MCMURRAY DENIES CHARGE MADE BY BOURBON IN BOISE

Oakley Candidate Freely Admits Riding in State Car Going North Anyway and Tells of Paying Gas Bill

AIRFIELD, Idaho Oct. 22.—Advised of the charge made against him by Chairman T. A. Walters of the Democratic state central committee that he used a state car in conducting his campaign in North Idaho, John McMurray, Oakley, Republican candidate for governor, denied the following statement: "I sat in the front seat. I went up to it. As the car was not returning, I did not return in. The sum total of my expenses was \$100, which is the amount of a car which would have made the trip without me. I might add, I paid for the gas."

DEMOCRATIC LEADER DETAILS GIVEAWAY

ROSE, Oct. 22 (AP)—T. A. Walters, Democratic state chairman, charged today that John McMurray, Republican candidate for governor, used a state car in his campaign expense, in his campaign through North Idaho.

The charge, which Mr. Walters denied, was made by Alford, who was in a public statement and was accompanied by the comment of the chairman that it was a clear case of "stealing from the people." WOMAN PROVIDES FOR FUTURE OF AGED CAT

Navy Board Drafts Building Plans Requiring \$650,000,000

EXPERTS COMPLETE WORK, ABIDING BY FIGURES IN TREATY

Program Extends Over Period of More Than Five Years and May Call For \$1,000,000,000 In End

(By The Associated Press) **TWIN FALLS, Oct. 23** — The navy general board today had completed a building program within the provisions of the London naval treaty to be submitted to Secretary of Admiralty for presentation to President Hoover.

Within the scope of the program were included prospective building and replacement plans in each category of vessels from submarine to battleship. This means that the building program of the navy will full treaty strength probably will extend over a period more than five years and cost between \$1,000,000,000 and \$1,500,000,000.

No indication has been given regarding the details of the construction plan or the categories in which the ships will be built. It has been on several occasions recently, Admiral William V. Pratt, chief of naval operations, has indicated that the new building program will consist of destroyers. It has been 14 years since a destroyer was authorized and none have been built since 1923.

Admiral Pratt's recent statement that the program calls for gradual "replacements" over a period of years in the 5-inch gun category has been interpreted to mean that the United States, at least, will allow the Japanese to keep their 8-inch gun cruisers of which it now has 70,000 tons armed.

Small Design
The board recently settled on a building plan for 1931 which places the total 1930-31 tonnage in the full category of the United States' completion of two remaining "Y" boats to be completed by 1933. It also will be completed by 1933 the 11 "G" boats which will not be over age at the expiration of the treaty. Within the 83,700 tons allocated to the United States, the program will call for the completion of the construction of the approximately 25,000 tons remaining which are over the age limit of 1913.

In the battleship division, board members have recommended that the 100,000-ton battleship be built in Mississippi and Idaho and the modernization of other dreadnaughts over the construction period.

The 100,000-ton battleship of the United States' long of 8-inch gun cruisers. Of that amount 140,000 tons already are built or building. One hundred thousand tons more must be built immediately. The three remaining ships of this category cannot be laid down until 1933, 1934 and 1935. They will be ready for completion in 1936, 1937 and 1938.

When it is completed the United States will have 70,000 tons of carriers to the Lexington, the Saratoga and the Ranger.

"Womanless" Library Appears Fruit of Founder's Life Study

Iowa Lawyer Makes Strange Will After Lifetime of Hating Women

Despite Unusual Bequest, Widow of Deceased "Philosopher" Declares Home Life Was "Ideally Happy"



T. M. Zink, Iowa lawyer, left his fortune to found a "womanless" library, but despite the fact that he gave vent to his hate of the other sex during his life his widow declares their life was happy.

LE MARA, Oct. 22 (UPI)—Mr. Zink's last thrust at women in general—the provision in his will for a "womanless" library—was not born of a momentary whim or personal irritation.

It was the fruit of mature deliberation, a life-time of study.

In the document which reeks to set up a monument of hatred, the Le Mara lawyer attributed "my intense dislike of women" to his observations of woman, observation of them and study of all literature and philosophy, full works.

The will provides that the estate, valued from \$35,000 to \$50,000, is to be held in trust for 75 years before the "men only" library can be built.

The municipality which accepts the bequest—the will provides after

natives—may not impose taxes upon it during the trust period.

Zink's widow, whom he will permitted to live in their home provided also paid a \$40 monthly rental, said: "We were ideally happy."

"He would not let me go and he didn't want to contact the will."

She knew her husband disliked women in business but said he always was "most gracious in them socially."

His private and professional life was stormy.

A few days before his death he was given a jail sentence for contempt of court and was sent to the state prison, dropped off after Zink promised to spend his time behind the bars in writing a digest of the cases in which the jury had been overruled by the judge.

After the death of his first wife and before his second marriage, the lawyer was threatened with a break-in and robbery. When he got home late one night, he became enraged, laid a blacksnake whip on a blanketed couch, shouting:

"That's what I'll do to that woman!"

Charges were filed but settled privately.

In a column which he wrote for a local newspaper, Zink frequently gave expression to his hatred philosophy in comments such as these:

"Nature created a woman to nag men."

"Love a woman and she instantly becomes your tyrant."

Zink had never embraced a religion.

His two sons were pallbearers at his funeral.
