Amount Of Pressure On Piano Keys Controls Tone "Color"

Instrument Graphically Reveals Differences In Musical "Touch"

Variation Between Mediocre and Artist Appears to Be Wholly Matter of Simple Loudness



Tests by Dr. William Drazil White (inset) show difference in piano tones made on the same key when translated into wavy lines (see inset). Rudolph Ganz, pianist, is shown during test, when his tone production was recorded by an oscilloscope.

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—The tone of a piano is not a matter of simple loudness, it is the difference between a mediocre pianist and an artist. The difference between the two is not in the strength of the fingers, but in the control of the touch. The discovery of a single source for tone color is reported to the Acoustical Society of America by Dr. William Drazil White of the acoustical laboratory of the American Steel and Wire company, a subsidiary of United States Steel.

These pictures add to, rather than detract from, the marvels of the instrument which turns sounds into pictures.


