Shape Of Milky Way Indicates Presence Of Other Universes

PICTURES OF STARS OFFER NEW THEORY OF STELLAR GROUPS

Director of Harvard Observatory Proposes Idea Aimed to Clear Mysteries

MANY PHOTOGRAPHS GIVE INFORMATION

Celestial Organization Surrounding Solar System Appears in Cloud Divisions

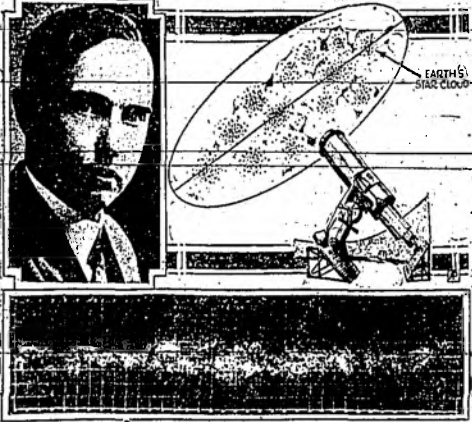

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 18.—Probabilities that elsewhere in space there are stellar universes like ours are increased by a new interpretation at Harvard of the shape of the Milky Way.

The idea is proposed by Dr. Harlow Shapley, director of Harvard observatory. It promises to help clear up a mystery that has puzzled astronomers. This mystery is the shape of our galaxy.

But, evidence is inconsistent with other modern discoveries that even out to the limit of observation everything is made of much the same substance as the earth and that the same physical laws prevail.

If this is true, what accounts for the swollen size and shape of our section? The explanation is that there is no such unique group of stars near earth. They have only seemed so massed because of comparative nearness and our incomplete analysis.

Now our stellar system is being separated into sections by information obtained from thousands of star photographs.

So it begins to appear that our "galaxy" the Milky Way as astronomers call the celestial organization surrounding us, which is so wide that light takes about 25,000 years to cross it, instead of being a somewhat continuous stream of stars is a group of star clouds, each one from 5000 to 40,000 light years in diameter. The sun belongs to one of these clouds, which is probably 5000 to 8000 light years across.

These individual star clouds have about the same size as galaxies observed elsewhere in the universe, thus conforming to conditions visible elsewhere.

There is a further conformity in the new sections. If our Milky Way is a group of star clouds instead of one single system, then it is as much like other, far-distant star clouds which can be seen at vast distances.

Quoting Dr. Shapley says, about a center located in the constellation Cassiopea. Our domestic group is now from a crowded area in the Milky Way, where star clouds seem to press the thickest in the direction of the constellation Sagittarius. That area appears to be a massive center of some kind.

COURT DISSOLVES DECED CITIZENS' ROAD INJUNCTION

Dist. Judge Doran H. Sulphien Rules Complaints Contained in Papers to Be Irrelevant to Issue

(Special to The News)

HURLEY, Sept. 18.—C. W. Thomas, attorney for the Durley highway district, has received notification from District Judge Doran H. Sulphien, Gooding, that the temporary injunction granted in the action against the highway district by the Durley highway district and commissioners of public works and commissioners of the Durley highway district seeking to prevent the re-entrance of a portion of United States highway number 20 to run through Hurley, rather than Declo, will be dissolved.

In dissolving this temporary injunction, Judge Sulphien granted defendant's motion to strike paragraphs 4 and 5 of plaintiff's complaint relating to the bonded indebtedness of the Durley highway district and the outstanding bonds being held against the property of Declo residents. The motion contended that matters to be irrelevant and immaterial and that they had no bearing upon the issue attempted to be made in the complaint. Paragraph 21 had also been struck under the court's ruling, this paragraph dealing with the property of the defendant.

The defendant was charged with having acted arbitrarily and capriciously and without regard to the rights of property owners owning property abutting on and adjacent to the old state highway.

The asking that the purpose of the complaint be stricken, the defendant contended that the same was sham and irrelevant in that the allegations contained in said paragraphs 4 and 5 of the complaint were not material to the issue.

Counsel for plaintiffs to have the right to renew their application for a temporary injunction should they file an amended complaint, which they may do, if they so desire, within 20 days."

It was indicated in the letter that copies had been furnished by Judge Sulphien to plaintiff's counsel, Charles A. Smith and John W. Graham, Twin Falls, and to defense counsel, Harold R. Thomas, to W. D. Gillis, attorney general and Fred Babcock, assistant attorney general, representing the governor and commissioner of public works.

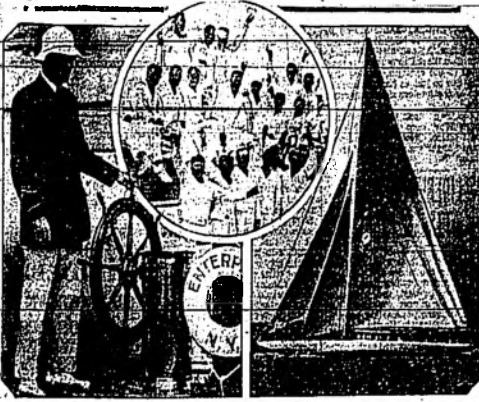

"Will the Idaho farmer be a party to this crying injustice? "I beg of you all, you farmers of Idaho, not to sell your God-given crops to any one man, or to any group of men, that are seeking to perpetrate this colossal injustice. Sell your potatoes as you have in the past, to different buyers representing the 'free trade'.

"Money isn't everything. Resist the temptation. Do to others as you would be done by. Then you may anticipate that the blessing of God

NORTH SPEAKS UPON FAMOUS DOCUMENT

Twin Falls Lawyer Traces Conflict of Two Ideals Leading to Civil War

"The Civil war was fought and won by Alexander Hamilton, John Marshall and Daniel Webster men whose names are still remembered."

Charles A. North, Twin Falls attorney, told the Twin Falls Kiwanis club in its weekly luncheon yesterday speaking on the Constitution of the United States in Constitution Day observance.

Mr. North traced the development of government from the earliest times to the adoption of the Constitution, touching on the conceptions of primary purpose of government, the rights of the individual and the other the promotion of order.

After North had been speaking, Mr. North said, Hamilton stood at the great exponent of a strong central government, while Thomas Jefferson, touching on the constitution, liberty extension of local self government. With Jefferson liberty was a passion. Hamilton believed in order and action. Washington, who recognized the danger of house on one hand and of too much centralization on the other stood between them and sought to keep what was best in the theories of Jefferson and Hamilton. He succeeded.

But the conflict continued, both in the field and in the subject of a national bank and that of the jurisdiction of the courts in determining whether state legislation

could or could not be declared unconstitutional. Chief Justice John Marshall upheld the right of the supreme court of the United States to declare a state statute void as being in violation of the national law of the land.

The rise of the slavery question, raised a renewal of the issue, with Calhoun and Wayne upholding state rights and Webster and Clay insisting on the supremacy of the national law. Out of this conflict of opinion grew the Civil war, which usually settled the question in favor of the union.
