By TED VOSBURGH (Associated Press Special Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Standing out in the midst of the big intercollegiate football which will be on in full swing throughout the country tomorrow are a number of games which transcend sectional boundaries and will go far toward determining ultimate supremacy.

For the second successive Saturday, Knute Rockne's stalwarts from Notre Dame hold a prominent place in the football schedule carries them against the navy in a big intercollegiate struggle in the big stadium at Notre Dame, Ind.




