### OPEN SEASON ENDS IN FOREST RESERVE

#### Total of 3500 Hunters Kill 613 Deer in Five Days in Twin Falls County

Open season for deer closed for the Minidoka forest reserve in Twin Falls county last night. In five days after more than 600 deer had been secured by the 3500 hunters who participated in the hunt which began Monday morning.

We have not an absolutely accurate check yet, said G. E. Jensen, forest supervisor, at Shoshone Basin last night. But the number of deer taken was 613. The total number of hunters about 3500, which is approximately the number of licenses issued.

The check of hunters at the largest station was something more than 2000. The number of deer checked at the next largest station was 120, at the next largest station, and at the third station, 100. The number of deer checked at the fourth station was 100.

It is difficult to estimate the number of deer remaining in the forest in this county at this time. Mr. Jensen said, "but it would probably be in the neighborhood of 30,000 deer in this county and a few in Nevada."

Three deer went out yesterday, and four deer were taken Thursday evening, since nobody so far as I can learn, saw a live deer yesterday. There have been few hunters out here today and what deer there are left are hiding quietly in the timber.

There are probably 1000 deer in the Minidoka forest reserve outside of Twin Falls county. This is somewhat below normal, but in spite of all precautions taken there has been no serious poaching since the close of the season.

Figures are necessarily only estimates. Last year there were fewer hunters, he said, "but the number who took part in the 10 days was not so closely checked. On the other hand the number of deer available at the opening of the season last year was greater than this year. So far as I can learn there was no serious accident during the season."

### OFFICERS APPREHEND DRIVERS NEAR BURLEY

BURLEY, Oct. 24 (Special to The News)—Traffic officers have been carrying on a campaign against auto traffic violators in the neighborhood of Burley recently, and have caused many to make trips to the chambers of Probate Judge S. M. Wright, where they have been assessed light fines.

Of late, T. J. Oeckner, Twin Falls, and R. J. Miller, Burley, have taken in the campaign, writing pass-books. 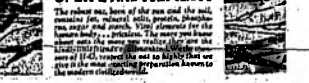
