MARINE INSPECTORS EXONERATE CAPTAIN IN OCEAN DISASTER

Report Frees Master of Ship Responsible for Sinking of Oil Tanker of Blame For Death of 50 Persons

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 27—The record of Captain Archie H. Brooks, master of the steamer Fairfax which rammed and sank the oil tanker Pinta in Mexico last week, was cleared today of responsibility for the disaster which cost 50 lives.

Captain Brooks was exonerated of blame in a report made by the steamboat inspection board at Norfolk, Virginia, which investigated charges filed against him after the collision.

The report made public by Dickerson H. Hoover, head of the commission, stated that the steamboat inspection service, said a thorough examination of 24 witnesses had established a positive evidence substantiating the accusations and that the case was closed.

Charge filed against Captain Brooks by steamboat inspectors before he sailed to make the proper maneuvers, making excessive speed during the fog at the time of the collision and failure to make an efficient search for possible survivors floating in the water.

CANINE VETERAN OF WAR DIES IN THIRTIETH YEAR

DUNBORN, Wis., Aug. 27 (AP)—Denny O'Keefe, who barked defiance to the enemy from a dozen front line trenches and marched over the Rhine to triumph, is dead.

Old age and the strain of service with the American Expeditionary Force were too much for Denny. He succumbed last night but without a whimper, as befitting his title: "One of the oldest war dogs in the United States."

Denny was a mongrel. He was born one rainy October night of 1917 in a dugout just back of the lines. The "boys" of the thirty-second division carried him with them, and he became a mascot.

When the boys came back to the United States, he was with them, snuggled aboard ship in a rain coat, and he was a mascot in the army as "Private Denny O'Keefe, honorably discharged."

Democrats Name Joseph Tyler, Emmett, to Oppose Borah, Select Burley Lawyer to Run Against Lewiston Man For Attorney General and Pit Spiers With Lukens

GROVER (Associated Press Staff Correspondent) DAHO FALLS, Idaho, Aug. 27—John McMurray, Oakley farmer, stockman and banker, will carry the Republican banner into the fall election as gubernatorial candidate, opposing Mayor C. Ben Ross, Fossilite, Democratic candidate for the second consecutive campaign.

McMurray and Ross were selected by their respective parties at state conventions today, the Republicans in session here and the Democrats at St. Anthony. Both received unanimous support on the first ballot.

Senator William E. Borah, seeking his fifth term, was nominated by the Republicans yesterday and will be opposed in the election by Joseph Tyler, Emmett, nominated by the Democrats today. The state's two Republican representatives, Burton L. French, Moscow, of the First district, and Addison T. Smith, Twin Falls, of the second district, were also chosen to seek reelection, and will be opposed by Compton I. White, Clark's Fork, and George H. Fisher, Bancroft, respectively.

The nomination of McMurray was made unanimous on motion of State Attorney General W. D. Gillis, whose name also was before the convention as a gubernatorial candidate. The Nez Perce county delegation, home of Byron Defenbach, state treasurer and also a candidate, seconded the motion to name McMurray on the first ballot.

Similar action was taken by the Democratic opponents of Ross. He received the entire vote after Asher B. Wilson, Twin Falls, had withdrawn his name and requested united support for the Pocatello mayor.

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FOUR SHIPS SEEK VESSEL CARRYING BODY OF ANDREE

TROMSOE, Norway, Aug. 27 (AP)—The little vessel Bratvaag, which is hunting seals somewhere in the Arctic ocean, was the object of a search tonight by four other sealers which have been chartered by news-gathering organizations in a dash to obtain the first-hand story of the discovery of the bodies of Solomon August Andree and a companion, who perished in a balloon trip over the Arctic region 23 years ago.

The sealer Holsten, carrying an Associated Press representative, left Tromsoe last night while two other sealing vessels were ready to put to sea with other correspondents tonight. Still another is later the story.

The little Bratvaag does not carry a radio transmitter and with the body of Andree and one of his companions aboard since the discovery early this month has been pursuing its job of catching as many seals as possible before the weather sets in.

After long negotiations, however, the owner of the Bratvaag has ordered the little vessel to leave the sealing grounds immediately for Tromsoe.

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FIFTH OF IDAHO'S POPULATION PLANS TO ATTEND SCHOOL

Gem State Educational Institutions Expect Entrance of More Than 100,000 Persons Within Month

BOISE, Aug. 27.—About one-third of the state's population, more than 100,000 students, will start to school in Idaho within the next month.

