## REPUBLICANS WANT TUTTLE AS EMPIRE STATE'S GOVERNOR

Former Federal District Attorney Wins Nomination And Runs on Repeal Platform...Condemning Saloon

(By The Associated Press) LBANY, Sept. 26.—Charles H. Tuttle, who came out of political obscurity three years ago with wide attention in the federal district attorneyship of New York City by his prosecution of O. Henry's officeholder for violations of federal law, was nominated today by the Republican party for governor of New York.

He was chosen on a platform to lead the most tumultuous demonstration at a Republican convention in New York—held—indeed—in 10 years, and his action in nominating Tuttle, he defined the issue thus: "We do have a governor who is bigger than Tammany Hall?"

**Fears Tuttle**

Fears that the party would come to a break on prohibition faded with the election of a new national chairman, phased in his own language, called for repeal of the Eighteenth amendment and substituted "prohibition, amending, defected Northern rebels on a wild front in Honan province, hurling them into their base at Chongchou. Blamed by Chiang Kai-shek, nationalists planned a long road from the south to the north, where demoralized forces care very little, but fought a sharp engagement near Chengdu before taking refuge behind the mountains.

BEAR'S PREVAIL ON  
MART FOR STOCKS

Drive Begins in Motors and  
Spreads Rapidly to Other  
Groups Leaving List Low

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—The stock market presented a bedraggled appearance again today. This time the bears waited until the last hour to start their drive which, starting in the motor stocks, quickly spread to other groups, leaving a long trail of 33 losses. Final prices were off at the bottom, thanks to late purchases.

Answering the questionnaire the following letter explains its purpose:

The Minidoka County Farmers Grange has sent a questionnaire to the following from you who are candidates for various offices in this state. We feel that our voters are entitled to know your stand on questions in order to be able to vote intelligent at the coming election.

Question number 1—What action have you for the present unequal distribution of the cost of our school maintenance? The valuation of school property in some districts runs into \$100,000 per pupil, while in some districts, to more than \$100,000 per pupil in others.

A state-wide school tax to aid in the support of our public school system?

Question number 2—Do you favor a state tax on luxuries?

Question number 3—Do you favor a constitutional amendment making it possible to change the present law to provide that each voter may choose his own presidential elector?

Question number 4—Do you consider the present school system on the whole satisfactory? If not, what specific changes would you propose to make it more satisfactory for the dairy industry?

# Ancient Tree Helps Little In Study Of Idaho Drouth Cycles

## IDAHOANS EXAMINE STUMP OF JUNIPER 10-CENTURIES OLD

H. O. Haight, Engineer of Twin Falls Canal Company, Works With Group Seeking Data on Dry Weather Eras

Rings on Trunk Proves Not Too Exact in Historical Information + Disagree With Other Records

(By the Associated Press) NISI, Sept. 26—Ancient trees tell archaeologists to determine the history of the Pueblos and what they ate for breakfast in 1563 but there is some question as to how much help they are in determining drouth cycles in Idaho.

Engineers in the department of geology and mineral resources made up the results of a study made by Ward L. Stevens, engineer of the geological survey, W. O. Smith, chief of the department, and H. O. Haight, engineer of the Twin Falls canal company.

Perhaps the most interesting discovery was that Idaho had until recently a tree ring which told it its way through the world's history, beginning at the time of Christ, to the present.

The tree rings indicate the old juniper, found in Filfield basin in 10 miles southwest of Idaho Falls, was 100 years old when it was felled more than a year ago when a rancher cut down the knotted and gnarled old snag for use as firewood. Heed Not Exact

It was thought the tree might establish a new record for longevity, because of the rings, showing a cycle of drouth every 10, 60 or 100 years or so. Geological information suggested that the tree rings were not accurate because of an unusual number of rings, 400, although generally believed to have been cut considerably earlier. It must be remembered, however, that the two trees were over 50 miles apart and on opposite sides of the lava flow, and differed in elevation about 1000 feet."

He suggested an extensive study of tree growth in the lava fields before the larger trees could be cut away. The results of this study, he said, should be correlated with similar tree records with weather records, sun spot records, records of ocean currents and recent geological events to discover if possible.
