34,000,000 VOTES DECIDE GERMANY'S POLITICAL DESTINY

Task of Sifting Motley Array
of Widely Divergent
Groups Appears Gigantic
Task of New Chancellor.

(By The Associated Press)

BERLIN, Sept. 15 — Now that more than 34,000,000 German voters have endorsed 676 fellow-citizens with Reichstag mandates, it is up to somebody to sift this motley array of widely divergent groups in such a manner as to construct a workable government.

It is generally conceded that this will be no easy task, since 15 parties landed seats in view of the extraordinary gains made by the two revolutionaries, the German Nazis and the Communists.

As often before, Chancellor Heinrich Brueining's Central party is in the most prominent position.

The Communists, who have been returned to the principal legislative house 68 strong — or eight more than in the previous election — are the other major party, followed by two possibilities presenting themselves shall be adopted.

One obvious line is to expand the Central party, which includes the Socialists, although this likely would mean the loss of 16 from the Farmers' League and the five Conservatives.

The other is to include the Economic party's announcement that since the Socialists had opposed all the Economic group's demands, the Centralists would prefer to enter into a coalition with the Communists.

UTAH REPUBLICANS NAME CANDIDATES

Party Nominates Representative—Don B. Colton for Fifth Time by Acclamation

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15 (UPI)—Utah Republicans today named candidates for all state offices, the names being submitted by the state supreme court, and adopted a platform that warmly endorsed the national administration.

The convention, held since it first was set to congress in 1928, represented. Don B. Colton was re-nominated by acclamation as the candidate for the 2nd congressional district. The chairman, Dr. E. T. Mills, Ogden, tendered him the nomination as a birthday gift, today being his 50th, and the 50th anniversary of his political debut.

Previously delegates from the second district had nominated Frederick C. Loudermilk to represent the 1st congressional district, who died in office. Mr. Loudermilk, a former district judge and attorney here, also was named as a candidate for the state legislature's unexpired term.

He received 31 votes in the nominating convention, to 48 for George P. Hartman, Salt Lake City, former City school board and for Nymphus C. Banks, blind lecturer, Provo.

The state convention named for the supreme bench justice Sylvanus Hansen.

State on Prohibition

Delegates endorsing the national Republican administration, the state platform professed the records of United States Senator Reed Smoot and Representative Colton; "it will reflect credit upon the nation if the Senate and the House of Representatives remain a part of the constitution, and the other two favored the constitution."

Rep. Colton, a member of the administration and of the tariff act was voted in the state convention by Senator Smoot. Warmly praising President Hoover, he predicted that the new president would know him for what he is, "and what the bonds of the senate have tried to make him appear to be."

He characterized the senators, to whom he referred as "members of his own party—who are Republicans only in name."

Senator Smoot and Representative Colton predicted Republican victory in state and national, declaring the people did not care by criticism of the national administration and of the tariff.

NEVER before have many by the United States weather bureau been shown that September storms are likely to sweep across the United States anywhere from the plains states of the Midwest to Maine.

The map charts the courses of 30 hurricanes of the first two weeks in September since 1887—and was made by Dr. J. E. Johnson, New York meteorologist, who plots winds, courses for trans-Atlantic flights.

"There records," says Dr. Johnson, "how the Atlantic has struck between the fifth and ninth meridians, that is, between north and south lines drawn through the mouth of the Mississippi river and Cape Hatteras."

Chart Like Fan

The chart shows the hurricane track shaped like a vast fan, larger than North America. It handle, the trunk, runs from the coast westward from the Atlantic ocean near the equator, and widens a little as it crosses the West Indies. It turns inland, curving northward and eastward. Its westward record shows storms striking the northeast tip of Mexico, heading into Texas and along distances west of the mountains, the Mississippi river and Cape Hatteras.

The eastward edge fits out in the eastern near Bermuda, and it is on the far east that many of the thunderstorms that make up the United States altogether.

Some hurricanes sweep far northward and eastward all the way to the Arctic. Others, though rare, they tend to cause torrential rains and usually high winds. Along the coasts they bring, in addition, oceanic spectacles like high tides.
