17 PERSONS DROWN IN FLOOD WATERS ON ARIZONA BORDER

Homes of 60 Families and 300 Persons Give Way Under Force of Inundation and Residents Flee

(By The Associated Press) COCHISE, Arizona, Aug. 7.—Mayor A. C. Villanor, Nogales, Sonora, tonight estimated 17 persons were drowned in his city by the flood which swept there this morning...

There were no reports of drownings in Nogales and the extent of the damage was confined to the southern side of the international boundary...

Mayor Villanor said of the 40 persons reported missing all but 13 had been located. Among the 13 were several children. He said there was no apparent possibility of any of those still now being found...

The homes of 60 families, of whom 120 persons were detained by 50 other families were ordered by municipal authorities to abandon their homes which threatened to collapse in the Sonora city.

Mayor Villanor said the damage in his city amounted to \$175,000. He said 100 bodies were found in the bodies were found. The damage on the Arizona side of the line was estimated by police at \$25,000.

Although this evening's rains ended the rainstorm, which had been a long-continued resident, who fled at midnight with the first shower to high altitudes in the mountains in the lower parts of the city in which the business sections are located.

Heavy rains in Nogales Last night's storm dropped two and a half inches of rain between midnight and dawn in Nogales and flooded an area with the water level, centering here. The storm was centered in other sections of southern Arizona, with transportation and communications interrupted.

Children of both families, which together have a population of 11,000 persons, ran as the first gusty wind bore down a sheet of rain this afternoon. Streets were in a sea of mud and water flooded the streets.

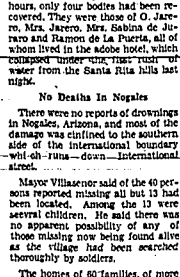

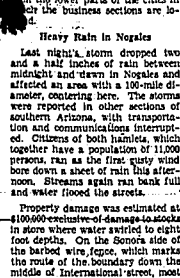

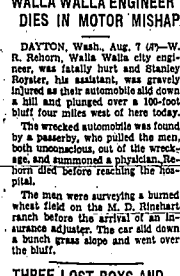
SENATOR SIMON FESS, Ohio, who succeeds Claudius Huston as chairman of the Republican national committee. (AP Photo.)



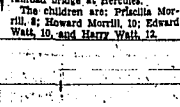
WILLIAM M. JARDINE, native Idahoan and minister to Egypt, now in Pocatello, declares business depression vanishing. (AP Photo.)



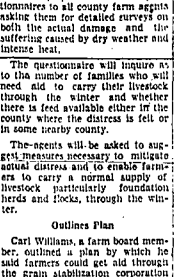

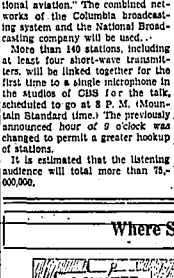

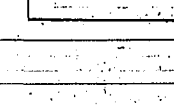

300 FARMERS VISIT BEAN PLOT TO NOTE BATTLE ON DISEASE

Speakers Explain Seed Certification and Points to Plants That Resist Blight From Attacks of Mosaic

More than 300 farmers attended the field day program at the bean experiment plot three miles west of Twin Falls yesterday, watched demonstration of experiments and heard talks on seed certification. The program was arranged by Harvey S. Hale, Twin Falls county agricultural agent. The certification of bean experiments was made by Walter H. Pierce, who is in charge of the plot. B. B. Bristol, Boise, of the state division of the University of Idaho part of the work of the nation consists of observing different selections of Great Northern beans which have shown resistance to mosaic blight. Five of these selections were made three years ago from plants that showed power of resistance that year. These still withstand the mosaic blight and retain the characteristics of the Great Northern bean, except that they have a healthier appearance and produce better on account of being free from disease. These five varieties show wide variation in time of development, some ripening in 85 days, while others take 110 days to mature.

DROUGHT PREVAILS IN PARTS OF IDAHO

Except For Local Thunder-showers Weather Remains Hot and Dry Report Shows

BOISE, Aug. 7 (Special to The News)—Weather remained hot and dry except for local thunderstorms and harvest of grain is in full swing, report of the United States department of agriculture weather bureau for the week ending August 5, 1930.

The following summary of recent conditions was made by the bureau: **SOUTHWEST IDAHO**—Except for moderate, heavy local thunderstorms in the slightly scanty rain, the wheat continued unbroken, intense sunshine and high temperatures were the rule. In the irrigated districts, crops made rapid advance to maturity; in the dry lands wheat varieties in pastured harvest were not without interruption except in the localities visited by the underwaters. In the Boise-Payette valleys, irrigation water is holding up quite well and the supply is still adequate to crop needs. The same thing is true in the Twin Falls region, some of the smaller projects are running short. The range is dry, but feed is still adequate.

