

METHODIST BISHOP MAKES STATEMENT REGARDING CHARGE

James Cannon, Junior, Sends
Radio Message Announcing

Intention to Contest
Legality of Procedure

(From The Associated Press)
U.S. AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION, SEPT. 24.—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Church, made a statement to the Associated Press concerning charges recently made by Daniel W. Walker, president of the American Legion, that he had received from the Southern bishop since his departure some weeks ahead of schedule from Brazil. The statement follows:

"September 4. Upon previous instructions I received by cable from Washington, 'acting under paragraph 23, discipline' we also you notice that we are inquiring into your case." —Bishop James Cannon, Jr.

"Paragraph 23 says 'three traveling elders, after inspecting a bated breath, shall report their findings to the General Conference if they believe an investigation necessary and shall report the matter to the annual session.'"

"I desire to know the nature of the accusations."

"They (the three elders) called me into their room and gave me the right to confer and declining to express an opinion up to the date of my leaving Brazil."

"I immediately cabled a friend to see the elders, stating that under the circumstances I considered it improper for me to continue to participate in the meeting, and I was told that I was sailing on the first steamer arriving at Washington October 23, but will be at Washington on date specified after Cables."

"This gives you all the information that I have received and all which I have been able to learn."

"As indicated, I shall protest the legality of the hurried, premature action taken before my arrival, making no reference to the date on which the disciplinary provision 'to carefully inquire' necessarily includes."

"Until I see the official text of the convention, or receive a copy of the convention newspaper or otherwise, concerning any matter pertaining thereto,"
