BURLEY, Aug. 1.—Charles A. North and John W. Graham, Twin Falls attorneys, representing P. H. Whitaker and others of Declo as plaintiffs, filed suit in the district court at Burley Friday against H. C. Haddicke, as governor of Idaho; J. D. Wood, as the state commissioner of public works; William McMillan, J. H. Fowles and A. K. Kellogg, commissioners of the Burley highway district; Declo as defendant; and Burley and crossing the railroad right of way running from Burley to Declo as to the right of way of Burley and running parallel to the right of way and north of it, connecting with the Burley highway number 30 about two miles east of the village of Declo, which if completed would cause the highway connecting at a point about two miles east of Declo, and north of it, connecting through the village of Declo to be discontinued and abandoned as a state highway.

Twin Falls Attorneys File Suit at Burley Involving Governor and State and Road District Officials

(Special to The News) BURLEY, Aug. 1.—Charles A. North and John W. Graham, Twin Falls attorneys, representing J. H. Walker and other Decline plaintiffs, filed suit in the district court at Burley Friday against H. C. Baldrige, as governor of Idaho; J. D. Wood, as Idaho commissioner of public works; William H. H. Fowles and A. B. Kellogg, commissioners of the Burley highway district. The plaintiffs pray for restraining and injunctive relief from awarding or attempting to award any contract for the construction of a new highway through Burley and crossing the railroad right of way running from Burley to or near the city of Declo, and running parallel to the right of way and north of it, connecting with United States highway number 30 at the village of Declo, which if constructed would cause the present highway commencing at J. D. Wood about two miles east of Declo, and running south of the railroad and through the village of Declo to be discontinued and abandoned as a state highway.

Prayer Goes Further The prayer goes further and asks that the commissioners of the Burley highway district be enjoined and restrained permanently from purchasing or contracting for right of way for the proposed state highway or from paying out any money belonging to the Burley highway district for any such right of way or for other purpose connected therewith. Temporary injunction is sought restraining the officers named from performing any acts and obligating the state in connection with the proposed highway. The hearing can be had on the merits and the pendency of the action.

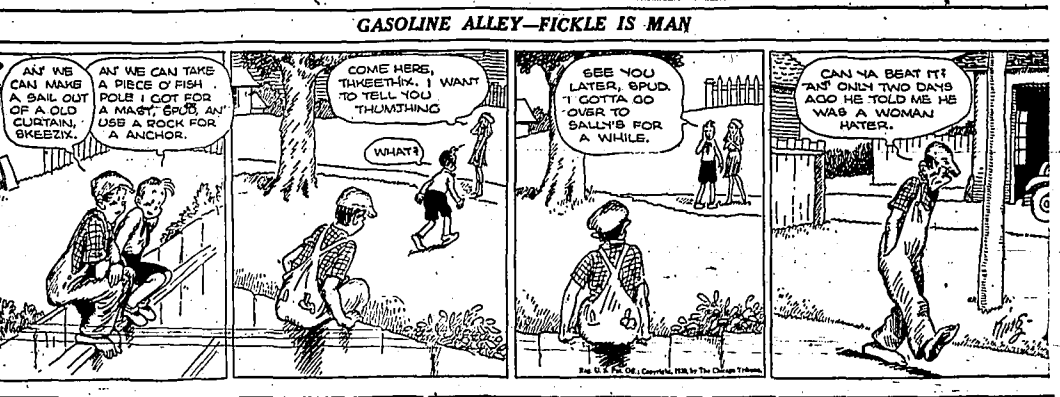

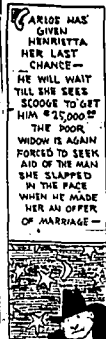

Widow and Children of Dead Man Sue for \$50,388; Injured Companion Wants \$20,644 from R. H. Wilson

J. J. Burkett, filer, shoemaker who was hurt about the back and sternum and claims to have been permanently crippled in the wreck, sued for \$20,000 damages, \$150 for medical attention and \$400 for loss of time at his business.

Both complaints are filed against Wilson, who the complainants claim to have been reckless and over the controls of the car when it got out of control and left the road, striking a pole and overturning.

Judge A. B. Barclay in district court here yesterday signed orders appointing the mother as guardian ad litem for the Fehrenbacher children.