SOUTHEAST IDAHO—Temperatures somewhat above normal accompanied. Light to moderate local rains occurred, which greatly benefited potatoes and beans and also helped livestock in most sections. Grains are ripening fast and the harvesting of wheat is well advanced. The second cutting of alfalfa is under way. White fly is reported in the best fields in parts of Blaine county. Peas are ripening in Fremont county but they will be in short crop in the dry farm regions because of drought conditions.

NORTH IDAHO—Fair weather obtained throughout the week with locally one hundred per cent of moisture. There was little wind movement. Wheat harvest and livestock made rapid and uninterrupted progress. Temperatures were high the last half of the week, the brightening up most outdoor activities. More favorable temperatures were the rule during the closing days of the week. The continued absence of rain and the low humidity are seriously affecting all growing crops, crop ripening generally, and supply cutting down the supply of irrigation water. Livestock, except on the range, are being fed some hay.

PEACH RAISERS AND PACKERS COOPERATE

Growers Agree to Leave 30 Per Cent of Crop to Rot to Keep Prices Level High

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7 (AP)—California peach growers will collect approximately \$2,000,000 for their 1930 crop despite the fact that virtually 30 per cent of it will be left on trees to rot.

By an agreement between commercial and cooperative canners and peach-grower interests, the entire crop of 483,000 tons will be bought at \$2.75 a ton, but the pack will be held to 12,000,000 cases, or about 70 per cent of the yield.

Growers and canners agreed to a limited pack to avert "demoralization" in the industry as the result of a surplus.

To maintain the established price for the total tonnage, farmers of the agreement raised \$1,750,000 before packing began, and will pay for peaches left in orchards.

Growers not marketing their crop will receive the stipulated 40c, less picking costs which average about \$7.30 a ton, and which will net the grower as much as those who pick their fruit-laden trees.

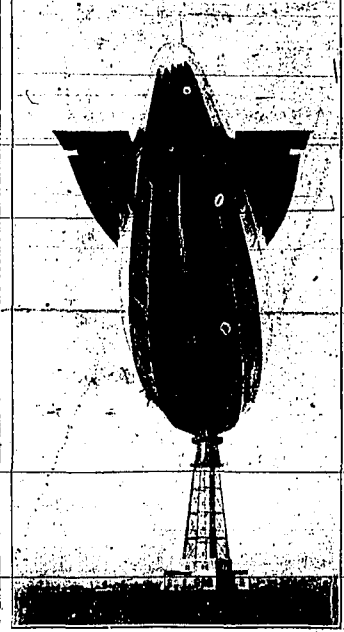

Babson Declares Evidence Points To Lowering of Living Costs to Compensate for Smaller Wages

Average Price of Food, Clothing, Rent, Fuel, Furniture, etc., Decreases by 3 Per Cent During Last Six Months

By ROGER W. BABSON
 BABSON PARK, MASS., Aug. 7.—The drop in commodity prices has been a favorite as well as its unfavorable aspects. While it narrows the margin of profit for industry and in many instances causes a temporary loss, it also reduces the cost of living. Of course, wholesale prices have fallen faster and further than have retail prices. Nevertheless, we are beginning to see the effects in the average family budget.

In the last six months there has been a drop of about 3 per cent in the cost of living. That includes the average of food, clothing, rent, fuel, furniture, and miscellaneous items. Some articles have declined more than others. The housewife needs only 4½ cents to buy the same amount of food that would have required 41, has winter. Ninety-seven and three-tenths cents will buy a dollar's worth of fuel and fifty, 98½ cents will pay for 100 cents of 20 cents purchases. The cost of clothing, food and clothing prices dropped simultaneously in 22 cities of the country during the first six months of 1930, the decreases ranging from 3.4 per cent to 8.8 per cent.

Effect to Lower Earnings
 The trend of living costs is downward. While certain raw materials and industrial commodities may have reached the bottom at wholesale, retail prices of consumer goods have not yet fully reflected the decline. For some time merchants will be paying along to the public the savings which they are now making in the purchase of goods from manufacturers and producers. The period of low living costs will mean the laying of the foundation for later recovery on a sound basis. It will do this in several ways—first, by cushioning the effect of wage reductions; second, by making it easier for people to save money; third, by gradually encouraging greater consumption; and fourth, by stimulating the bond market.

