## PRESIDENT PONDS ON PLANS TO HELP BROODTH SUFFERERS

Possibility of "Production Credit" For Cotton and Livestock Men Looms Under Farm Marketing Act  
(By The Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Possibility of "production credit" for cotton and livestock through emergency interpretation of the agriculture marketing act drew the attention of investigators today as President Hoover and his cabinet surveyed relief measures for drought-stricken areas of the country.

Fresh reports of depleted feed and water—and even human food—supplies indicated that drought damage, continuing unabated in almost all sections, might run high into the millions.

A report an avenue open to the farm board for getting production credit in the hands of farmers was made public tomorrow by Carl Williams, member representing cotton.

Williams was expected to discuss in particular the possibility of providing "funds" to "feed" livestock through emergency interpretation of the marketing act.

As the livestock act-up was interpreted, the board would lend money to the marketing association which in turn would loan to the farmer.

The effect of the whole plan if the "board" finds "worthy" of it, would be to put up his livestock as collateral and borrow money to buy feed. He would be authorized to market his stock through the National Livestock Marketing Association.

President Hoover has been active in the set-up of the American Cotton Cooperative Association.

In the meantime requests for relief of an entirely different nature have been going to the president—continued to pour in to the relief and various government agencies. No action was anticipated before Monday, when the president was to be given a detailed report on drought-stricken areas.

All crops have been seriously affected by the extended drought since July 1, and in several districts farmers have been forced to haul water as far as 20 miles.

It was 106 in Franklin county, Illinois, today, compared with 77 in Chicago. Centralia reported a record of 106.

Omaha, Nebraska, reported a reading of 98 at 2 P. M., with a forecast of fair clear weather with not much change in temperature. Rain fell in Lincoln where it was 106, the mercury stood at 98. At Des Moines, Iowa, it was 106 with "continued warm forecast."

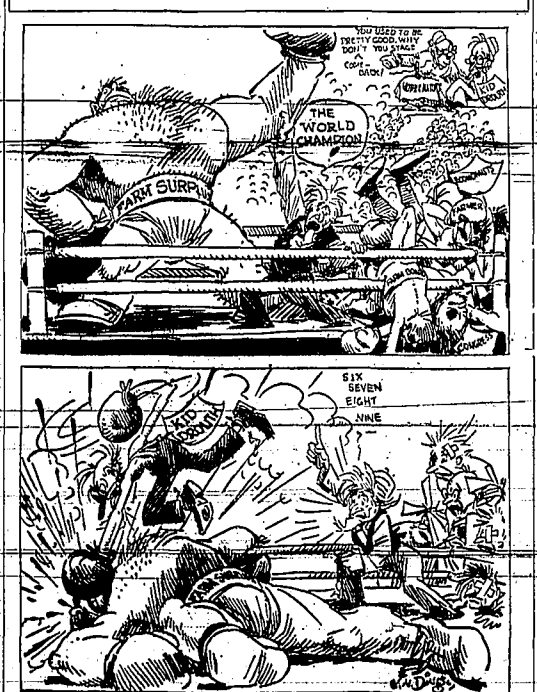
