SOUTHERN IDAHO'S SHEEPMEN ACT TO OBTAIN TAX SLASH

Equality Board Hears T. Clyde Bacon, Twin Falls; Sid Smith, Gooding, and Worth Lee, Mountain Home

(By The Associated Press) OISE, Aug. 14.—Southern Idaho sheepmen today petitioned the state board of equalization for a reduction in tax assessments that would help them to meet losses on wool and lamb.

The petition was presented to the board following a resolution adopted principally to meet local conditions.

Ed Smith, Gooding, Worth Lee, Mountain Home, and T. Clyde Bacon, Twin Falls, spoke for the sheepmen. During the season had been so unfavorable sheepmen thought "it would take every sheep in the district to get out of the sheep."

The men requested a reduction from the present rate of 45 and 60 a head to 45 and 50.

For a time the hearing for the sheepmen took on a suggestion of a hearing on the matter as often as a claim for reduced assessments for sheep were presented.

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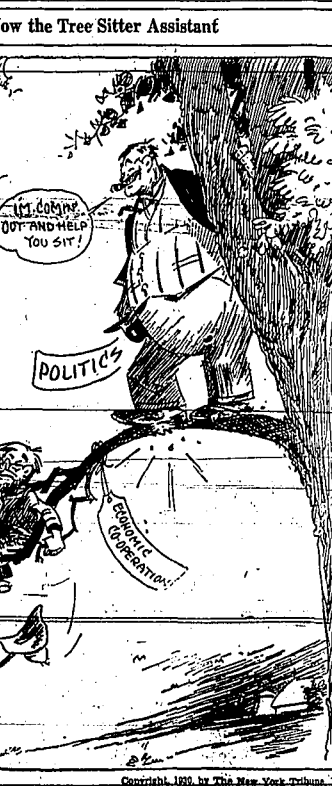
LAND'S FRUIT CROP INCREASES IN 1930 Department of Agriculture Reports 18 Per Cent Gain in Production Over 1929

LOUISIANA'S "BOY WARDEN" RESIGNS TO RESUME STUDY

Allee P. Steckler, 27-Year-Old Director of Huge Penal Farm, Returns to University For Degree in Law

(By The Associated Press) BATON ROUGE, La., Aug. 14.—After six months as warden of one of the largest penal farm systems in the United States, Allee P. Steckler, 27-year-old law student, is going back to the university to resume his business of earning a degree at Louisiana state university.

Steckler stepped out as warden of the Louisiana penitentiary after holding down the job through a period of political turmoil centering around the institution.

A state senate investigating committee report criticizing the prison

administration as "inefficient and inefficient" came during the "boy warden's" tenure.

Dentist Rumors

Steckler headily denies that the senate report had anything to do with his resignation. The report, he declares, was "malicious and not based upon the information secured in the investigation."

"I merely feel that I have completed my service," he says. "When I accepted the appointment as warden last February, it was with the understanding that it was only for a couple of months. I've served six months."

When asked, Steckler is reluctant to discuss his work as warden but admits that he is "proud" that every prisoner in the institution now knows at least the rudiments of reading and writing as a result of an anti-literacy campaign carried to conclusion during his administration.

Asked if he could suggest a prescription for curing prison unrest, Steckler declared that the morale of the more than 2000 convicts in the Louisiana system has been improved 100 per cent with a combination of good food, well-cooked work that a man is fitted for, elimination of all favoritism, and a bit of education to occupy the convict's leisure hours.

Steckler, a part-time clerk in the prison offices while attending law school, was appointed warden by Gov. Huey P. Long to succeed J. B. McClanahan, veteran member of the state legislature, after the state supreme court ruled against dual office holding.

MEN FIND MAMMOTH DEATH VALLEY CAVE

Explorers Endure Stifling Heat and Humid, Stale Air to Enter Deep Fissure

TONOPAH, Nev., Aug. 14 (AP)—A new mammoth cave has been found by four men who dared stifling heat and humid, stale air to descend into hitherto unpenetrated depths of a cleft of rocks on the fringe of Death valley.

Lepton Ballew, consulting engineer of Tonopah, and his associates climbed down several hundred feet with the aid of a 500-foot rope.

Ballew's study of the formations convinced him that the Cave extends to water level of Death valley, which would make the place about a mile deep, since it begins at the end of an abandoned mining tunnel 200 feet above sea level.

The explorers found heat of 120 to 130 degrees at the point where their descent began. They said the heat increased until it became difficult to breathe.

