SPECTACULAR FIRE BURNS PAPERS IN CAPITAL BUILDING

Blaze in Headquarters of Federal Trade Commission Causes Injury of 22 Men Battling Fire Flames

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Twenty-two men were injured, four seriously, in a spectacular fire today which destroyed many valuable records in the headquarters of the federal trade commission.

Most of the men hurt had minor cuts and bruises or were overcome by smoke. Physicians said the greatest damage to hospitals for treatment probably would be to the structure or commission files.

Some of the papers lost dealt with the commission's investigation of public utility power companies, but a determination of the damage in this file awaited a check of records taken from the building.

Headed in Flaming Structure The commission's offices were housed in one of the structures here erected for temporary use during the war. It offered choice fuel and although the walls were left standing the roof collapsed in many places and the interior was totally wrecked.

The cause of the fire was unknown. An employee had left for the usual Saturday half-holiday an hour before it was discovered. The cause was a candle as a possible cause, or a carelessly flung cigarette butt.

REINFORCEMENTS OF ARGENTINE CAPITAL RAPIDLY TAKES ON WAR TIME ASPECT

Reinforcements of Heavily Armed Troops Reach Capital as Precaution Against Possibility of Insurrection

(By The Associated Press) BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 30.—Reinforcements of heavily armed troops were brought in today by the government as a precaution against a possible outbreak of an attempt to assassinate President Hipolito Yrigoyen.

The eighth regiment of cavalry marched in from Campo Mayo with full war equipment, while the thousand soldiers carried in the capital were held in quarters for instant duty.

The government began taking measures against Trotsky tonight following upon the declaration of a 24-hour strike by 8000 telephone employees, and it was said there was no fear of a revolt, although the president believed an attempt might be made to kill him.

Cause Little Trouble Strikers caused little trouble, merely cutting a few lines, which were quickly repaired, and demonstrating in front of an exchange, but troops and police remained on duty nevertheless.

The squares near the president's house and the capitol were heavily guarded, while atop Yrigoyen's palace machine gun crews stood with their guns ready to sweep the streets. Thus far, there has been little trouble except a shooting affair last night in which two men—a diplomat and a member of the territorial police—were killed.

HEAT CAUSES EIGHT DEATHS IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Eight people died today from English storm-proof heat wave, which continued with high humidity despite heavy storms in the North and cool breezes in the South yesterday and during the night.

The highest temperature in London today was 81 degrees, 13 lower than yesterday's highest reading, but the increase in humidity means that the thermometer below the drop on the thermometer.

Eighty-one degrees in London today was 13 degrees more humid and unpleasant than the same temperature on the other side of the Atlantic. Consequently the heat is less bearable.

PERU'S MILITARY JUNTA STRIKES AT POLITICAL EXILES

(By The Associated Press) LIMA, Peru, Aug. 30.—Peru's new military junta bore down heavily today on ex-President Augusto B. Leguia and the adherents of his 11-year administration.

The junta, which took power in June, ordered Leguia to leave Peru and to report to the military government. Leguia refused to make a statement and reported could not be checked from other sources.

Both Leguia and the quarters of a former Leguia prisoner, Dr. Arthur Capper, were guarded by soldiers. The guard is headed by an officer released from the military government.

The government decided to suspend articles 21 and 31 of the constitution, dealing with the rights of citizens in order that accused former officials might not take "advantage of certain constitutional rules to evade punishment."

