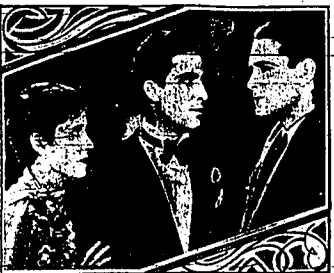

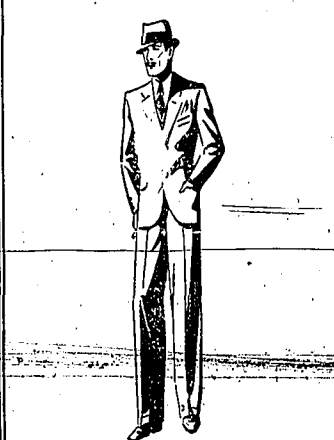

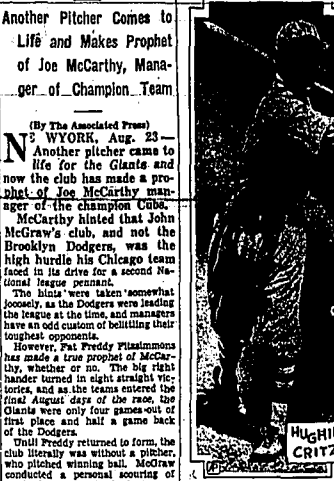

True, the Giants didn't surge near the top until the pitching improved. But every club is concocted at least one or two winning pitchers. McCarthy's club this season finished the race for over a month without any.

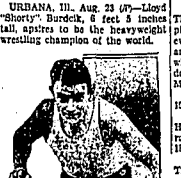

Malone got into trouble in the fourth inning when Bill Terry turned loose a double, the first of his three hits.

Carl Hubbell, slender New York southpaw, went back in beautiful style until the eighth inning when he suddenly lost control and was blasted out of the rubber. Until that time he had given only five hits.

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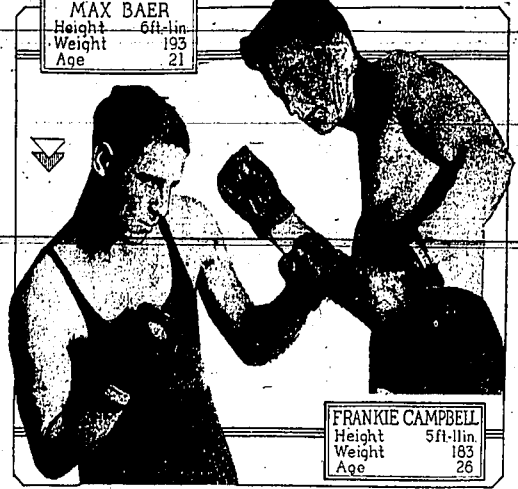

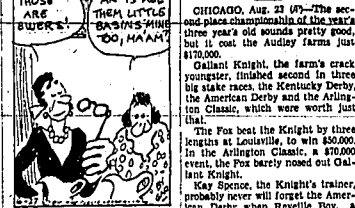

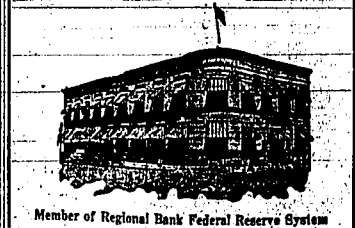

Los Angeles Nine's Manager Declares Returns From Sale of Food Amount to More Than \$40,000 Yearly

Short stories on sundry topics: The lowly peanut and coarse "hot dog" may be a couple of social misfits, in the scheme of fancy eating, but—what a big help they have been to baseball.

Ask Mr. Club-owner about the concession end of the business. He will tell you that it is a red-hot, money-making proposition. The "hot" is excellent and times club owners always wear cherry smiles when the weather is steaming hot.

In the Coast league, Los Angeles and the San Francisco Seals have built up a tremendous business in concessions. I quote Oscar Peterson, business manager of the Los Angeles club, who says:

Profits amount to anywhere between \$10,000 and \$15,000, according to the attendance for the season. Fans do eat and drink, if you give them the quality and low cost of concession. This is our policy and it has been successful. I believe we have the best average per capita of any park in the country."

Concessions Important
"The concession business is an important item and club owners would do well to concentrate on handling it in a thorough business manner and in giving their patrons the best because it is the volume in business that counts."

George A. Putnam, secretary of the Seals, agrees with Peterson, but adds Mr. Putnam says he feels best when his park is heavily carpeted with peanut shells. Pop, pop, adopt!

The "Walkathon" is still shuffling merrily along up at Mike Fisher Arcadia Pavilion. At my last reading, the "perpetual plodders" had been walking more than 100 hours. 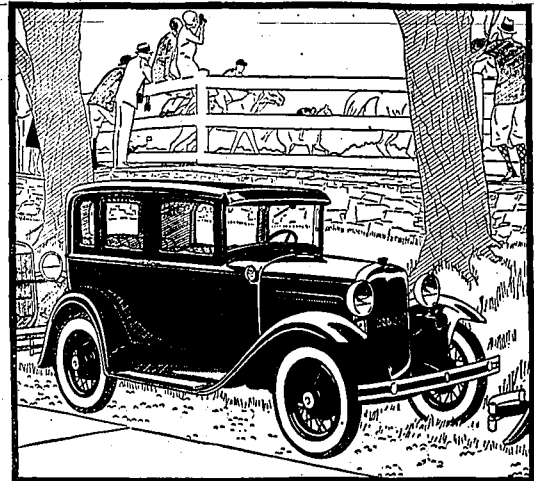
DEATH OVERTAKES WEST END WOMAN

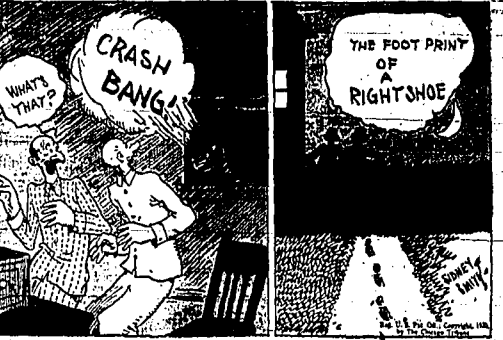

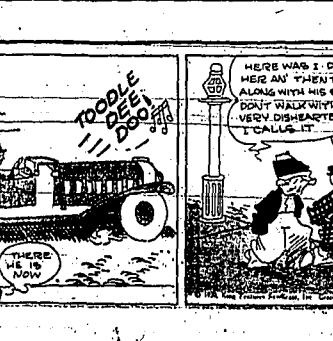