Find Rare Beauties

Rare beauties in stalactites were found. Masses of them were covered with needle-like crystals, almost like hugely exaggerated frost patterns. Ballew said he believed they were formed under water.

Ballew thinks the upper part of the cave once was the floor of a sea, and indications that earth had lifted were shown by limestone like limestones, but containing no fossils, due presumably to earth upheaval.

One area resembled a subterranean forest covered with white, frost-like needles. Here also were bulb stalactites which form in hollow gourd and other rounded shapes.

The tunnel leading to the cave mouth starts at the other walls of Tiya canyon, several hundred feet above the canyon floor.

The canyon is in Graciosa mountains, 25 miles from Beatty, Nevada, on the California side of the line.

CROWDING OF RADIO STATIONS REMAINS RECEPTION ENIGMA

Records of Federal Commission Show Gain of Six Broadcasting Stations in Year Brings Total to 606

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The radio fan's dream of near-perfect reception is still far from fulfillment. Engineers of the federal radio commission say that while considerable progress is being made in reducing interference, the crowding of stations on wave lengths remains the chief obstacle to clear broadcast reception.

Although there were several cancellations of stations and a few others were abandoned, commission records show 606 broadcasting stations now operating on the 80 channels as compared with 590 a year ago. The slight increase was due to the granting of licenses to new stations.

The situation has been improved, however, in the last three years. When the commission first reported the regulation of radio in 1927 there were 732 stations. Some of these were operating without licenses, resulting in what was termed "chaos on the air."

Besides the reduction in the number of stations, insistence by the commission that stations start over signed wavelengths was aided by improved broadcasting apparatus. Improved receiving sets also have contributed to better reception.

While the commission believes that reception could be improved immeasurably by taking 200 or 300 stations off the air, such drastic action is considered "out of the question." The courts have made it plain that the commission must have strong evidence that a station is operating contrary to public interest before they will uphold revocation of a license.

GROUP MEETS TO STUDY FARM LIVING CONDITIONS

MADISON, Wis., Aug. 14 (AP)—Means of improving the standard of living for the nation's farm population will be surveyed here in October by 300 members of the American Country Life association at the organization's thirteenth annual convention.

A feature will be presentation of the Gapper award of \$5000, and gold medal for outstanding service to agriculture. These will go to Stephen Kaulson textbook professor emeritus at the University of Wisconsin, who invented the cock milk test. Senator Arthur Capper, Kansas, is the founder of the award.

Seriousness of the farm living problem will be directed at the farmer's income in relation to his standard of living, utilization of his income, and the cultural life.

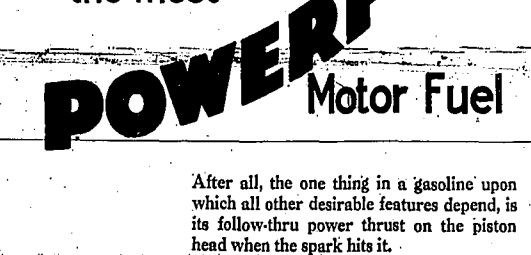

Harding Memorial, Completed Year Ago, Awaits Dedication

ASSOCIATION HOPES SOON TO DEDICATE MARION MONUMENT

Architects Aver Tomb Without Duplicate and Designed From Careful Studies

(By The Associated Press) MARION, Ohio, Aug. 14.—Marion may see its memorial to the nation's twenty-ninth president dedicated this year. The Harding Memorial, in which rest the bodies of Warren G. Harding and his wife, stand on a 10-acre tract on the outskirts of Marion—undedicated despite the fact that it was completed a year ago. Leaders in the movement to build it, however, hope formal dedication ceremonies will be held soon. The memorial, which architects say is without a duplicate anywhere, was designed on a scale of ideas gained from a study of many types of ancient temples and tombs. It stands alone in the center of a wide expanse of landscaped grounds. Its massive marble form is circular, with giant pillars supporting the open dome. The pillars form a circle in front, while the rear is sealed.

Within the open, grassy yard are the graves of Warren Harding and Mrs. Harding. These, too, are of white marble, covered by slabs of jet black. A lone tree stands at the head of the tomb. The memorial association purchased the land and erected the tomb from voluntary contributions. The federal government, the state of Ohio, and the county of Marion widened and paved the highways passing the spot. The city and county united in constructing a system of wide boulevards that went along the memorial grounds. Construction of the tomb was begun in 1923. The hundreds of thousands of dollars from leading citizens of the country. Calvin Coolidge is honorary president of the association. On December 21, 1927, the bodies of President and Mrs. Harding were placed in the massive concrete sarcophagus.