Among them will be more than 4,000 college students, a figure approaching a record in the state, reported by the department of education indicated today. The university and southern branch open September 16. The department estimated 27,000 students would go to the grade schools. High schools are prepared to take care of 21,000 students.

A number of schools were to introduce new buildings this year. Location normal will have a new girls' dormitory, which the department expected would be completed by October 15. Blackfoot will have a new high school and grade school buildings, while Twin Falls will have a new gymnasium. Fish Haven and El. Charles in Bear Lake county will have new high school buildings.

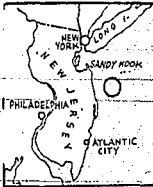

The southern branch at Pocatello will have about 500, Albion normal 300, Lewiston normal 350, College of Idaho 500 or more, Gooding college 200, and Ricks academy 250.

HEAD OF RESERVE BOARD QUILTS POST

Roy A. Young, Governor of Federal Unit Three Years, Takes Highest-Salaried Job

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (AP)—Roy A. Young, governor of the federal reserve board for the last three years, has resigned to accept the honorific, remunerative position of governor of the Federal Reserve Bank, Boston.

In accepting the resignation, effective September 1, President Hoover said today he realized Mr. Young had made a great sacrifice by remaining on the board, paid high tribute to his service, and added it would be difficult to find a successor.

The governor submitted his resignation yesterday. In his letter to the president he said he had been considering for some time acceptance of a higher salaried position in the private banking world, but had not been ready to leave the nation's credit conditions were disturbed.

Expresses Confidence
"Now, however," he said, "it is clearly evident that the credit structure of the country is in an easy and exceptionally strong position. Governor Young will leave a position paying \$12,000 a year to accept at least twice that salary. He will fill the vacancy of Boston caused by the death last April of W. P. G. Harding, who also served on the reserve board before going to the Boston Institution.

TWO NATIONS JOIN IN HUNTING SLAYER

Military and Civil Officials of States and Mexico Seek Couple's Murderer

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 27 (AP)—Military and civil officials of Mexico and the United States joined tonight in an effort to solve the strange death of a young Monrovia, California, paint store manager and a Los Angeles colored woman, who were found with stab wounds, were found yesterday on the beach near Encinitas, Lower California.

Francis Conlon and Lois Marion Kenzie, University of California student, were to have been married Monday. Whether their deaths was the work of another man, a robber or an unidentified enemy could not be determined from the meager clues available.

The two were slain presumably last Sunday night near a camp on the beach of the famous Lower California resort. A man, seen with them Sunday, was sought but lacking description this was difficult and it was believed he may have escaped into the United States.

Question Suspects
Suspects were questioned but each established his innocence. Governor Jose Maria Tapia's governor in the northern district of Lower California, employed private detectives on the case. Available Mexican soldiers and police and border guards and San Diego authorities cooperated in search of clues.

Identity of the pair was established through a book found near the bodies. The book's title is "The End of Her Honorability." What significance, if any, this title had, could not be determined. Miss Kenzie was prominent in the younger social set at the southern branch of the University of California.

SUGAR PRODUCERS FAIL TO ARRIVE AT DECISION

NEW YORK, Aug. 27 (AP)—A second conference of American and Cuban sugar producers failed to reach without indications from Thomas L. Chabourne, chairman of the committee, as to the prospect of reaching an agreement on a five-year plan for the "stabilization" of the sugar industry.

The plan, introduced yesterday by Dr. Varrillo Gutierrez, Cuban senator, calls for curtailment of production of sugar beet and cane crops in Cuba, the United States, the Philippines, Porto Rico and Hawaii until 1935.

No definite action has been taken on the proposal, which was opposed by officials of the American Sugar Cane League, "Cuba Libre," who heads a committee of American financially interested in the Cuban industry, invited representatives of beet and cane growers in the United States, Porto Rico, the Philippines and Hawaii to the conference.

KANSAS CITY MILK PRODUCERS AGREE

Strike Virtually Ends as Dairymen and Pasteurizers Plan For Arbitration

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 27 (AP)—Kansas City's milk strike was virtually ended under an agreement reached today by representatives of the Pure Milk Producers' association and pasteurizers.