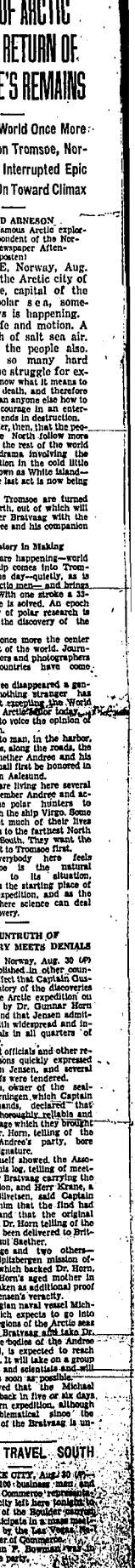

Gravity of Jobless Situation in United States Claims Dominating Position in Thoughts of Populace

President of Federation of Labor Declares Spirit of Day Should Vigorously Fight to Solve Problem of Joblessness

We observe Labor day this year at a time when the problem of unemployment overshadows all other problems. One year ago it was evident that the country was approaching a most unfavorable industrial condition. Each month the situation has grown steadily worse until now we find there are more people unemployed on Labor day, 1930, than at any similar period since the World war.

Fortunately, the American Federation of Labor has functioned in a most servicable way in the distressing period through which we have passed and are now passing.

The economic facts and philosophy expounded by the federation regarding the maintenance of high wages have had a tremendous moral and restraining effect. The theory of high wages has made a powerful appeal to the judgment of all classes of people associated with industry.

While the gravity of the unemployment problem holds a dominating position in the minds of men and women, there are many other problems of social and economic importance which are being given close attention and careful thought by the hosts of labor.

We are engaged in extending the organization among the non-union workers in every industrial section of the country. An intensive campaign has been carried on in the south. Both the numerical and economic strength of the federation has been increased.

Our activities for remedial legislation have been directed along constructive and practical lines.

We have secured the passage of old age pension legislation for New York state and elsewhere. We have secured the enactment of convict labor legislation and have succeeded in bringing to the attention of the public the injustice and the evil of "yellow dog" contracts.

Substantial improvement has been secured in the enactment of workmen's compensation legislation and we are pressing for amendments to

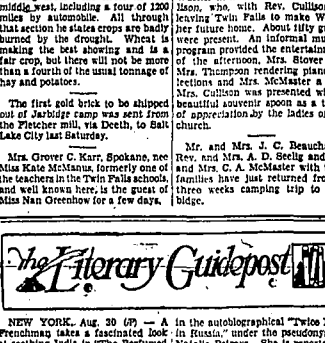

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IDAHO REPUBLICAN PARTY RE-AFFIRMS FAITH IN FACTION

Law Enforcement, Taxation, Highways, Natural Resources, Women in Politics and Silver Get Place

(Special to The News) IDAHO FALLS, Aug. 30.—The Republican platform adopted by the state convention here follows:

"We, the delegates of the Republican party, assembled in state convention at Idaho Falls, Idaho, August 26, 1930, hereby adopt the following resolutions and platform embodying the principles of the Republicans of Idaho:

"The Republican party of the state of Idaho by its representatives in convention assembled, reaffirm its allegiance to the policies and principles of the Grand Old Party under which our country has made such wonderful strides during the last seventy years in developing our natural resources and bringing progress and happiness to the people beyond that of any other nation of the earth. We pledge our continued and unflinching support to the Honorable Herbert Hoover, our chief executive, whose able leadership and beneficent legislation has been enacted, understanding with far-reaching vision for world peace have been consummated and economies of government have been effected. The country is fortunate in having as its president a man of such candid and ability—irreproachable character and such a comprehensive knowledge of world affairs and who responds so quickly to every emergency which confronts him in administering the diversified interests of our great government.

"Economic conditions in the world at large, and particularly the United States, have been changing with tremendous rapidity during the past number of years. New wants and new desires have developed. New inventions have almost revolutionized certain phases of industry and resulted in overproduction in certain fields.

"These interesting changes have demonstrated an aggressive and forward looking development of the standards of living of the people of the United States, but they have also created a number of serious economic problems which affect alike the farmer, the laborer and manufacturer. The Republican party has ever been responsive to the needs of the people. impartial, diligent and fearless enforcement of all laws to the end that law and order may prevail within the state.

