NATION'S BANKERS HEAR CRITIC FLAY TARIFF SCHEDULE

Minneapolis Financier Attacks New Act and Trains Fire Upon Advocates of Restricted Immigration

LEVELAND, Sept. 29.—An attack on the tariff and immigration laws of the United States was delivered at the convention of the American Bankers' association today by John W. Barton, vice-president of the Metropolitan National bank of Minneapolis, and president of the national bank division of the association.

He said creating a high tariff and at the same time raising the tariff on imports is an income against the immigrant is an income against the nation.

"If the tariff wall tends to restrict our foreign trade, as I think it does, then we must have people to continue our exports," Barton said. "We further restrict immigration and at the same time we refuse to let in the foreigner who has no means of support in capital annually."

"If imports are limited by the tariff in buying from foreign countries, then we must have a large surplus of produce."

Announces Purpose

The announced purpose of a high tariff program is to increase the standard of living in this country by realizing a high tariff wall is established by the efficient methods of transportation and commerce, and most easily spread throughout the world.

Barton advised that government should not be allowed to lobby for any legislation of any kind which is absolutely unnecessary.

Neither should there be any necessity for the government to lobby for legislative bodies, but bankers and business men should not be backward of time in attacking detrimental legislation.

The general condition of banking in the United States is undoubtedly better than it has been since 1921, when the last major banking crisis came, and according to the president of the American Bankers' association, the banks are in a sounder basis now than it ever has been.

AUTHORITIES PROBE SLAYING IN CAPITAL

Police Announce Finding of
Evidence of Officer's
Use of Hatchet on Wife

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The body of Captain John L. Clegg, Colonel Richard O. Cressey of the marine corps had attacked his wife with a hatchet in the Mariner Hotel yesterday morning, it was learned, and a revolver was announced to-day by police.

Official sources said the tragic story of the killing of the marine colonel was discovered when police tests disclosed the heavy hatchet and 38 caliber revolver had been purchased by the marine officer from a gunsmith.

Instructor William S. Shibley, chief of Washington detectives, in answer to the question whether a marine investigation was under way, said one of "attempted murder and suicide."

Fights For Life

Meanwhile, the wife of the marine officer, with three deep hatchet wounds in the back of her head, was taken to the University of Washington Hospital. Attendants said she failed to regain consciousness during the day. Police awaited a statement from the doctor concerning the case before announcing the case definitely closed.

The body of the 40-year-old marine officer, who was second in command of the 10th Cavalry, was not discovered by attendants at the Mayflower Hotel Sunday afternoon until four hours after the tragedy had occurred.

When efforts by maid to open the door with ordinary key failed, maid called police who used

Mrs. Cressey, still partly conscious, was found one floor below a dead. Police photographs of the victim were not released.

The body was discovered face down 15 feet away, a revolver half under him, and the hatchet with which his wife had been hacked lying across his chest from his cut-down hand.

A considerable sum of money and jewelry was found in the room, together with railroad reservations to New York. The couple were to have departed Sunday morning for the coast via the Union Pacific.

Other members of the Cressey family, residents of Washington, however, were not present when the killing had been committed. They reported him in the best of health, and with no signs of any disagreement with his wife.

COUNCIL CONDEMN'S BIG POPLAR TREES ON EIGHTH AVENUE

Woman's Request For Speedy
Execution Only Express-
sion at Hearing on Or-
der; Finances to Fore

Twin Falls city council in regular session last evening ordered extensive tree removal on Eighth Avenue, 61 big poplar trees on the north side of Eighth avenue east of Blue Lakes boulevard that are deemed dangerous to life.

Last evening was the time set for hearing on orders previously issued to local property owners to take care of these trees should not be removed.

No one appeared in defense of the trees.

At the hearing, the council

met in front of whose dwelling plot of these trees were growing attended the council meeting and asked for speedier action.

"I would be afraid to stay in the house in a high wind with these trees overhead," she told the council.

At a recent whitewash, four big poplar trees in that vicinity were uprooted, falling between a house and garage.

Owner Get Option

Owners of property on which the condemned trees are growing may themselves remove the trees if they desire within the 15-day period set by the council.

Carl C. Chapman, city engineer, presented the statement made by two Ohio tourists to Dean Davis and Lawrence Blaney, employees of the city planning department, at the time the city will step in to cut out the trees, charging expense of same to the park department.

Council, in fixing fine for removal of the trees, also authorized a credit for bids on like tree-removal project.

On the motion of the city engineer, cutting out the trees and removing wood and debris cost \$2,000 for wood and debris only.

In event no suitable bid is received, park department workers will undertake the job.

The condemned trees are growing on the site of a canal, the action of the water has exposed the roots to an extent that the trees offer little resistance to a wind. T. Sander, engineer of the streets, said his investigation indicated.

Move in Cut Interest

Taking further steps toward reduction of the city's bill for interest on its outstanding bonded debt, council voted to issue a resolution authorizing A. E. Chapman, commissioner of finance, and G. M. Hall, city clerk, to invite bondholders to a meeting to be held at the city hall on October 10, at 7 P. M.

This deal is predicated on favorable bond market rates, and action of the council, at a previous meeting of the council, possibility was indicated of accepting a reduction of around \$100 in the city's annual interest bill.

Bonds listed for exchange are:

—Bonds, \$20,000, bearing 5% per cent interest.

Bridge, \$33,000, bearing 5% per cent interest.

Payroll, \$30,000, bearing 5% per cent interest.

Pavement, \$10,000, bearing 6 per cent interest.

Improvement, \$1,000, bearing 6% of this year's taxes to retire \$3,000 of these bonds, leaving the \$20,000 balance.

Interest on these bonds will retire these bonds as follows: Seven, \$4,000; bridge, \$3,000; pavement, \$1,000; repair department, \$1,000, bearing 6 per cent interest.

Call for Clear Way

In connection with discussion of bond market conditions, T. Sander, engineer of the streets, and public improvements, relaxed his demand for additional "clear way" space at the municipal waterworks plant.

"There is only 30-inches margin between production at the plant and the consumption of water in town," he continued, "so there is no opportunity for clearance. It takes all that we have to get along." The voter might turn down a bond issue for a "clear way." That is their privilege. But our responsibility continues until we've got a vote of confidence, so far as we have it, we have an opportunity to record their decision on the proposal."

Council last evening approved the application of Carl C. Chapman for permission to operate the Hancock hotel, this action following cancellation of the hotel's license by the State of Idaho. Chapman was here to see his case show cause last evening why her permit should not be canceled.
