DROUGHT COMPELS HOOVER TO CANCEL VACATION JOURNEY Relief Steps For 'Suffering Farmers and Families Force President to Call Off Trip to Parks in West

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—President Hoover's vacation trip to the Western national parks with the explanation that the drought situation would compel him to remain close to Washington where relief plans are centered.

The announcement came as no surprise in circles close to the White House in view of the president's determination to furnish all possible assistance to the stricken farmers and their families through federal, state and private agencies.

The semi-weekly cabinet meeting discussed the situation today and shortly thereafter Mr. Hoover told newspapermen he had decided to cancel his Western trip in view of the drought and the thought that he could be expected to extend his stay in the East.

The only concrete development in proposed relief projects was an announcement by Alfred P. Thompson, chairman of the association of railway executives, that the emergency freight rate reduction on hay, feed and livestock would be made first in eastern territory and would be a cut of 50 per cent wherever it was effected.

The 50 per cent rate cut would go into effect immediately. It was said, on roads operating in and from regions north of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi rivers. The special rates were expected to be extended in a day or two to other sections of the drought area.

Under a plan worked out between the Federal and state governments, a county agent of the department will pass on all applications for relief.

Mr. Hoover has had additional reports furnished him by Secretary Hyde. These reports have been supplied by several hundred county agent agents.

The cattle feed crop shortage was estimated by these officials as 10 per cent of the carry over of hay, wheat and indications were the entire wheat surplus would be needed.

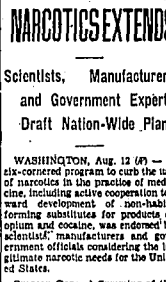

### CANAL BOARD STOPS WORK TEMPORARILY ON LONGER TUNNELS

#### Excavations Fail to Touch Underground Waters in Many Cases But Wells Tap Heavy Flows Beneath

Work has temporarily been stopped on many of the drainage tunnels of the Twin Falls Canal company system because it has been discovered that the main body of underground water is heavier than the floor of the tunnel, and may be relieved by sinking drainage wells through the floor of the tunnel. It was decided yesterday at a meeting of the board of directors of the company, its extension here, should further extension of any or all tunnels on which work has been stopped be found advisable, it will be resumed, it was stated.

In the Duncan tunnel, two and a half miles west of Bluff, it was discovered when the tunnel was extended about 1000 feet from the opening and was about 20 feet beneath the surface of the ground, that no more water was found, and was any stream under the floor of the tunnel. Further extension for a distance of another 100 feet did not increase the water run. There was a roaring sound underneath and several wells were bored through the floor, which struck underneath a heavy body of water, so that the total run from this tunnel is now 153 inches. Other tunnels tested indicate a general similarity state of affairs.

#### May Reduce Cost

If the wells should relieve the threatened scope, without further tunnel extension, it will cut down cost of drainage material, it was stated. It is thought resumption will take place on some of the tunnels on which work has stopped.

In the event that new tunnels at other points shall be deemed necessary an effort will be made to have their mouth at the level practicable level, in order to strike the main body of underground water. In some cases the conditions are such that this may not be possible, it was stated. At present work has ceased upon 10 of 17 tunnels that had been started.
