

160 FARMERS VISIT SPECIAL FIELDS ON BEAN EXPERIMENTS

Varieties of Great Northern Show Resistance to Mosaic Disease and Produce Unusually Large Yields

One hundred sixty farmers accompanied H. S. Hale, Twin Falls county agricultural agent, on a tour on which selections of Arate and Leahy varieties of the Great Northern beans were examined and compared as to condition with ordinary Great Northern beans. All farms visited were in the Twin Falls section, as time did not permit a visit to the certified seed field on the Vining farm at Piler.

The Arate variety is a descendant of beans selected four years ago by T. Arate from bean stalks, which stood out better than any others in his field and were free from disease. The Leahy variety springs from a single stalk selected in 1925 by John B. Leahy, because of its unusually healthy condition. Both men were Twin Falls farmers. Mr. Arate has since ceased to farm, while Mr. Leahy continues to operate his farm.

At the Cathro farm, the Arate variety was examined and found in fine condition. It was stated by Mr. Hale last night. At this point Mr. Hale spoke at some length on bean disease, and explained how the Arate selection had been made.

Utah Authorities Hold For Gas Theft, Two Men Accused of Crime in Idaho

Babson Declares Construction of Public Utilities Compensates for Business Slump and Job Shortage

Careful Planning of Government Departments and Low Interest Rates Make Possible Increases in Building

By ROGER W. BABSON
 BABSON PARK, Mass., Aug. 20.—There is always something to be thankful for. The possibility of business depression and unemployment might have been much more severe if it were not for the \$3,000,000,000 that is going into public works and public utility construction during 1930. Building is one of the key industries which determines the volume of employment. Hence, when building declines, it is a serious matter. In the first half of this year we had cause to be alarmed. However, a good fortune of low interest rates, partly by careful planning on the part of government, state and local officials, and partly by the conscious effort of our railroad and public utility executives, we have been able to keep the building up to a tremendous volume of engineering construction.

In the first half of 1930 building of public works and utilities showed a gain of 30 per cent over the corresponding months last year. While this gain was not sufficient to offset the drop of 40 per cent in residential building and in the decline in commercial and industrial building, it nevertheless tempered the general decline, making it less severe than otherwise would have been the case.

It is gratifying also to know that the large sums being spent on public works are not only of temporary benefit by means of employment, but are of lasting benefit in improving the country. Good roads always pay for themselves in the end. We are taking advantage of this period of slow business to build for the future. On all sides we see fine new roads being laid out by our engineers, linking the different cities with modern high speed means of transportation. Our present and future railroad capitalists are, by their construction expenditures, laying the foundation for the good times that will come when business shall recover. They are preparing during the dull times for the good times that will ultimately come.

Money Rates Governing Factor
 Statistics clearly show that construction of public works and public utilities on a large scale is possible under conditions of high money rates. Had the country been under the 6 per cent money rates for long-term financing which extended last summer, it is inconceivable that the present volume of public construction would be going on. Public financing at rates from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent is an extraordinary matter.

We see this clearly illustrated in the volume of new bond issues by states and municipalities in the first five months of this year. Not only has there been an increase of 100 per cent in such financing, but it has changed temporarily from permanent loans. Whereas last year cities were getting along as best they could with short-term notes last year, this year the short-term financing has fallen off and long-term bonds have been issued in their stead.

The public utility companies and railroad systems have also taken advantage of the favorable bond market to finance important permanent construction. New security issues of the railroads have this year run nearly 60 per cent higher than last year. Public utility financing has increased 36 per cent. This indicates the raising of much new capital which is going into engineering construction and improvements. Industrial financing on the other hand has fallen off about 65 per cent.

Efforts to be Done
 It is to be sure a limit to which borrowing for new construction of public works is justified, and that limit is imposed by the ratio of bonding capacity of states and cities to the net assessed valuation. This limit of many cities and towns has been closely approached, and further appropriations must be made with great care.

However, there is another important position in the new appropriations. The growing receipts from the gasoline and license taxes are enabling a considerable proportion of

Drawings Diminish Uncertainty in Weather Forecasting

DIAGRAMS OF AREAS OF COLD AND WARM AIR PROVE BENEFIT

Massachusetts Institute of Technology Employs New Methods For Predictions

AIR CURRENT PLOTS APPEAR AS "LAKES"

Scientific Studies Showing Reason For Vanishing Predicted Storms Aid Project

By HOWARD W. BLAKELEE (Associated Press Science Editor) CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Aug. 21—A method to take some of the uncertainty out of weather forecasting is being tried at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

For example, the predicted holiday storm, which threatens cutting plans to the last minute and then fades into clear skies, is likely to become less troublesome.

The conditions which permit such a storm to vanish are so light. Scientific studies showing this were made under direction of Professor V. Bjerknes at the Geophysical Institute in Bergen, Norway, and now are applied to American conditions by Professor C. G. Ross, in charge of the meteorological course at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Great areas of cold and warm air, which resemble drawings of lakes, some a third the size of the United States, are sketched on the weather maps for the new forecasting.

"Lakes" Hold Shapes

These "lakes" preserve their shapes for considerable periods, from a few days to more than a week. Their "banks" or "shores" are sharply held in line by the differences in weight between the cold and the warm air.

These lakes of air are reservoirs that feed the "low" areas which mean storms.

The new maps show "lakes" of cold air, which are fed from one side by warm air and from the other by cold air.

How long this feeding may continue is, in low latitudes, dependent partly on the supplies of warm and cold air in the reservoirs.

