## NORTH IDAHO JUDGE FAILS IN MOVE AT CONVENTION OF BAR

Judge James F. Allshie, Coeur d'Alene, Furtively Attacks Association's Referendum On Eighteenth Amendment

(By The Associated Press) CILLAGO, Aug. 20.—The American bar association, opening its general sessions of its fifty-third annual convention today, refused by a vote of five to one to withdraw its current referendum on repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. The lawyers—more than 1,000 in all—of the state of Idaho, also rejected a recommendation that they oppose current forms of farm relief, and heard testimony from George W. Wickham, former progress of President Hoover's law enforcement commission.

ONE-TIME RUM LAW AGENT AND VENDOR OF LIQUOR SPEAKS

Albert M. Hubbard Testifies Wife of Principal Defendant in Conspiracy Case Knew of Witness' Activity

(By The Associated Press.) SEATTLE, Aug. 20.—Testimony that Mrs. William M. Whitney, wife of one of the principal defendants in the Lyle-Whitney liquor conspiracy case here, knew of Albert M. Hubbard's bootlegging activities while she acted as his confidential agent, was given by Hubbard in federal court here today.

Hubbard testified he had visited the Whitney home almost every night while working as government agent, explaining he went there to work up case reports and memorize testimony.

Asked if he recalled his memory lessons to Mrs. Whitney at his home in the evenings, Hubbard replied: "I had to learn that it was going to testify."

He denied he had memorized testimony in the former trial or was making a recital. A case report, signed by Hubbard and dated January 24, 1929, was introduced as evidence by the defense to controvert Hubbard's testimony several days ago that Roy Orsted, Pacific Northwest rum king, had "pointed" him in the prohibition office to spy on the activities of Mrs. C. Lyle, prohibition administrator.

The report said Orsted visited Hubbard to meet him and then advised him of having conferred with Whitney during the first Orsted trial. Hubbard admitted he had written the report.

Hubbard was included, besides Lyle and Whitney, Earl Corwin and R. L. Ryan, former agents in his accusations. Clifford T. McKinley, former United States assistant district attorney, also was a defendant in the Lyle-Whitney case as "government informant" and was charged with accepting a bribe from the Orsted trial as "government informant" and was charged with accepting a bribe from the Orsted trial as "government informant."

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—Public uncertainty as to what ails Mrs. Almon Temple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, who is recuperating at a Malibu beach cottage, was increased today by a statement issued by Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, the evangelist's mother, which said her daughter's illness was "all blain."

At the beach cottage it was variously reported that Mrs. McPherson was suffering from a face-licking operation, a nervous collapse, blindness and need of a rest. Mrs. McPherson herself was quoted as saying: "I'm just a sick girl—but I'll be all right soon."

Dr. Edward Huntington Williams, psychiatrist and nerve specialist, after visiting Mrs. McPherson, said: "She is much recovered. Another day of rest and she will be all right. Certainly she can see all right. There's nothing the matter with her eyes. She has had no bandage on her face or eyes since last night."

An official announcement at Angelus Temple, Mrs. McPherson's church, said: "The latest news from Sister McPherson is that she is somewhat improved this morning. Please continue to pray earnestly."

Members of the "four-square gospel" church have been praying since the announcement yesterday by Miss Emma Schneider, Mrs. McPherson's secretary, that the pastor had lost her sight.

Mother Talks Most of the talking for publication today about Mrs. McPherson's condition was done by Mrs. Kennedy. She reiterated her reference to a list which she had made of the "four-square" result the mother had to go to the Brentwood sanitarium to have some face-licking done over in the region of her nose. Mrs. McPherson denied she hit her mother.

drought states. As the act specified the states in which the fund was to be expended, Secretary Hoyle said the \$300,000 could be used in only 17 of the drought states—Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Missouri and Montana.

It is believed representing the American Railway association on the committee said the emergency freight rates on food and cattle now in effect in the East and South, would be extended to Western territory Friday.

The idea of local credit corporations is similar to that followed in the Mississippi flood disaster. The federal farm loan board was asked to supervise the local credit organizations if the proposal is agreed upon at the banker's conference next week.

Under the tentative plan, the local or state credit agencies would arrange for loans to farmers on easy security, endorse them and turn them over to the federal government credit banks. The credit corporation would be permitted to charge 2 per cent more than the 10 per cent interest now charged by the intermediate banks making the maximum interest to the farmer 8 per cent.

It is estimated that approximately \$400,000 would meet the loan demands of the corporation.

ILLINOIS BOURBONS ATTACK PROHIBITION

"Dripping Wet" Plank Sponsored By Cook County Delegates Gets Approval

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. Aug. 20.—Denunciation of prohibition; demand for repeal of the Volstead act; the "Coke and Ice" law; the Illinois "reach-and-seize" act, and enactment of legislation legalizing light wine and beer, were salient points of the platform adopted at the Democratic state convention today.

The "dripping wet" plank, sponsored by members of the powerful Cook county group, headed by Anton J. Cernak, was presented after a bitter denunciation of the liquor laws of a state and made its country, from a province. Such a treaty, it was pointed out, is, in any country, from England.

