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# FIRST-AID TEAM GUEST OF ROTARY

## Idaho Power Company Team, Inter-company Champions, Puts On Demonstration

The Idaho Power company first aid team, comprising Orver C. Wilson, captain; J. D. Oll, Paul Man, Donald McClain and Harley Criggen, together with the company's first aid instructors, Mr. A. Newman and S. G. Oee, were visitors at the regular Twin Falls Rotary club luncheon Wednesday noon and gave a demonstration.

The first aid team was given an example and allowed a working time of 15 minutes each in handling a typical automobile accident happening on the highway—the occupant being cut on the left chest with foreign matter in the left eye, fractured lower jaw on left side, deep cut on top of left shoulder bleeding freely, left hip dislocated and a compound fracture of left leg six inches below the knee. The team was able to perform the work efficiently in a working time of nine minutes.

Forty employees of the company who took the first aid course prescribed received certificates by the American Red Cross last fall, was stated by J. D. Orr, division manager of the Power company. An elimination contest last March, resulted in the selection of the team named above to enter an inter-company contest in "Bose with teams from Pocatello, Teton, Boise and Payette divisions. The Twin Falls division won and brought home a plaque which was displayed at the Rotary luncheon and which will be retained permanently if the division team abate within the next two years.

Mr. Orr said that classes would be organized this fall among all employees who do not carry Red Cross certificates as the knowledge gained had proven beneficial to the community at large as well as to the company.

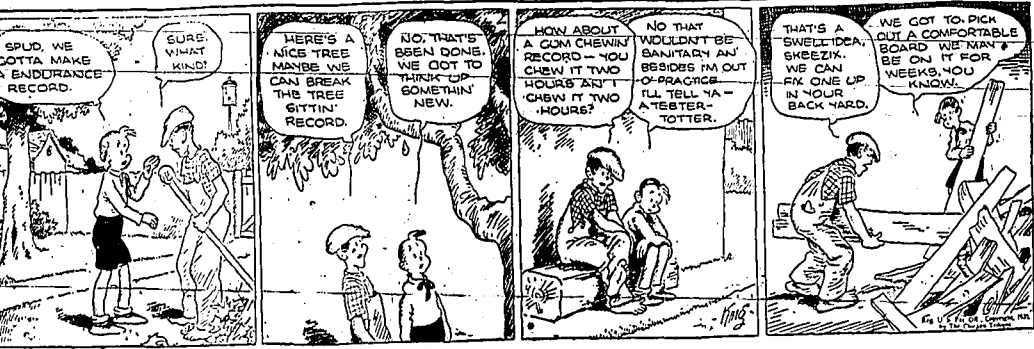
