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OAKLEY CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNORSHIP OUTLINES PROGRAM

John McMurray, Republican Aspirant for Office at Boise, Pledges Effort to Building Up Idaho and Advertising Its Values to the World.

(By The Associated Press) **B**OISE, Oct. 20.—John Oakley, Republican candidate for governor, tonight pledged his efforts to building up Idaho and advertising its values to the world.

In an address broadcast from station KIDK, John McMurray outlined his platform in his first public pronouncement since becoming a candidate. Taking up his subject under such heads as "lower freight rates, veterans' welfare, good roads, a sound currency," he said he had pledged himself to promote practices that he thought would prove particularly in the state.

"I am not of an advertising campaign to bring in only tourists but investors," he said. "The more people there are to pay taxes, the less the burden will be placed upon them. Our immediate and practical method of tax relief is to increase our population and develop our resources so that we can have people more properly to share the burden."

Calls Idaho Oasis

"Idaho is almost, almost alone in an oasis in the dry desert," he said. "It has been developed to a point where a crop failure is almost unknown, he said, but urged that the state "go forward with a determined effort toward its realization right now without plunging the state into bonds."

He made no mention of probation or parole, but under the head of "law enforcement" said simply:

"We'll have the feasions enforced, if not all of them."

Wensis Good Deeds

He promised continuance of a good roads program to the ultimate and the construction of a dam on the Snake River, which he said, "will cost next his dream." "In less than 10 days this year," such a program, he said, could not be effected at once, but "we'll get it started right now toward its realization right now without plunging the state into bonds."

Describing the fish and game resources he described as going hand in hand with encouragement of tourism, he said he had planned a "whole-hearted cooperation" of state fish and game department and the game associations in the protection and propagation of fish and game.




