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GERLBACH LEADS IN ALL-AMERICAN AIR RACE ACROSS LAND

Intrepid-Little-Rook Flier Holds Margin of Nearly Four Hours in Hop From Ogden to Port in Nebraska

(By The Associated Press)
LINCOLN, Neb., July 30.—Lee Gehlbach, intrepid Little Rock, Arkansas, pilot, retained his lead in the all-American air derby with a margin of nearly four hours on the hop from Ogden, Utah, to Port in Nebraska today, a distance of more than 900 miles.

Gehlbach's ship was officially recorded as having landed here at 3:47:25 P. M., after flying the next longest jump in the tour in 6 hours 45 minutes 25 seconds.

His total elapsed time for the flight Lee Gehlbach, who left Ogden, Utah, at 8 hours 14 minutes 25 seconds. Lee Gehlbach said, the flight had progressed smoothly, the engine being at 21. On this mileage base, Gehlbach had an average of about 140 miles per hour.

The Little Rock pilot was considerably perturbed upon his landing here, saying he had been delayed 10 minutes at the North Platte air field, while attendant tried to transport plane at the superintendent's insistence. This was his second other landing after leaving Chicago, Wyoming, this morning.

Well Baylis, Sioux Falls, S. D., S. D., pilot, second to land here and runner up for total elapsed time, made the hop in 10 hours 4 minutes 7 hours 42 minutes 6 seconds. He landed at 4:45:06 P. M. His total elapsed time was announced as 42 hours 28 minutes.

by foreign naval men was credited with the rescue of their countrymen. Arrested by Communist placards offering \$200 reward for the capture of each foreigner. Chinese official of Chinese employed by foreigners, the blue jackets snared through Changsha streets and arrested their countrymen for the city of a million excited natives. Reason was to have been demanded by the Communists for every foreigner captured.

The sudden fall of the Ssang river level, however, forced the foreign seafarers to a few miles down stream, leaving property of their nationalities to Communist destruction. Changsha was given the torch by the Communists and it was reported burned. Virtually all foreign property, including that of American oil companies and foreign oil companies, was destroyed. Of National government buildings, only the bank office and a hospital escaped the flames.

Looting of foreign buildings was premeditated and systematic. From the camp nearby 2000 "Reds" poured into the city, robbing, burning, and killing those who opposed them. Changsha was divided into 50 districts for pillaging. Directed by leaders, the desperadoes carried foreign loot amounting to millions of dollars. The Communists took no account of the city returned no answer to demands for \$20,000 gold.

LEGATION ACTS

MISSING NEW MEXICO MEN FIND SILVER CITY

SILVER CITY, N. M., July 30 (AP)—Six members of a state highway department leaving party who had been lost in the Black range for three days after a cloudburst wiped out their pack trail, made their way back to Silver City today.

The officials and employees were mapping a highway through the rugged mountains of the Black range when the cloudburst struck Monday morning. They scurried for cover in higher ground and the rain subsided were completely lost while attempting to retrace their trail. They were without food other than that found in the mountains, and without shelter for three days.

Another member of the party who was bringing supplies by auto to a point where the pack trail could be retraced, was caught in the mountain blizzard. His automobile and the supplies were swept away but he saved himself.

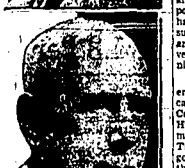
Buildings were shaken and the people, mindful of seismic disasters in other parts of the world in the last week, fled into the streets.

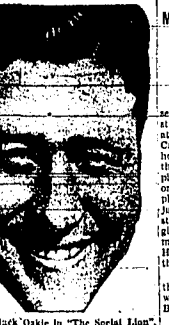