Taxation
"The most vexatious problem in government are those of taxation. We pledge our party to continue vigilance of state expenditures, and to continue our efforts to provide for taxes by means and methods best calculated to ease the burdens of the taxpayer and equitably and uniformly distribute them.

Highways

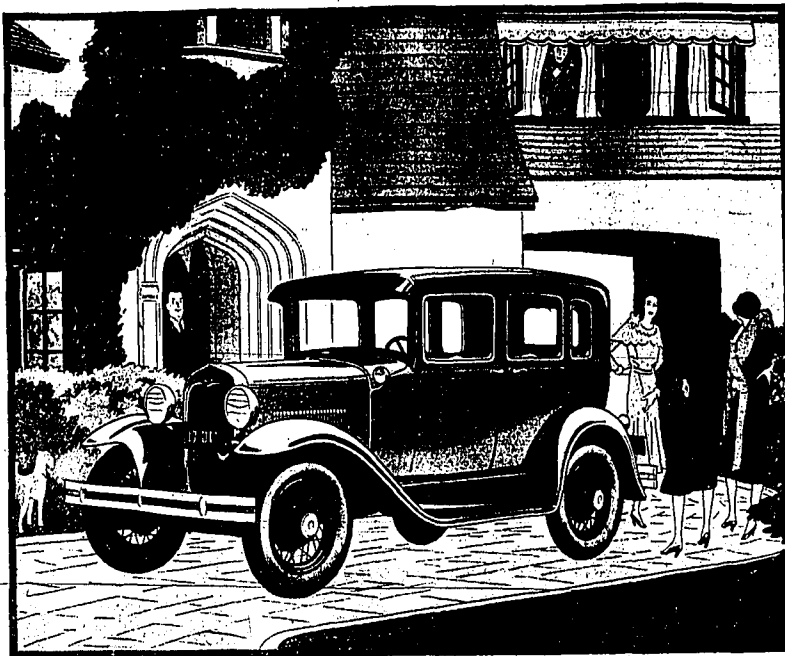
Veterans' Welfare Commission

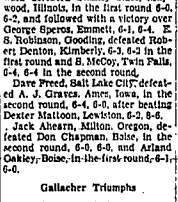

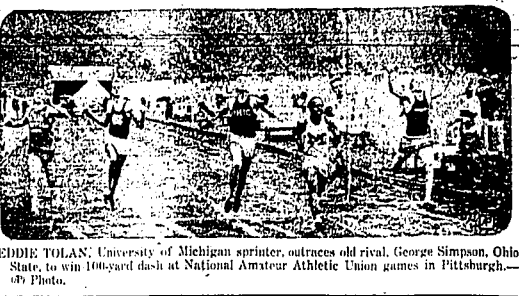

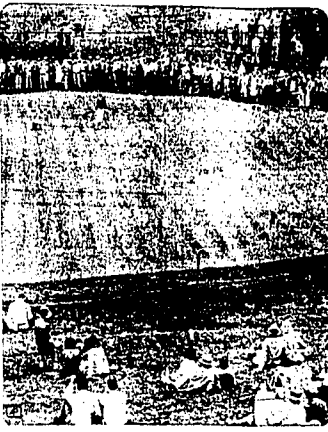

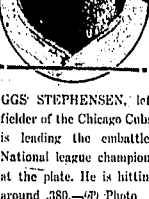

FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

SLUMP IN BUSINESS STRIKES AUSTRALIA WITH DOUBLE FORCE

Hitherto Almost Entire Immunity From Deflation Makes Inevitable Depression Particularly Acute

By JOHN WILLIAM (Associated Press Correspondent)
SYDNEY, Aug. 30—Australia's almost entire immunity from the deflation that most countries expect to meet immediately after the war has made the inevitable depression all the more acute, now that it has finally come.

Neither in regard to labor, the wages and conditions of which are governed by Arbitration Court awards, nor commodities had there been any appreciable change of the high rates established during the war. Labor costs had indeed, risen in many instances because the unions when seeking reversal of a award asked for higher wages and easier conditions, and the judges of the arbitration court have granted many of their requests of labor governments, have frequently conceded these advances.

