HISTORIC MATTERS OCCUPY ATTENTION OF MASONIC LODGE

Delegates Consider Move-
ment For Preservation of
One of Idaho Organiza-
tion's First Landmarks

IDHAHO'S Masonic Temple in Idaho, built in 1908, had, at second-day session here yesterday, had under consideration a move-
ment for preservation of one of Idaho's pioneer Masonic landmarks.

The first Masonic Temple in Idaho, built in 1908, is in Idaho City more than 50 years ago, is sad in need of repair, grand lodge members were told, and should receive \$10,000 in contributions with view to preserving definite action on the preceding today, the grand lodges referred to, com-



(By The Associated Press) BROOKLYN, Sept. 10.—For the second day in succession, the Chicago Cubs were shut out with five scattered hits by Brooklyn pitching and tonight the National League leaders found their grip on first place reduced to one game and a half over the Robins and the St. Louis Cardinals.

Adolfo Luque, 41-year-old Cuban, followed in the footsteps of the year before when he won the second of this game, going with the score of 6-0 to 6-in-addition-to-five, like Luque yielded four bases on balls, but, great surprise, he did not walk a man, and the Cub pitching scored at an incredible minimum.

The game was decided in the fifth inning when the Robins hit into Charley House with a savage drive and the leadoff man, after a sudden and frantic attack sent foot to the showers before he retired a man, hit the ball, and the firstinning and first started to launch a real assault on the Cub pitching.

Luque hit a line single to score Oberl and Herman. With Blasone's double, Jess Petty stepped into the lead.

Bubs Brester, Brooklyn fielding, had dulcified a finger making a play in the fifth, half of the game. Hendrick batted for him and lined his third pitch over the fence for a double, scoring Wright and Luque.

Petty pitched shut-out ball for seven full innings before he gave up in the eighth. But the Cubs over that stretch could make no impression on Luque.

NEW YORK. Sept. 10.—The stock market closed with a slight gain, the most of today's trading, but lost some of its energy in the last hour and closed irregularly. Activity of the market was limited by the effort to put into total sales within 20,000 shares of the 2,000,000-share mark, the largest volume since June.

All groups of stocks received attention from the professional bulls while the advance was under way.

Merchandise and utility shares were the most active, and the market strength was in those groups.

Stocks of prominent manufacturing concern moved higher, narrowly, although American Can, General Electric, Westinghouse, and General Motors were "up" as the final hours for the spot.

The important news of the day came from Washington, where a new long-term viewpoint from the longer term viewpoint was encouraging.

An A.G.A. weekly survey said that in the last two weeks there had been a decided increase in the industry's manufacturing activity, less production than in September.

Steel, aluminum, and copper prices were rising, and labor rates had risen 2.5 per cent.

Industrial reserve reports report that during the first three quarters the country had declined 11 per cent in August, compared with a year ago, failed to ruffle the irrationally optimistic market.