Booster or later every storm is surrounded by cold air and cut off from the warm reservoir. The "low" then is unlikely to last much longer. It passes into the well-known trough that is sometimes forecast as a coming storm, but does not appear.

By charting the air oceans on the weather maps the forecaster can see when a storm area is about to lose its source. This charting, done at present without any complicated additional weather-reporting machinery.

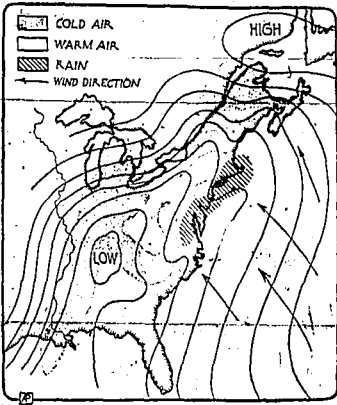

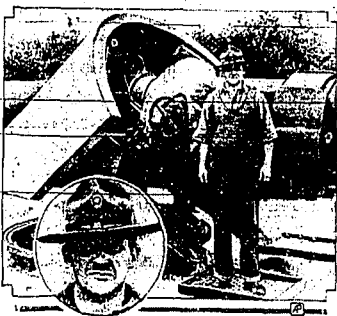

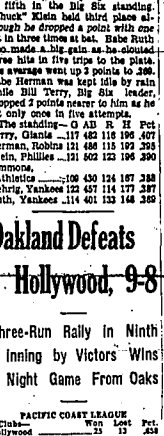

Texans Import Giant Toads to Help Destroy Preying Insects

CAMPAIGN AGAINST MOLE-CRICKETS IN TEXAS PROGRESSES

Farmers of State Get Pest-catchers From Porto Rico to Save Crops

EXTENSION AGENT HELPS TO MAKE EXPERIMENTS

County Gets Shipment of 89 Jumping Amphibians to Aid in Drive on Insects

(By The Associated Press) AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 21.—No more sleeping in corners for toads in Texas.

They're now expected to work toward prevention of millions of dollars in insect crop damage.

comes to the surface at night. The imported pest-catcher is expected to aid materially in extermination of May beetles, boll weevils, white grubs, cockroaches, fleas, meion beetles, leaf hoppers, millipedes, house fly pupae, centipedes, land snails and caterpillars. The toad's appetite seems insatiable. Tests show it is fond of 83 different kinds of insects, most of them detrimental to crops. One toad has caught 128 flies in less than a half hour.

Experiments with the Surinam toads are being watched closely by the Texas state department of agriculture, and it is probable that a campaign will be started to introduce the toad into all parts of the state. Experiments so far have been confined to Jefferson county near Beaumont. J. F. Combs, agricultural extension agent, is in charge of the work.

Conduct Tests

First tests with the toads were made in 1929 to determine their adaptability to American soils and climate. A dozen were kept under observation during the winter and they suffered little although slightly protected from the cold. Recently a shipment of 89 was received, and this number is expected to care for the needs of Jefferson county, so fast do the toads multiply. The production from the spawn of one female is estimated at between 1000 to 2000 a year. Combs asserts that a single toad will be worth \$15.00 a year because of the cecidomyia it will kill.

The toads are about twice the size of the native American toad.

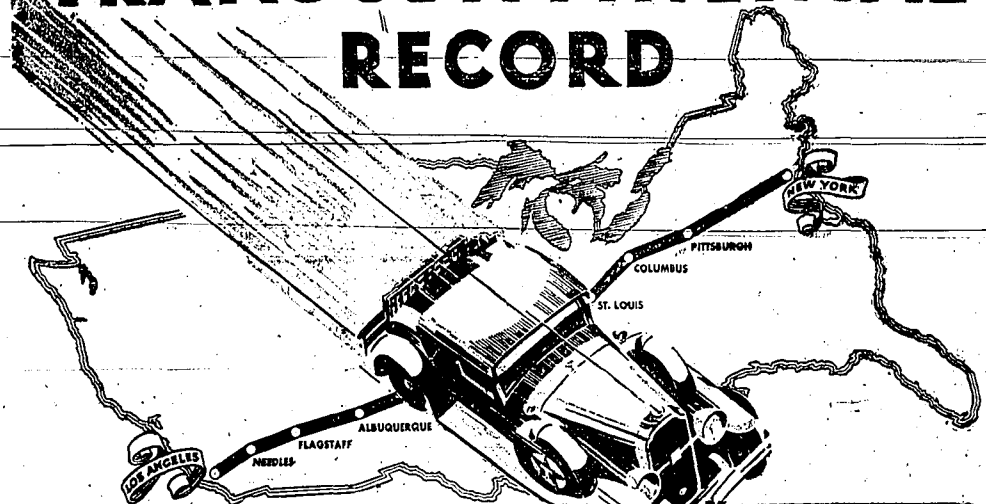

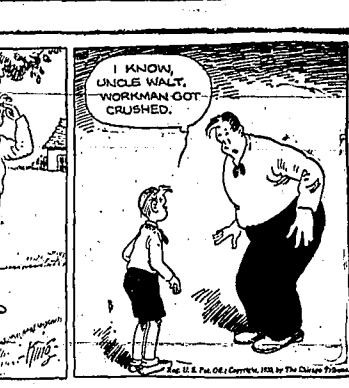

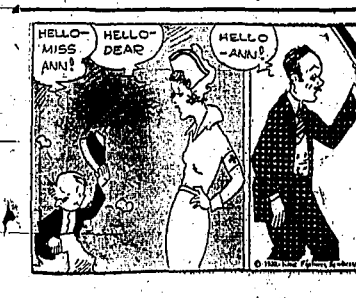
