

Frenchman Progresses With United States of Europe Idea

PUBLIC DISCUSSION OF BRAND'S UNION OF NATIONS STARTS

Representatives of States On Continent, Without Dissenting-Vote, Move to Appeal to League Body

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, Sept. 8.—A side branch's plan for an European federation went definitely into the state of public discussion today following upon the first session of the league of nations' council.

Without a dissenting voice, but after a long and warm discussion of methods, representatives of 27 countries voted to send their plan to the league of nations assembly, bearing their adheres in principle. Hence they adopted a resolution to effect and send Mr. Brand to place the whole matter before the league.

That means that before the close of the present assembly—scheduled to adjourn on Sept. 20—the plan will be made public, and explained in public the extent of the organization he deems necessary for real collaboration of European powers in world affairs.

The meeting of the European conference followed upon a brief and more or less formal first session of the league assembly at which the question of the "United States of Europe" was buried without any fireworks.

Hjalmar Preece, reporter for the mandarins, said that the British and French foreign ministers, Arthur Henderson and Georges Clemenceau, respectively, were satisfied with the plan. The conference, however, was adjourned as rapidly as the council agreed to the both the mandatory and non-mandatory votes of the committee would continue to cooperate toward the fullest measure of peace, prosperity and happiness for both Jews and Christians in Palestine.


