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REICHSTAG LEADER CONTROLS PLAN FOR ECONOMIC REFORM

Dr. Heinrich Brüning Cleverly Takes Wind Out of Hitler's Sails in Address Before Legislators

(By The Associated Press) BRUNING, Oct. 16 (AP)—Chancellor Heinrich Brüning, outlining to the reichstag today the government's plan for economic reform, warned friends and foes alike in parliament that Germany must put her own house in order and cure some of her own ills before looking abroad for aid.

The active chairman of the cabinet took in the business of the reichstag and political confusion avoided any direct thrust at Adolf Hitler and his 100,000 followers. He did not mention Hitler by name in discussing plans for restoration of order for the full reichstag (officially "youngster" Germany) dependent with the president's consent.

Dr. Brüning cleverly took the wind out of Hitler's sails by pointing out that only after the budget had been passed could the reichstag discuss measures which, according to the treaty, Germany has at her disposal and exchange.

Under the plan, the chancellor clearly wished to convey a definite impression that he felt certain German creditors would not consider sending her a humanitarian unless they were convinced she was doing all possible in the way of internal economy.

Surprisingly enough, Dr. Brüning was heckled rarely by the Communist party, the only opposition occasionally were boisterous.

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German Fascist Leader Gets Big Feminine Vote for Party

HITLER WANTS NEW BERMAN STATE NOT GOVERNED BY TALK

Women Support Program Opposing President Von Hindenburg and Government

MOVEMENT WELCOMES BIG REPRESENTATION

Increases in Party's Membership by Aid of New Following Pro Phenomenal

MUNICH, Germany, Oct. 16—Adolf Hitler, leader of the German fascist movement, is one modern politician who gets a big feminine vote for his party by telling women that government is a man's job.

This 41-year-old bohemian with a flair for oratory and a reputation for bravado and recklessness in peace, has drawn women to the polls in numbers unapproached by any of his rivals.

Whenever he speaks in the recent campaign there was a large turnout of feminine voters, and a platform full of flowers expressing feminine homage.

Hitler's response to such enthusiasm usually was a remark like this:

“Well, it's certainly gratifying to see the women here with us. But do not expect anything from me. I am only here as a man's job.”

Other candidates up an aggregate of 600 women's votes in the Munich election.

The fascist national-socialist party nominated only men—and the women who helped elect Hitler to Reichstag membership by listening to his promises of a new Germany.

“What this fascist leader wants is nothing less than destruction of the German Republic,” said one woman.

Some Constitution. The methods we are permitted to use to suppress our enemies, she said, “are dictated by the constitution, but the constitution cannot dictate our methods.”

Hitler welcomed the increase of fascist representation in the Reichstag from 12 men to 105 in 1930 because the 107 votes are “another weapon we can use in our fight to establish a new Germany and restore the authority of personality.”

He wants to establish a new state with a “strong government” and which will give Germans some-thing to work for besides taxes and reparations payments.

And the bachelor leader of this modern government organization of brown-shirted-brown is the fascist color in Germany—might have made a name for himself as an architect but for the World War.

Fought in War

Born in Austria, Hitler came to Munich in 1912 to further his architectural ambitions. At the outbreak of war in 1914, he joined the German army. He volunteered for the Bavarian reserve infantry, but was wounded. He was discharged, but became an officer, was decorated, served after the German defeat in a high position. He finally re-entered civilian life in 1920, but with weakened eyesight he was unable to work.

Shortly before his discharge he had become interested in the national-socialist party. He soon rose to a position of influence, and in July, 1925, became its chairman.

By the end of the year he was a power with whom parties and politicians had to reckon and whose forces with General Ludendorff, then living in Munich.

Late in 1923 Hitler made his first sensational venture against the republic. With a force of 400 men he suddenly entered a beer hall where Gustav von Kahr, the Bavarian dictator, was giving a banquet.

He announced the Berlin government “overthrown” and a new national government elected. This was the first stage of a fascist “march to Berlin” was hailed “the next day by von Kahr's police. The marcher was injured, and Hitler, captured later, was sentenced to five years in prison.

Before Christmas, 1924, however, he had been released, but not until

many observers to predict, during this year's Reichstag campaign, that the national leader would lose part of his strength to the Hitler party.

But not even those who a few weeks later were comparing Hitler's destiny with Napoleon's thoughts of predicting he would increase his Reichstag representation 900 per cent in the September 14 election.

Lies Modestly

He himself lives modestly here in a six-room middle-class dwelling which he shares with a family of friends. In his leisure hours the country he uses a big car with a private chauffeur.

The national-socialist party pays him a salary, but his traveling expenses are not included, he says himself.

A year ago Hitler apparently had recovered much of the influence he lost when his Munich “beer cellar rebellion” collapsed. Mr. Colôr also promised that if the movement succeeded the revolutionaries would fulfill all international obligations contracted by the republic before the outbreak of the revolt, but not those arranged thereafter.

INVADES HEROINE

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 16 (AP)—News that Captain Juarez and 50 of the Brazilian rebel forces had entered the state of Juarez and now was marching on the capital was reported here tonight by Brazilian revolutionary leaders.

Captain Juarez, who was reported to have 10,000 soldiers after he had captured the state of Pernambuco last week, marched through the state of Amapa and crossed the Rio São Francisco into Sergipe yesterday.