The scale of union wages remains high, but what is more important, purchasing power is the actual earnings in the pay envelopes. A nominal high wage is no good to a worker if he has only three days employment out of six. Wage cuts have begun to appear more frequently of late. At first manufacturers begged customers to wait in deference to the wishes of the government. Now, however, some of them have been forced to it. Some manufacturers have resorted to wage reductions in order to keep a larger number of their employees at work rather than pay the higher rate to only a few employees. Lower living costs now constitute the chief support of the individual worker's buying power. It is already acting as a partial offset to the lower purchasing power resulting from unemployment and wage cuts.

Public Saving Easier
 One of the most encouraging factors at present is the increase in savings deposits. This is due to two causes: first, the desire of people in times of business depression to exercise thrift and cut out extravagance; and second, to the lower level of living costs which is gradually making it easier to save. Those who are fortunate enough to be fully employed now will reap the benefit of lower costs and be able to save more. The revival of all the new theories, it still remains true that the foundation of business revival depends upon the willingness of the people to work and save money. Reckless extravagance leads merely to inflation, over-production, and the subsequent reaction. There is a happy medium between excessive spending and excessive saving. We should all seek this middle road. However, we have seen that the substitution of lower living costs for lower wages is a depression depression. Insofar as lower living costs help people to save they

help pay the way for recovery. should help bond market. Living costs have an important effect on bond values. For example, if you hold a 10-year bond bought in 1920 at the price of living costs, when it matures this year it will be worth in actual purchasing power 20 per cent more than it was when you bought it. This is because the cost of living has declined approximately 20 per cent during the 10 years from 1920 to 1930. Hence, the bondholder and the holder of long-term mortgages and other contracts for payment of money is benefitting from declining commodity prices.

These advantages are being reflected in bond prices, which are gradually moving upward. The factor of reduced cost of living, coupled with low interest rates, make a combination highly favorable to an active bond market, moreover, is a normal preliminary to recovery in general business. The sequence of events in past business depressions proves this to be true.

Increase in Consumption
 After all, lower prices are the only reliable stimulant to consumption. Henry Ford gave us a good example when he repeatedly reduced the price of his motor cars, and at the same time tremendously increased his sales and profits. It is a fundamental law of economics that the lower the price the greater the consumption, assuming of course that quality remains the same.

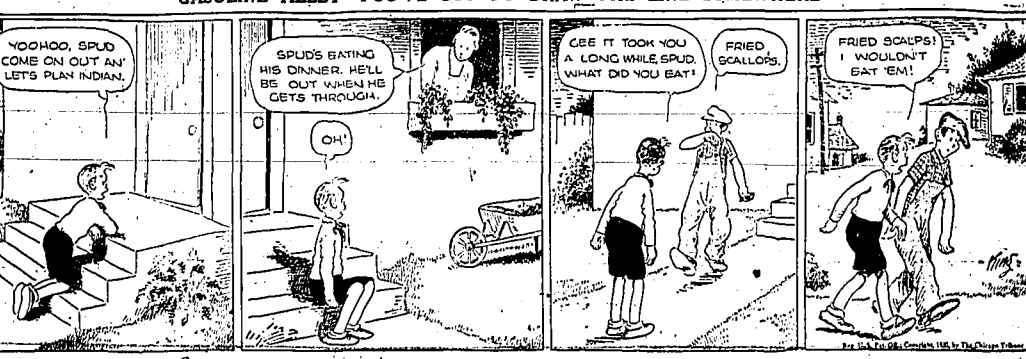

DAIRY ASSOCIATION SELECTS DIRECTORS

Extension Dairyman Asserts Idaho Cows Test Highest of Any Animals in Nation

Hooper Dairy Herd Improvement association met last night in the office of Harry S. Hale, county agricultural agent, in the courthouse with 17 members present. The following directors were elected: John H. Goss, S. H. Kayler, John Adams, R. H. Kendall and Martin Poyer.

Mr. Goss, who is president, presided and stated that a meeting of directors would be called soon to elect officers for the coming year.

The president introduced D. L. Four, Boise, extension dairyman for the University of Idaho, who spoke of methods of cow testing. Last year, he stated, Idaho had the largest average butterfat production per cow of any State in the Union, with an average of 3.4 pounds.

He stated that he would like to see more interest in this work here and see more cows on test. Mail order test is used in some states but mail bottles are sent to local tester by mail, tested and sent back. Under the milk day picks them up the next and then tests at some central point. The bi-monthly testing system is the best of the kind made every second month and differs only from the present one in use here in that the milk is not made every month. O. M. Tucker, tester, gave preliminary report on average production of butterfat for 8-10 pounds. L. J. Tencknick, secretary, reported the association in good condition financially.

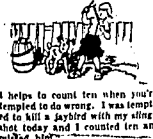
