against Kurdish incursions into Turkish territory.

Well-informed circles say the note, prepared at Ankara, touches on the necessity of Persia's ceasing to Turkey the Ayshah district. This lies between the Turco-Persian and Russo-Persian frontiers, where Stojni Anzari descends into Persian territory, and by it the Kurdish rebels are enabled to escape from the besieging Turks.

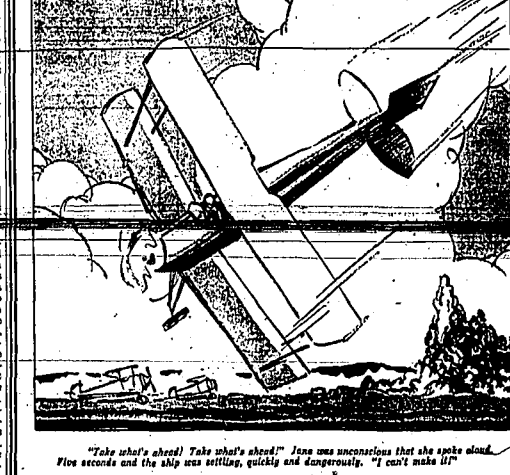

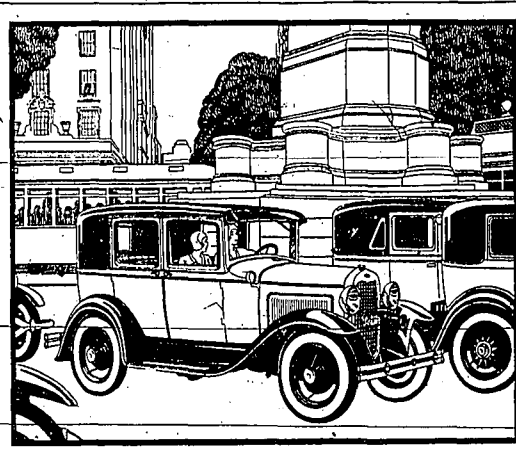

The president of the United States and congress are disappointed as to the results of the farm relief act, as the farmers and producers who have been the beneficiaries of the act are disappointed.

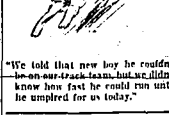
With the hope of improving conditions congress has enacted finally a bill which will protect the markets in this country against the foreign producer and manufacturer.

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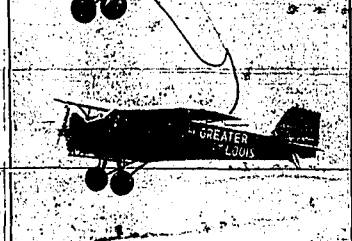
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St. Louis Endurance Plane
