John McMurray, Republican Aspirant for Office at Boise, Pledges Effort to Building Up Gem State

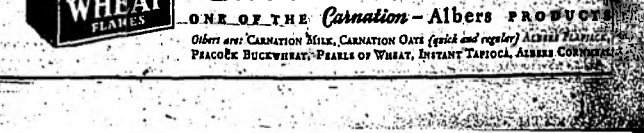
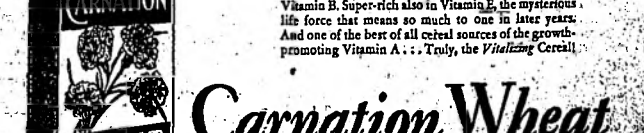
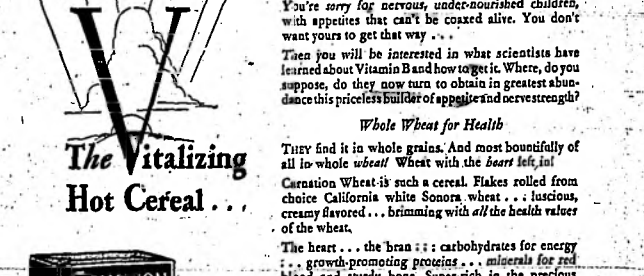

KIMBERLY SCHOOL DISTRICT LEADS IN WIPING OUT DEBT

auditor's Report Outlines Remarkable Achievement of Consistent Policy in Retirement of Bond Issues

(Special to The News) KIMBERLY, Oct. 20—Kimberly independent school district during the past nine years has reduced its bonded indebtedness to \$18,500 from \$185,000, and has had sufficient funds available to pay the same to reduce this to \$47,000, according to report of a two-year audit by County Auditor H. P. McCracken.

The report reflects an excellent financial condition in all respects of the district, the total assets of all funds combined amounting to \$1,035,140, including \$185,000 which the auditor asserts is "really not a current liability." Explaining this qualification, the report continues, "The last bond issue which remains unpaid amounts to \$185,000 and this is not due until July 1, 1931, but under an optional provision may be retired January 1, 1931. In conformity with the past policy of the board of taxing levies, in case the board desires to take advantage of the retirement provision."

The levy lowers. Unless extensive repairs or improvements are found necessary, it will soon be possible for the Kimberly district to make further reduction in its tax levies, which already have been lowered five mills during the nine-year period, as a result of the bond redemption program, according to assurance given to the auditor's report.

In May of this year the board practically eliminated a program of bond redemption which is unique in southern Idaho and perhaps in the state, and which constitutes a remarkable example of what can be accomplished by a long continued and consistent policy of intelligent investment and reduction of expense by the redemption of the principal of the bonded indebtedness.

A brief summary of the bond redemption program and what it has accomplished is both interesting and inspiring.

At the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1921, the bonded indebtedness of the district was \$185,000, consisting of the bond issues sold from 1908 to 1921.

At the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1929, nine years later, the total bonded indebtedness is \$18,500, and sufficient funds will be available to reduce this to \$47,000 by January 1, 1931.

This reduction has been effected from 8 to 10 years in advance of actual due dates and has resulted in a very great saving to the tax payers of the district.

Interest Toll Heavy. Few stop to consider the obvious fact that a bond issue which is paid in interest for 30 years, the usual life of the old type bonds, cost the tax payers just double the original amount borrowed if the interest rate is 5 per cent. If the interest rate is higher the cost to the tax payers doubles in less than 20 years.

shown briefly below and the figures are taken from the annual report of the amount of interest which the district has had to pay had the bonds been allowed to run to maturity.

As previously stated, in June, 1921, the total indebtedness was \$185,000, and the tax levies were \$1.50 per \$100 of valuation, then a legal form of investment, had been accumulated in the fund to the first of January, 1930.

In 1921 the first issue redeemed amount to \$100,000. From this point on, the sinking fund grew rapidly and bonds were either purchased or redeemed as the funds would permit. During the fiscal year June 30 to 1930 the sinking fund was \$100,000 less than the amount of the bonds which were redeemed and was increased by 14 1/2 per cent to \$114,500.

The most satisfactory and profitable investment of this district's own funds has been the purchase of its own bonds, which bore 5 to 7 per cent interest. These bonds were purchased in 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924, 1925, 1926, 1927, 1928, 1929, and 1930. The purchase of these bonds was carried as an investment as compared with the purchase in 1927. The purchase of the second half effected a saving of \$100,000 to the tax payers as compared with maturity dates of \$114,500.

Remarkable Accomplishment. At the close of this year the bonded indebtedness of the district is \$18,500, and the tax levies are \$1.50 per \$100 of valuation. This fact is a remarkable accomplishment.

Missouri Coach Practices on Squirrelsman on College Grid

Practice of Using Many Substitutes Receives Approval

Middle Western Mentor Finds Nothing Wrong With Contests Between Powerful Teams and Weak Squads

By EDWARD J. NEIL, (Associated Press Writer)

NEW YORK, Oct. 20—Out in the Big Six conference, where football teams would rather lose to a good eleven than beat a poor one, there are no controversies over the fairness of multitudinous substitutions or the practice of the mighty slaughtering the weak in early season games.

The problem out that is man power, according to Glenn Hoyer, coach for the last six years of Missouri Tigers. A team that has come East for three straight years in Missouri has a hard time getting a good eleven from New York University.

Hoyer, who coached at the University of Virginia, said that he has never seen a game or scored a touchdown in Missouri that was not a game of attrition.

"I've got a strong feeling," he said, "that the kid of football material you find in the East," he said before the game, "are an average of two years younger, on one thing, and they haven't the football back of the Eastern boys coming into college."

Football at Law Deb.

"Out in Missouri we can't pick and choose from the prep schools because high school football out there is the best. High school coaches in that section are poorly paid. Usually they are not paid at all, and they are getting something extra for handling the football team. They are not so much interested in the game as head high school coaches in the South, particularly in Texas, are very strong and hard on the game."

"It isn't unusual to find a freshman squad at Missouri of 150 boys and you'd think that such a good guarantee good team year after year. But 75 per cent of the good players are not before they're supposed to be sophomores and they're all young and inexperienced. The average 25 the East is a far better proposition because most of them will be seniors next year, high grade school coaches."

Amazed at Idea

Hoyer was somewhat amazed at the idea that there might be any question of sportsmanship involved and the untrained use of substitutes. "There's a great deal of talk about it," he said, "but I don't see how it can be anything but a practice game and we call it that and schedule it that way. As long as you're not going to use any of the men you are going to use all the men we have again a weaker team for the only reason being that we're not trying out combinations to see what works best. The same college doesn't want to use the same players they want to, I used 40 men in a game once and I didn't find out much about them."

Hoyer believes that over a period of years an out section of the country will prove stronger than another in the development of national champions. "The Middle West, he thinks, has had the best of the best for some time than any other region.