Some opposition to an unequivocal anti-prohibition platform, had been voiced by delegate leaders in conference, but the differences were ironed out and the vote of approval was unanimous.

In equally vigorous language, the platform condemned the campaign expenditures of Ruth Hanna McCormack-Lewis opponent.

The precinct established by the United States senate in cases involving the Smith and Newberry platform read, indicate that the Republican nominee for governor from Illinois will not be elected, even if she is elected.

### EXCAVATORS FIND BONES OF ANCIENT GEM STATE HORSE

**Dr. Gidley Avers Discovery Establishes Last Remaining Link Between Three-Toed and Modern Animals**

(By The Associated Press) **BORIS, Aug. 20**—This is a story about an Idaho horse, not a Black Beauty of the horse, but a rusty little creature about three hands high which science declares to be the predecessor of all the horses of today.

Remains of the little animal were discovered near the Snake river in Owyhee county by Dr. James W. Gidley of the National Academy of Washington. Dr. Gidley declared the fossil discovery established the last remaining link between three-toed horses of the Miocene period and the one-toed horses of the present.

**Two Links Remain.** According to a statement published in United States Daily, these discoveries are the two remaining links in the evolution of the horse from the pre-Eocene period when it was supposed to have five toes through the four-toed Eocene horse to the Oligocene horse with three toes.

The Idaho pony was a development through long ages from the "three-toed" horse of the Eocene which had three toes on the rear feet and four on the front. This horse carried some 20,000 years ago had a small hoof, a trip to Pacific indicating, Dr. Gidley says, the existence of an animal of this size although no fossils of this earlier horse have been found.

**18 Links.** At the present time there are at least 18 links in the evolution of the domestic horse. The modern horse found in the Pleistocene of the Ice Age, and was scattered over all continents with the exception of Australia, Dr. Gidley said.

The modern horse, however, was introduced to America in recent times, having a breeding stock in its tens of thousands of years in its continuous history on the American continent.

### DEATH RATE FROM CHOLERA REDUCES WITH NEW REMEDY

**Dr. J. Morrison Reports Reduction of Fatalities in Dred Malady by Applications of Bacteriophage**

(By The Associated Press) **NEW YORK, Aug. 20**—An epidemic of cholera death rate, effected by a remedy called "bacteriophage" is reported by J. Morrison, director of the King Edward Memorial Research Institute at Shillong, India.

The report was received here by G. L. Morrison, resident manager of the India state railway bureau. Except for a few deaths from cholera, medical authorities are divided as to the nature of the disease.

**Two Theories.** Some hold that the minute, living things that prey on bacteria; others that they are a non-living, chemical solution that poisons or otherwise destroys bacteria.

**Dr. Morrison reports cholera broke out last October in the village of Bakren, with a population of 744, living in 14 houses.** In the first eight days 78 persons had cholera and 63 died, an 80 per cent death rate. Then bacteriophage arrived from the Shillong institute and the death rate dropped abruptly to about 10 per cent.

**Record of Remedy.** Of 65 cholera patients taking bacteriophage every day, 70 died; otherwise, there were no more cases of cholera.

**A similar epidemic happened at Dr. Morrison's camp in Shillong, where 21 cholera cases receiving no bacteriophage died, and six cases that had bacteriophage one died.**



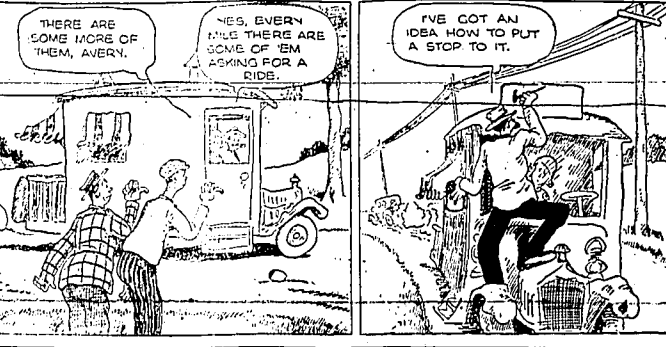

### PAR FACES CHARGE OF HORSE STEALING

One of the stolen horses, the sheriff was informed, belonged to a ranchman named Bailey and the other to another ranchman named Harris.

Investigation in connection with the discovery of the abandoned car and theft of the horses was credited by the sheriff in large measure to Deputy Sheriff A. C. Parker, following his departure Sunday on a vacation trip to Magic Hot Springs in Twin Falls county, according to Nevada law.

It was ascertained last evening that Nevada Springs ranches, from which the horses were stolen are located in Cassia county.

Announcement in Salt Lake City—Tells of Twin—Falls \$475,000 Building Project

A Salt Lake City architect, Slack W. Wierburn, is at work now on plans and specifications for a seven-story hotel to be built in Twin Falls, representative with equipment, an investment of approximately \$475,000, according to an announcement made in the Salt Lake Tribune.

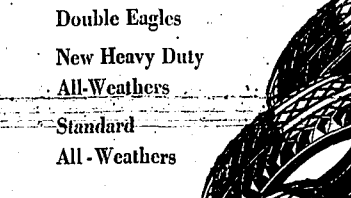
