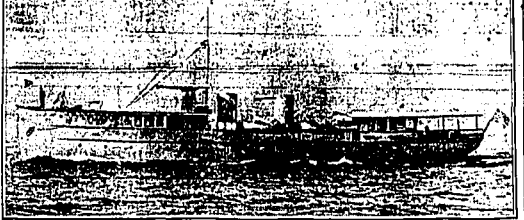

### INSPECTOR WARNS DEALERS IN FRUIT

State Law Forbids Traffic in Infected Products and Will Hold Vendors Liable

Idaho law forbids sale of infected fruit. Edgar V. Olmson, district horticultural inspector, pointed out in a statement issued here last evening. Apples, pears, peaches and prunes must be free from any indication of worm damage if it is offered for sale or for use in any one of the products of the state law. The inspector asked for cooperation of dealers by refusing to handle infected fruit and warning that if they will be held responsible for any infected fruit found in their possession.

There is plenty of first-class fruit to be obtained from the better growers who are interested in keeping up Idaho's reputation in this respect," the inspector said.

Quiet Law The statement quoted from section 2074, Idaho action laws: "It shall be unlawful to sell or offer for sale, or have in one's possession for sale or barter, any fruit which is or has been infected with San Jose scale, or the larva or farinose of the codling moth, or the peach-tree borer, and the fact that such fruit bears the marks of San Jose scale, apple scab, or is worm eaten by the larva or the codling moth or peach twig borer, shall be prima facie evidence that such fruit is infested within the meaning of this section; and it is hereby made the duty of the department of agriculture through its inspectors to prevent the sale of such infected fruit, and they are hereby given power to seize and destroy such infested fruit wherever they find that the same has been packed, sold, shipped or offered for sale, etc."