The milk will be marketed under the same terms as before the strike leaving the moot points, particularly a check-off system whereby the producers' association would receive 3 cents on each 100 pounds of milk, due to arbitration by Dr. Clete L. King, head of the Wharton School of Finance, University of Pennsylvania.

Violence broke out repeatedly in the latest disagreement, which ended Wednesday August 13, milk sheds on the farms of several independent dairymen were dynamited. Armed men halted trucks and dumped their cargoes. Scores of shots were fired and four employees of one pasteurizing plant were beaten severely by a mob of farmers.

Officers of the association, however, said they opposed such outbreaks and sought a peaceful campaign to force recognition of their organization upon the producers.

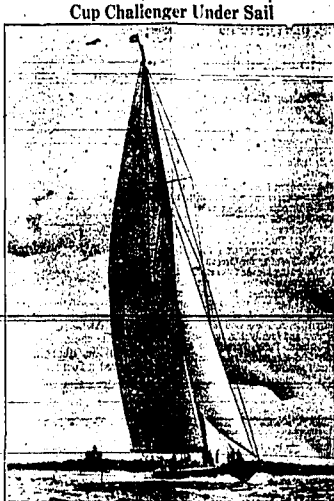

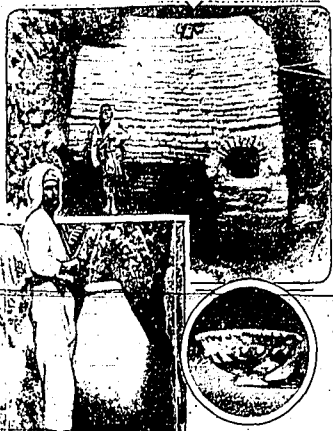
Archeological Findings Reveal New Records of Ancient Times

EXCAVATORS FIND RELICS OF THREE FORGOTTEN CITIES

Men Locate Seleucia, Onis and Akshak, Flourishing Centuries Before Christ

TOLEDO AND MICHIGAN INTERESTS LEAD WORK

Expedition Locates Remains of Destroyed Homes On Single Site In Bagdad

TOLEDO, Ohio, Aug. 27.—Discovery of new archeological records covering approximately 6000 years from the earliest days of civilization to the time of Christ is reported by the expedition of the Toledo Museum of Art and the University of Michigan.

The expedition's findings have been made on the site of Seleucia, Onis and Akshak, three cities which flourished in the order named on a map on the Tigris river, not far from the city of Bagdad in Persia. They were destroyed, buried and forgotten.

Excavator Reports

Accounts of the expedition's work were given here by Professor Leroy Waterman, chief excavator, and by Blake-Mora Godwin, director of the Toledo Museum of Art.

Professor Waterman organized the expedition to determine the position of the famous city of Onis which Xenophon, in his memoirs, described as prosperous and wealthy and a city of size several centuries before Christ.

He established the site of Onis but on top of it found the still more famous city of Seleucia, a Hellenistic independent state set up by Seleucus Nicator, favorite general of Alexander the Great.

Hardly had Seleucia been discovered when the expedition found traces of a third city, which he identified as Akshak, a Sumerian occupation dating at least as early as 3500 years before Christ. Akshak is described as contemporary with the historically important Chaldean city of Ur.

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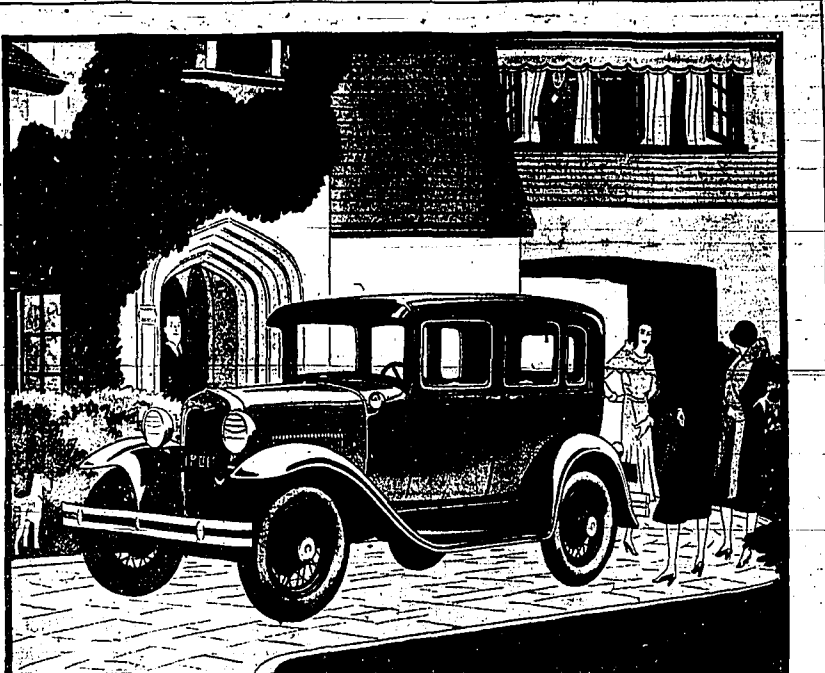