Employers Take Stand

The first definite stand by employers against maintenance of an easy standard, led to the prolonged strike in the coal industry. To a considerable extent this industry was dependent on export to south America and the cost of production became too high for competitive prices to be quoted.

The trouble with the owners resulted in lower wages. Then last December came the crash in the world's wool prices causing a loss to Australia of \$200,000,000 on the season's clip.

Wool Receipts Shrink

The money received for wool in London has been a serious deficit factor in balancing payments for English exports to Australia. Naturally so huge a shrinkage in wool prices has had a serious effect on trade adversely to Australia, and the exchange rate—never an important factor in the past—has become strikingly and alarmingly. To correct this heavy gold shipments were made to London, but this was only a palliative and one that could not be often repeated.

The situation called for even more drastic measures, in the shape of enormously increased customs duties, aimed at reducing imports, and the severe restrictions on exports in many luxury lines. While, within a few months, this has markedly reduced imports, it has also had the boomerang effect of slaying the Commonwealth's revenue from customs duties.

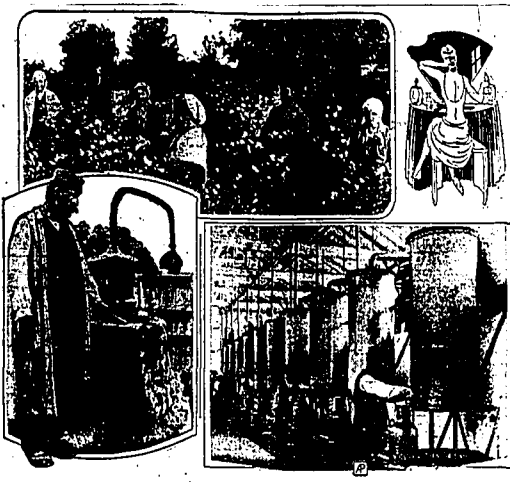

From dawn to sundown country roads are alive with the great swarms drawn by robust horses, little donkey carts driven by women and hand carts pushed by children—all on their way to the distilleries.

Essence Industry

Nearly 150 villages in the famous Valley of Roses, as well as a few small cities, are dependent on the rose harvest.

The peasants have formed a trust to fix the price of the roses and have succeeded in obtaining from the distilleries as much as eight cents a pound. The essence fetches nearly \$400 to \$450 a pound.

The attar distilleries produce the attar, and one of them, in the village of Rahmanliya, works exclusively for American customers.

BERLIN, Aug. 30—The bugaboo of a dictatorship long a favorite device among leaders of German parliamentary groups, has been worked overtime in the hectic political battles this summer.

Parties committed to the blessings of republicanism use it to force concessions from other groups while the communists prod their rank and file with the threat of a "white dictatorship." Then there are the nationalists who constantly reiterate the need for the proverbial "strong man" holding the equally proverbial "iron broom."

Wide Agitation

From extreme left to extreme right, in fact, pamphlets and books by both party and non-party authors take into account the possibility of a dictatorship as a sequel to a breakdown of democracy, with frequent allusions to the "stifling of parliamentarism" in Russia, Italy, Spain, Poland, Portugal, and Jugoslavia.

Even in Lisbon considerable agitation has been caused by house-to-house visiting on the part of police in search of information as to the number of rooms and windows. Rumors that a new tax on windows was under consideration spread through the town.

The fears of the populace were pacified when the government announced that the counting of windows and rooms was part of a campaign for healthier houses.