INTENSE HEAT AND RAINS VISIT IDAHO

Department of Agriculture Weather Bureau Reports Week's Crop Conditions

BOISE, Aug. 14 (Special to The News)—Intensely hot weather followed by cooling rains featured the weather in Idaho for the week ending Tuesday, August 12, according to the report of the Idaho branch of the United States department of agriculture weather bureau, with the following summary of weather and crop conditions was given: SOUTHWEST IDAHO—Intensely hot weather obtained during most of the week. Good rains occurred in much of this district on Saturday. This brought some relief from the heat and also broke up, at least temporarily, the drought that has prevailed so long in this section. The rains benefited pastures, ranges and gardens. Some down hay, and grain were wet, but no material damage was done. Intense heat damaged prunes in some localities. Haying and grain harvesting were somewhat interrupted by the rains, but in the main seasonable farm activities are well hand. Range feed continues adequate, although very dry. Sheep are being forced down from high range by failure of springs and smaller streams.

SOUTHEAST IDAHO—Temperatures have been seasonable. Moderate to heavy rains delayed the harvesting of grain and second-crop alfalfa. Some alfalfa was damaged by rains. Beets are doing well and are being benefited by the rains. Some beet fields, however, are reported affected by the white fly. The range is fair to good and will be helped by the rainfall of the past week. Apples are growing well. NORTH IDAHO—Clear skies obtained during the fore part of the week, but during the latter part the weather was partly cloudy and scattered thunder-storms occurred. Temperatures were high above the normal average most of the week. A brisk wind was recorded Friday and this tended to increase dry, hazy conditions in the full crop in the Moscow and Camas prairie districts, but in the lower sections where the wheat is mostly completed. Corn is in need of rain in the Lapwai and Culeaca districts. Vegetables and truck crops are generally in good condition. Pastures and ranges were very dry, but livestock is doing well. The third crop of alfalfa is being cut in Lewiston orchards. Peaches,

pears, and other soft fruit are being marketed. NOTES FROM THE FIELD RUSSETT, BLANDIN COUNTY—Heavy cutting alfalfa about all crops doing well; grain nearly all harvested. GLENN'S FERRY, ELMOHOCK COUNTY—Weather a little too hot; most vegetation ripening too fast; yield of hay cut because of too much heat. BURLEY, OREGON COUNTY—A hot week; some cloudiness latter part; second cutting alfalfa about all crops excellent stand and in excellent condition; thrashing or grain being beets fair to poor; plenty of water to last through the season. POCAHONTO, BANNOCK COUNTY—Temperatures about normal; heavy rain fell last half of week; haying of wheat and oats delayed by storms; potatoes and beets benefited and doing fine; second crop alfalfa being cut; some damage by rain; range helped by rains.

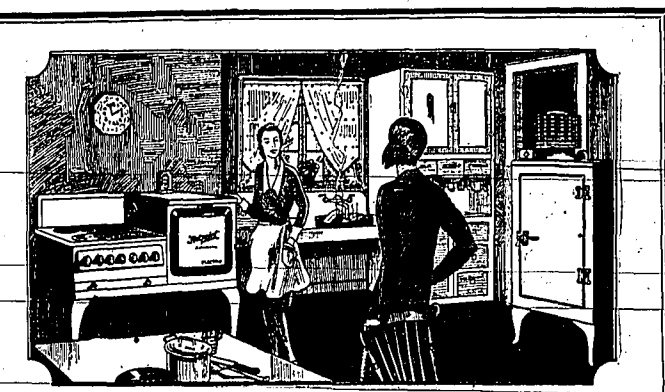

Of the contending teams in the major leagues, none can pass this test 100 per cent.

Brooklyn has a sensational catcher in Alfonso Raymond Lopez, and a capable center fielder in Johnny Frederick, but "Uncle Robbie" has played Jake Flowers, Noel Finn and Ed die Moore at second base in an effort to strike the right combination. The returns are not yet all in.

THE Cubs, with Gabby Hartnett made over and in first class condition could have made a creditable showing in the test had Rogers Hornsby not suffered injuries, for no one would ask a better center fielder than good old Hack Wilson.

The Rajah had slumped up a bit in the field when he was hurt, but his continued potent, Clarence Blair is fair, but he is no Hornsby.

The Giants have a pair of good catchers in Hogan and O'Farrell, and there is no better second sacker than Hughie Crix, but it is never certain from one day to the next who will play center field.
