NATIONAL BANKERS NEAR CRITIC FLAY TARIFF SCHEDULE

Minneapolis Financier Attacks New Act and Trains Fire Upon Advocates of Restricted Immigration

By The Associated Press. LEBANON, Sept. 29.—An attack on the tariff and immigration laws of the United States was delivered at the convention of the American Bankers' association today by John W. Barton, vice president of the Metropolitan National Bank of Minneapolis, and president of the national bank division of the association.

He said creating a high tariff and at the same time raising the wall against the immigrants is an inconsistent policy.

Mr. Barton advised that government stay out of industry, adding that "the only way to get industry to expand is to let it expand."

Neither should there be any restriction on the right of banking in any business, but bankers and business men should not be handicapped in their competition.

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DYNAMITE EXPLOSION KILLS TWO CHILDREN AND FATHER IN BUTTE

The committee's denial of the charge made by the woman senatorial nominee who has been under investigation by the senate committee, was signed by four of the seven members, two Republicans and five Democrats.
