# Frenchman Progresses With United States of Europe Idea

## PUBLIC DISCUSSION OF BRIAND'S UNION OF NATIONS STARTS

Representatives of States On Continent, Without Dissenting Voice, Move to Appeal to League Body

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, Sept. 8.—Aristide Briand's plan for an European federation went definitely into the state of public discussion today following upon the first session of the league of nations council.

Without a dissenting voice, but after a long and warm discussion of methods, representatives of 27 European states decided to submit the plan for a League of Nations assembly, bearing the title in principle. Hence their action was a resolution of that effect and asked Mr. Briand to place the whole matter before the league.

That Briand was in the close of the present session, the French foreign minister will explain in public the spirit of the resolution, but he does not seem to favor collaboration of European powers in both the political and economic field.

The meeting of the European conference followed upon a brief and simple session of the council on the League question at which the question of the Palestine mandate was the only subject.

Mr. Briand's project, reported for the mandates commission, made a bold and careful statement of the League of Nations, with a foreign annex, and in which the council agreed that with the mandate commission would continue to cooperate toward the fullest measure of peace, prosperity and happiness to both Jews and Arabs in Palestine.

The discussion of Briand's plan was in private session. While Great Britain finally supported the plan, Mr. Briand himself made a careful analysis of the possible dangers and insisted that a mandate must be given a free hand in the carrying out of the plan.

Games will be the former 15-inning affair, but the new series will be a nine-inning affair.

Only one in the history of modern baseball has the world series opening been earlier than this year. The exception came in the year 1914, when the series was held on consecutive starting days, as usual, the series began four days before the opening of the season.

### CROPS IMPROVE ON SOUTH IDAHO STATE CANVA NEAR BURLEY

#### George O. Mitchell, Named Tenant on Demonstration Ranch, Reports on Conditions and Year's Yield

By ARTHUR G. BURN (Special Correspondent)

**BURLEY, Sept. 8**—Under chapters of the 1927 season, the Idaho state demonstration farm was established at Burley in Cassia county last year, when the 1927 was received in trust by the state board of education for the use and benefit of the Idaho state normal school and which under the provisions of chapter 110 of the 1927 session of the Idaho legislature was transferred from the state board of education to the state board of agriculture.

George O. Mitchell, who has been named as tenant on the demonstration ranch, reports on the conditions and year's yield of the demonstration farm.

"For people perhaps remember the creation of this demonstration farm, it is nevertheless a fact that in the last three years, under the direction of W. W. Palmer, agricultural agent of Cassia county, George O. Mitchell has been in charge of the farm, and that since the taking charge of the farm, Mr. Mitchell has been a World War veteran, having been service at the front in France.

**Modern buildings**—Since the creation of the institution, a modern dwelling house has been erected upon the premises, together with a machine shop, a seed house, a combination horse and cow stable, a hen house and straw sheep pen, and buildings are being erected on the grounds immediately surrounding the buildings.

This year, stated Mr. Mitchell, they have in seven and a half acres of alfalfa, planted in two crops; 14 acres of Idaho Russet potatoes; seven acres of wheat; three acres of barley and the balance in pasture and alfalfa. These crops this year appear to be a good average, and are indicative of the success of the Idaho project. There is, however, some variation as between the two patches of sugar beets and one patch appears extra good and the other not measuring up so well, explained by Mr. Mitchell as being due to the fact that the while fly has appeared slightly in the interior patch, which was also damaged some by the late frosts last spring. There is also some difference in the soil conditions of the two patches, he said.

**Sell at First Hand**—When Mr. Mitchell began his labors on the farm three years ago, the soil was in a run-down condition. The same crops for years past had been planted without any rotation and no attention had been given to fertilization. Hence the first year's operations saw a field of wheat that yielded 15 bushels of wheat to the acre last year, however, Mr. Mitchell succeeded in bringing the wheat yield up to 45 bushels per acre. From low tonnage the first year, the sugar beet yield of the 1929 season was better than 17 tons to the acre. The same is true of potatoes—the 1929 season saw an advancement from the first year's comparative yield to 130 sacks per acre and this year indications are that the yield will be 200 sacks or more. Five acres of potatoes this year has produced for marketing.

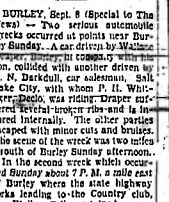

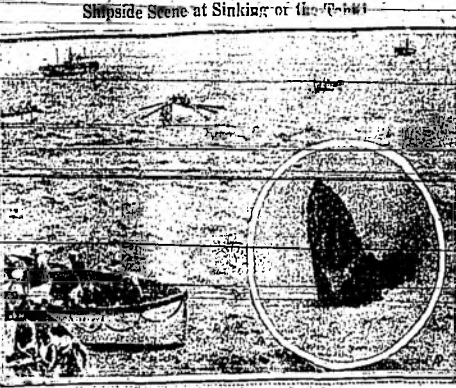