He is the leader now for the capital, Aracaju, but his ultimate goal is the port of Bahia, which is the seat of northern federal troops under command of General Sampaio Cruz.

BREKIDERS SUBVERTERS

PORTO ALEXANDRE, Oct. 16 (AP)—The surrender of 800 soldiers of the federal infantry in the state of Minas Oerates and defection of large local forces to the insurgents were reported in an official rebel communique today.

The communique stated that a heavy concentration of troops was in progress along the Parana-Sao Paulo frontier, a region where the federal and insurgent armies have been gathering for the last few days for what has looked up as a major engagement.

While not stating the number of soldiers involved, the insurgents made the claim that 60 companies of federalist cavalry had gone over to the revolution.

The rebels further reported to have surrendered was described as the seventh infantry stationed in the state of Minas Oerates. Three troops were captured by the insurgents and their surrender was said to be without condition.

Reports received during the day told of scattered engagements along the Parana-Sao Paulo line.

News dispatches received in Montevideo said that a battle was being fought along this frontier, but no confirmation of this was received. These reports said the federal army had defeated the insurgents, inflicting 600 casualties.

While the rebels today were claiming progress in their campaign against the government, the official government statement said 1,000 troops of the forces on the Parana-Sao Paulo line were unchanged. The government also asserted that loyal troops were advancing on their objective in the southern part of Minas Oerates.

RIVAL TAKES POST LEFT BY GOVERNOR

Louisiana Chief; Likely to Go to Senate; Leaves Unexpired Term to Old foe

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16 (Special to The News)—Louisiana political battles may succeed Huey P. Long as governor of Louisiana.

Long, whose hectic political career has reached a climax by his victory for the Democratic nomination for the United States senate, is slated to go to Washington next March, for his nomination is considered tantamount to election.

His term as governor, however, does not expire until 1932. If he leaves the state to accept Governor Paul N. Cyr, one of his bitter political enemies of former years, will become chief executive.

If Long goes to the senate, he will have achieved the Washington goal two years after he was fighting for political office.

As a 35-year-old governor, he was lauded by impeachment charges a little more than a year ago.

Last June he took another job when his \$50,000,000 highway bond program failed in Louisiana legislature.

But long a hill tilly and proud of it, he followed that defeat with a campaign weapon and swept into the senatorial nomination, defeating Senator Joseph E. Ransdell, who has won the vote since 1913.

Then after a quick truce with political foes, he won another victory in a special legislative election. His bond bill and the feat of his \$100,000,000 program for roads, port improvements, debt forgiveness and schools passed without a hitch. The people will vote on the measure in November.

To make his triumph complete, the legislators withdrew the impeachment charges, outstanding since March, 1929.

WEST END MAN DIES SUDDENLY AT HOME

DUIKE, Oct. 16 (Special to The News)—Clinton Clifton LePurdy, 44, farmer of the West End for the last four years, died at his home here yesterday at 7 P. M. a few hours after a sudden attack as the result of stomach ulcers. His death was entirely unexpected, as he had not been ill previously.

He was stricken suddenly in a field near his home at the time he was working.

Surviving members of the immediate family are: Mrs. LePurdy, his widow; one daughter, Vera, and one son, Billy, 2. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. K. LePurdy, two sisters, are nearby and Mrs. LePurdy has two brothers, Howard and William LePurdy, all of Great Falls, Montana, and Charles LePurdy, another brother, Perry, Oklahoma, survive.

Mr. LePurdy came to the West End in 1926 from Great Falls, Montana.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church here. The time for the services will be determined by the arrival of his mother and brother, William, from Great Falls.

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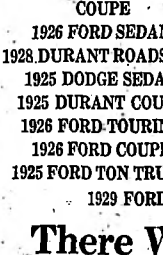

HEARST FACES SUIT BROUGHT BY BISHOP

Cannon Seeks \$5,000,000 In Damages From Noted Publisher On Libel Charges

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (Special to The News)—James H. Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, and malice the character of the present issue of the magazine today in a \$5,000,000 suit against the bishop filed against William Randolph Hearst, publisher of the Columbia supreme court.

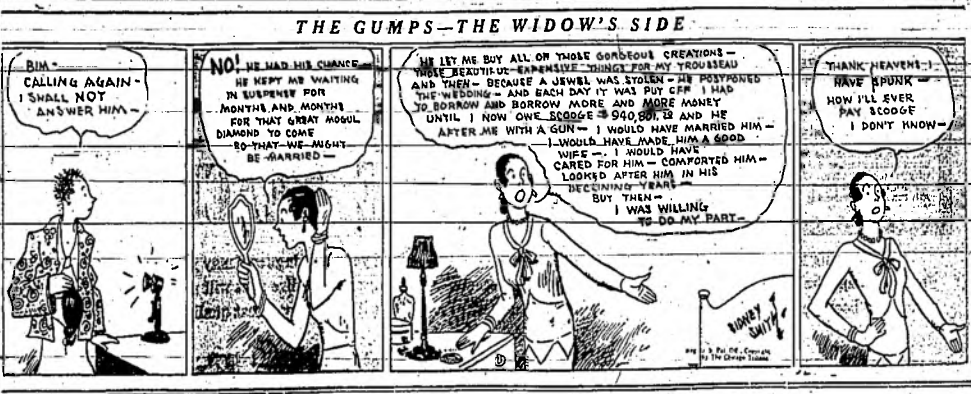