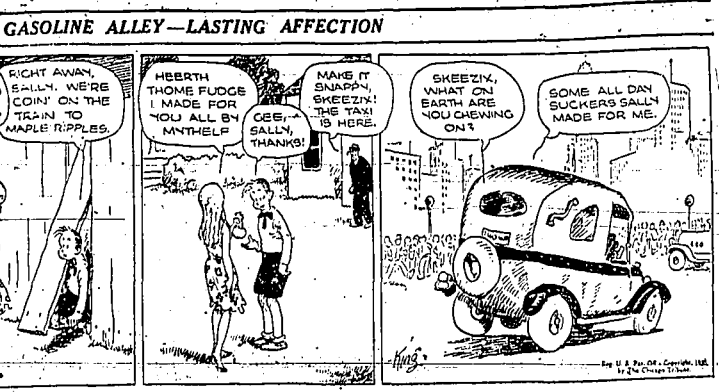

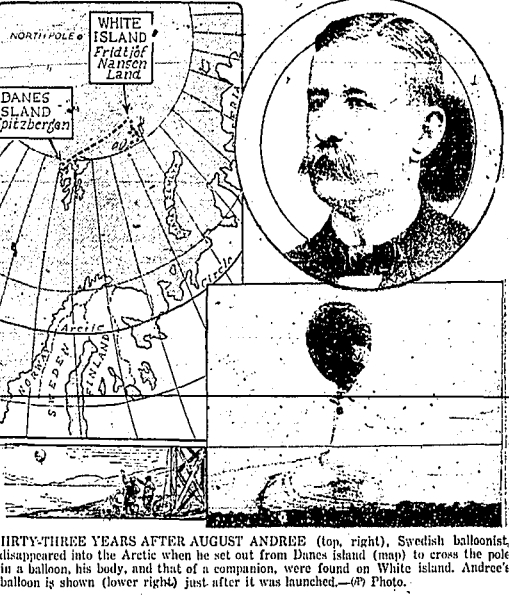

HIGHWAY DISTRICT WINS JUDGMENT FOR FUNDS FROM COUNTY

Judge Babcock Awards \$25,446 to Twin Falls Builders and Holds License Money of Use For County Bonds

Twin Falls county had a legal right to use motor vehicle license funds to retire county road and bridge bonds, but was to transfer to the county's current expense fund any balance of motor vehicle license funds not used for retirement of such bonds.

The judgment called on Twin Falls county commissioners to make a check on the motor vehicle license fund and pay to Twin Falls highway district \$25,446 in license funds transferred to county current expense fund at close of years 1910, 1921, 1922, 1929 and 1930.

Twin Falls highway district, which receives between 60 and 65 per cent in distribution of motor vehicle license funds in Twin Falls county, is the county's right to use any part of those funds, and asked judgment for \$25,000.

Appeal From Board's Order
The question got into court on appeal by E. H. Sawyer, Twin Falls from the county commissioner's order retaining to pay the highway district's claim and declining to make a county tax levy to meet county road and bridge bond payments for 1929. Judgment entered by Judge Babcock held that action of the county commissioners in refusing to levy a tax to pay road and bridge bonds for 1929 was sustained; that the commissioners' action in refusing to apportion and pay over to the highway district its share of the motor vehicle license funds and that the commissioners should make appropriation of money taken from the motor vehicle license funds and pay to the Twin Falls highway district for the years 1910, 1921, 1922, 1929, 1930, \$19,920; 1928, \$21,812.72; 1929, \$19,920; 1928, \$21,812.03.
