34,000,000 VOTES DECIDE GERMANY'S POLITICAL DESTINY Task of Sifting Molley Array of Widely Divergent Groups Appears Gigantic Task of New Chancellor

Berlin, Sept. 15.—Now that more than 34,000,000 German voters have entered the polling booths with their mandates, it is up to somebody to sift this motley array of widely divergent groups in such a manner as to construct a workable government.

It is generally conceded that this will be no easy task, since 18 parties contend for seats in the Reichstag, and the two revolutionary parties, the German Socialists and the Communists.

One obvious lineup is to expand the present coalition to include the Socialists and the Communists, and mean the loss of 18 from the Farmers' League and the Live Cattle raisers.

This calculation was somewhat altered by the announcement that since the Socialists hitherto had opposed all the economic groups, financial demands the latter would prefer to enter a coalition with the Socialists.

It is this adhered to, Brüning will have a difficult situation for his cabinet. The right party composed of 107 Catholics, 41 German Nationalists, 10 Farmers' League, 10 Live Cattle raisers, 20 Socialists, 10 Bavarians, three Landsturm and 20 Economic, a total of 214 out of 330 seats, such a combination not only would be resented by the labor wing of the coalition, but would also mean a radical change in the foreign policy laid down by the late Dr. Brüning.

Whether the People's party, although preferring a bourgeois coalition to one with the Socialists, would support under such conditions and thereby saddle its dead leader, Brüning, is doubtful.

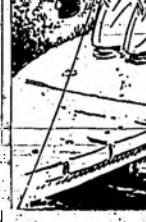

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—Excluded from France by government order, William Randolph Hearst returned today declaring he considered America to have a virtual monopoly on freedom of expression.

"If you tell the truth in France," he said, "you are liable to be arrested. If you tell the truth in Russia you are liable to be shot. If you tell the truth in England you are liable to be hanged."

"This is indeed the land of liberty, where there is freedom of thought and speech and of the press," he said, "and the only country in the world where the press is free to publish anything it chooses to publish."

While one man stood outside the bank with a sub-machine gun at his side, the others entered and seized \$44,225 and ten thousand dollars in cash.

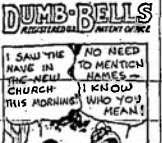

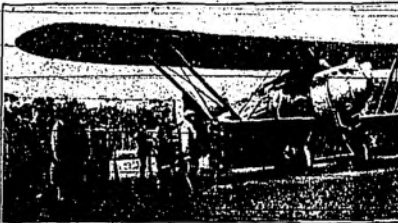

Fall Hurricanes Menace Nation from Mid-west to Maine

MAP SHOWS MANY POSSIBLE COURSES OF HEAVY STORMS

Chart Reveals Routes of 30 Winds from Over Area Since Autumn of Year 1887

BIG BLOWS FOLLOW NO DEFINITE LAWS

Vessels Along Coast of Nation Now Get Warnings in Time to Reach Port

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Bureau Editor) NEW YORK, Sept. 15



This map shows possible paths of September hurricanes that originate in equatorial regions, sweep across the West Indies and follow one of a number of routes into the ocean or across various sections of the United States.

The new hurricane map by the United States weather bureau shows that September storms are likely to sweep across the United States anywhere from the plains states of the Midwest to Maine.

The map charts the courses of 30 hurricanes that occurred in September since 1887, and was made by Dr. James Kimball, New York meteorologist, who signs weather courses for trans-Atlantic flights.

The chart shows the hurricane track shaped like a vast fan, larger than North America. It handles, the origin of the storms, come in westward from the Atlantic ocean near the equator, and widen a little as it crosses the West Indies.

The eastward edge lies out in the Atlantic near Bermuda, and it is on the Bermuda trail that many of the September hurricanes miss the United States altogether.

Some hurricanes sweep far northward and are directed all the way to Ireland. In interior United States they tend to cause torrential rains and usually high winds.

Shipping along the coast of the United States now has plenty of warning to each place of safety before a hurricane strikes. This year the United States weather bureau has 80 steamers that ply the Caribbean, the Gulf of Mexico and equatorial waters, all reporting the start and the course of hurricanes.

After one has been observed for a few days, weather forecasters usually can predict the remainder of its course.

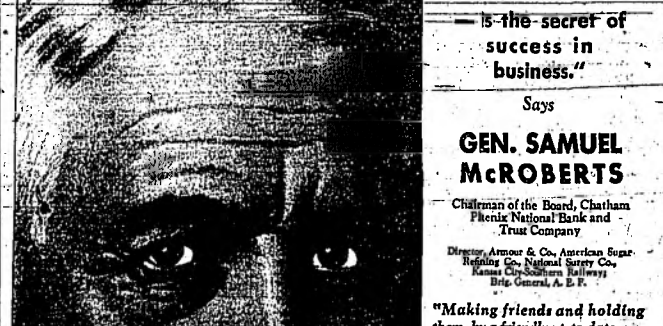

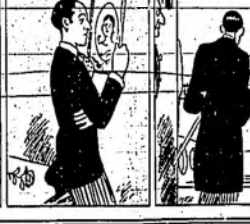

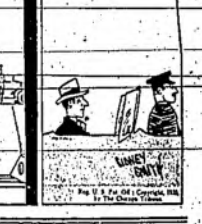

Trial of William Baraby, 42-year-old miner and construction worker, on a charge of kidnaping the six-year-old Loretta Cable, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Cable, in Twin Falls, Idaho, July 11, opened its second day here yesterday, the entire day's session being occupied with selection of the jury, which was completed before adjournment last evening. A special venire calling for 25 additional jurors was issued by Judge Adam D. Barclay early in the afternoon when the regular jury panel was exhausted, and the process of selecting the jury was resumed at 3 P. M. Four prospective jurors were removed by the court on account of admitted prejudice. Baraby exercised all his allotted challenges to remove six other candidates for the jury from the box, indicative of his attorney's desire to have the most competent challenges of jurors were waived by Prosecuting Attorney E. W. Larson.

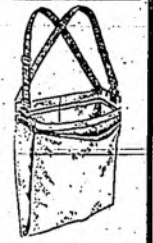
