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HISTORIC MATTERS OCCUPY ATTENTION OF MASONS LODGE

Delegates Consider Movement For Preservation of One of Idaho Organizations' First Landmarks

IDAHO'S Masonic grand lodge, at second-day sessions here yesterday, had under consideration a movement for preservation of one of Idaho's pioneer Masonic landmarks. The first Masonic Temple in Idaho, built at Idaho City more than 60 years ago, is said to be in poor repair and members were held, and a preliminary view of the structure, the grand lodge referred to its committee on accounts and finance, to make a preliminary estimate for a \$400 fund for restoration of this shrine of Idaho Masonry.

The grand lodge communication, attended by nearly 300 delegates and visitors representing 45 Idaho Masonic lodges, will close in following election and installation of officers.

Monday day sessions yesterday the grand lodge received and took action on the reports of the committees on appeals and grievances, relations of lodges, regular and foreign correspondence, leaving for closing day the work of the committees on jurisprudence, regulations, unfinished business, reports on accounts and finance.

One of Idaho's first Masons, David Mackley, Twin Falls, who in 1827 founded the lodge which Twin Falls Masons claim to be the oldest in the state, was a charter member of the Malley lodge in which he still retains the membership, was introduced by H. C. Deemer, Halley, at yesterday's forenoon session. He responded to request for recognition by the lodge by dealing with some of his pioneer experiences and associations in Idaho.

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Interest In Eight States' Primary Elections Centers In Result of Georgia Vote

Senator Coleman L. Blaise Gives Way to James F. Byrnes in South Carolina and Joseph E. Ransdell bows to Louisiana Governor White Harris Opposes Slaton

(By The Associated Press) WITH two Southern Democratic senators lost in the primary shuffle of Tuesday, interest centered today upon the identity of the candidates dealt in Georgia yesterday for the general election in November.

Senator Coleman L. Blaise gave way to James F. Byrnes as the Democratic nominee from South Carolina, while Senator Joseph D. Ransdell was bowing to the virtue Governor Huey P. Long in Louisiana. In Georgia, Senator William I. Harris was opposed by former Governor John M. Slaton. In all three states the Democratic nomination assured election.

In the two Republican primaries of Tuesday in which the senatorial incumbents sought re-election, they were successful. Henry W. Keating, who had been defeated in the primary in New Hampshire, was elected to the Senate by a vote of 100,000 to 60,000 against Governor Charles D. Gurnea. In Michigan, George J. Noyes, former Republican gubernatorial nominee, was designated in Colorado as his party's candidate in the primary to succeed Senator Lawrence C. Phillips, who will retire in March.

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Sept. 10.—The state department of agriculture today issued a report that Idaho would receive \$25,000,000 for its potato crop this year, a gain of \$5,000,000 over last year, as a result of the increase in the national crop indicated in the report of the United States department of agriculture.

At the same time increased profits to be made were predicted. Although Idaho crop figures were not available tonight, it was indicated on the basis of conditions a month ago the crop was improving. The gain in national production, according to John S. Welch, commissioner of agriculture, assures a demand for Idaho potatoes which will result in more profit.

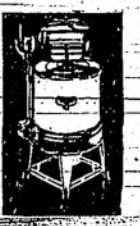

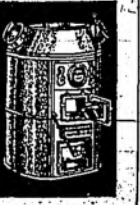

IMPROVE MOSCOW SCHOOL'S CAMPUS

Expenditure of \$30,000 Results in Improved Appearance of Buildings and Idaho University Grounds

(Special to The News) MOSCOW, Sept. 10.—Improvements which have been talked about for years have been completed this summer on the University of Idaho campus. A general improvement program outlined by Raymond W. Lind, superintendent of grounds and buildings, has been carried out. Expenditures have amounted to more than \$30,000, and although not completed, the improvements in appearance, Morrill hall boasts a new building erected, the general laboratory and office space for the college of agriculture and the school forestry.

Across from the Memorial gymnasium an ugly vacant lot has been transformed into a park. Ground borders the general building has been graded into green lawns, which will be ready for spring. A total of 12,000 cubic yards of dirt was moved in grading and landscaping.

Painting of buildings on the campus alone cost \$6000. Even the old heating plant and Lewis court are uniform in color with the Engineering building and many others. The new building, Mines building, Women's building, Richardson hall, Woodson building, etc., have been painted in a uniform color.

Two new barns are under construction on the university farm, one on the dairy cattle barn and the other a new sheep barn. The dairy barn will be ready for use in the near future.

Students returning early remark at the changes, commenting that the campus looks more attractive than ever. Registration for the fall semester will be September 18 and 17. But the arrival of the student section from southern Idaho on September 14 is really the opening of the year-for students.

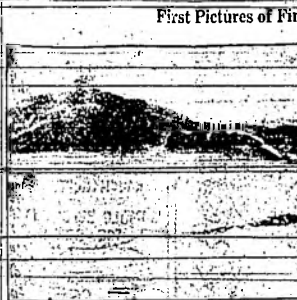

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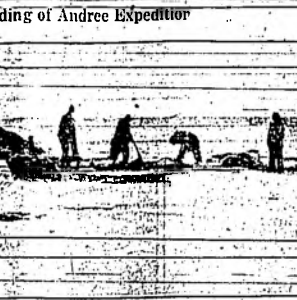

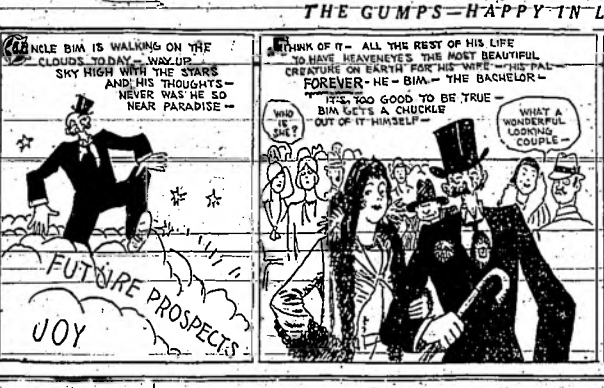