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NEW SCHOOL YEAR CLAIMS TEACHERS AND PUPILS HERE

Superintendent W. B. Smith Outlines Program For First Days of Sessions Beginning in Coming Week

Opening of a new school year in Twin Falls schools will summon 302 teachers and approximately 2000 students to their classrooms here on Monday, September 8. W. B. Smith, superintendent of schools, outlined last evening school authorities expect a substantial increase in enrollment this year over that of last year when there was a total enrollment of 3196, with 875 in high school, 1715 in junior high school, 720 in the Lincoln, 400 in the Washington and 274 in the Biackel schools.

School buses will be readied and bring their first loads of students to school here Monday morning of next week.

On account of children's day at Twin Falls county fair at Piler, teachers and students will be given a half-holiday on Tuesday, August 31, and schools will close at noon Tuesday for the remainder of the day.

Enrollment Schedule
A schedule of preliminary enrollment for high school students was circulated by the superintendent. Under this schedule seniors will be enrolled on Thursday afternoon; juniors Friday morning; sophomores Friday afternoon; freshmen Saturday morning, and students entering Twin Falls high school from other districts will be enrolled Saturday afternoon. All enrollments will take place in room No. 201 of the high school building.

Grade school pupils will be enrolled Monday, while Wednesday will be the first day of school for beginners.

A general assembly of all Twin Falls school teachers has been called to be held on Saturday at 2 P. M., at which time the superintendent will outline the plans and program for the coming year's school work. Thereafter teachers will meet with their principals to receive room assignments and supplies for starting off the school year.

In preparation for the opening of the new school year, Twin Falls school buildings have been thoroughly overhauled and renovated. Extensive work has been done where it was needed, and new floors, wainscoting and

Enrollment of the new \$20,000 gymnasium and auditorium in connection with the high school building has made available a number of additional high school classrooms and made possible the introduction of this year of additional educational facilities. Provision also has been made for a school nurse this year, and also for employment of two additional teachers if required to reduce the number of students in any room.

Without Additional Cost
Enrichment of the school's curriculum in accordance with modern ideals of education by providing of new courses and adding additional facilities has been accomplished, the superintendent pointed out, without additional cost to the school district's taxpayers.

Twin Falls school district's tax levy of 23 mills this year is the same that has been made for several years past preceding, and any additional income from the district's tax levy this year is accounted for by increase of the district's assessed property valuation.

Without any additional cost to the district's taxpayers, the superintendent pointed out, there have been added to the junior high school during the past two years eight classes in manual arts, eight classes in domestic science, three classes in junior business training, two classes in art, four classes in science and two classes in handicraft.

These the superintendent termed "forwarding and funding" courses that enable students to select their courses wisely when they enter high school.

The superintendent gave full credit to the district's board of trustees for a consistent and well defined policy in looking upon these enrichments of the school's curricula.

CREDITOR DEMANDS CONCERN'S LICENSE

W. C. Pond, Buhl, Takes New Tack in Suit On Bond of Defunct Produce Dealer

Marking a new development in the first test in court of Idaho's produce dealers' license law started in district court here last spring, J. H. Barnard, Twin Falls attorney for W. C. Pond, Buhl, judgment creditor, yesterday petitioned the Idaho department of agriculture for cancellation of the certificate of authority of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty company to carry on a surety business in Idaho.

The petition alleges failure of the surety company either to pay Pond's \$1925 judgment claim within 90 days after it was entered in district court here last May 20, or to appeal to the state supreme court within the 90-day period, provided by statute.

The petition recites that the surety company in January, 1925, executed \$2500 bond under Idaho produce dealers' license law for Carl L. DeLong, Twin Falls, who six months later entered bankruptcy.

Asks Pro Rata Division
Since Pond obtained judgment on his claim for payment for potatoes delivered to DeLong, two other claimants have brought suit against the DeLong bond, total of claims exceeding \$4500 per cent. sum of the bond.

The surety company has brought suit in district court here to require bond to pay rate in distribution of the bond with the other claimants. Frank L. Stephens, Twin Falls, attorney for the surety company, contended Pond's judgment claim was satisfied when the surety company turned over \$2500 to the district court here for distribution, which it still pending.
