

Washington State Defeats Oregon Beavers by Score of 14-7

**32,600 Persons
Jam Stadium to
See Close Game**

Pullman Machine Continues
March Toward Champion-
ship of Pacific Coast
Conference, Winning 14-7

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 1.—
Pittsburgh's college
Cougars were crushed over-
throwing Oregon State
Beavers 11 to 7, today to
continue in the lead for the
Pacific coast conference foot-
ball championship. Spectators
numbered 32,600.

But it was only through
two brilliant stands in the 3-yard
line that the Crimson captured
the game after 90 minutes of fear,
partly through their own mistakes
and partly through the partly
wasted attack put into play
by the Beavers.

Washington State gained the first
of its two touchdowns in the 3-yard
line when the Crimson failed to
get off the ball on the fourth, and
Ellington reeled around, lets and behind per-
fect interference, to cross the Oregon
goal line. The small place
kicked the try for point.

This ended the scoring until the
first period when Oregon State had
a fumble and the Cougars recovered
and a substitute end, Floyd Root,
completed a 30-yard forward pass
for a touchdown.



The frantic efforts which the Democrats have been making to gain control of the national legislative bodies have been concentrated largely upon a capitalization of the depression and there is no doubt that there are many voters who are always willing to listen to such forms of propaganda, absurd as they may seem to thinking people. But the man who believes that while the Democratic administration will gain some seats in both branches, the Republican majority will remain intact.

The time worn adulation of Abraham Lincoln, "Dad's a good boy in the middle of the stream," is still applicable.

The Democratic campbellites would have us believe that the Republican party is responsible for the country's economic situation.

The fact that leading Democratic newspapers, most severe critics of the Hoover administration, have refused to take this view in itself is a commentary upon the sincerity of Democratic leaders in reaching this gospel, but even if one grants that the campaigners are sincere and really believe themselves that the depression is politically, rather than economically based, it is difficult to see how they can hold out any hope for bettering conditions by electing a Congress which would be hostile to the administration and naturally work at cross purposes with it.

There is a reason why the nation is in the depression it is broken and the depression which President Hoover has taken certainly has been a potent factor in accomplishing it.

Should the unexpected happen and the Democrats gain control of the senate and the house the Statesman predicts that this country will experience something more than depression, an actual panic, with industry running for cover for fear the Democratic meddling with the tariff will make bad conditions many times worse. In other words, all the confidence which business has been building up and which promises an early return to normal conditions will be dashed over with a wave of the hand.

"A serious problem affecting the whole world is that of unemployment," says Senator McMurray. The Capital News has repeatedly pointed out that so long as this state refuses to advertise its resources, its opportunities, its climatic and scenic advantages, it can expect to show little increase in population, less industrial development, and a continued increase in tax burdens that the few must bear instead of bringing in more people and industries to help give relief.

In an address at Idaho Falls this week, John McMurray, Republican candidate for governor, said: "The time is right for the launching of an advertising and publicity campaign to attract the high grade of citizenship which we need." He advocated conservation of our water resources; to give every farmer a full water right. He urged advertising Idaho's magnificent scenery to attract tourists; he pledged himself to greater development of our highways, particularly our market roads.

"The eastern farmer," said Mr. Murray, "is tired of facing annual droughts, cyclones, blizzards and other freaks of weather, when he learns of the true conditions here, will hurry to dispose of eastern holdings, and come west, to bring new and diversified interests to our farmers, to extend still further the range of our specialty crops in which we already command a premium."

Idaho must look forward to greater growth and greater development. To get these, it must have a constructive building program. If there ever was a time in the history of this state when it needed constructive leadership, it is now.
