Pullman Machine Continues March Toward Championship of Pacific Coast Conference, Winning 14-7

PORTLAND, Nov. 1.—The Washington State college football team today defeated the Oregon State college Beavers, 14 to 7, today to continue in the lead for the Pacific coast conference football championship. Spectators numbered 32,600.

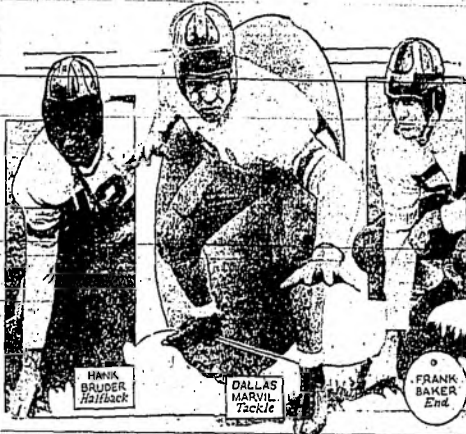

It remained for the Westerners to pull off the most spectacular play of the game in the final period when they averted a shutout by tallying a touchdown and kept the Army from adding to its total.

He is an exceptional passer and punter and a terror in a broken field, specializing in long, weaving runs.

I have received splendid help and cooperation from the sheriff's office and police department and county attorney. I have avoided unnecessary inquiries and the expense of same to county, also autopsies are ordered only when advised by county attorney or sheriff.

A qualified undertaker is the only person or organization having equipment and ability to meet the sudden emergencies of accident and death.

During my term of office I have investigated thirty-nine violent deaths, as follows: one murder by shooting; four suicides, two by shooting, one gas and one poison; four electrocutions, by coming in contact with live wires; three were burned to death; three were killed by train; two from fallings on mine accident; eleven were killed in automobile accidents; and ten from sudden heart failure, where no physician was in attendance.

I wish to call the attention of our people to the fact that the hazards under which we live daily are greater than the hazards of the two years of war.

In conclusion; if I have conscientiously and faithfully performed the duties imposed upon me when I assumed the office of county coroner two years ago I ask the support of the voters for reelection to this office on November Fourth.

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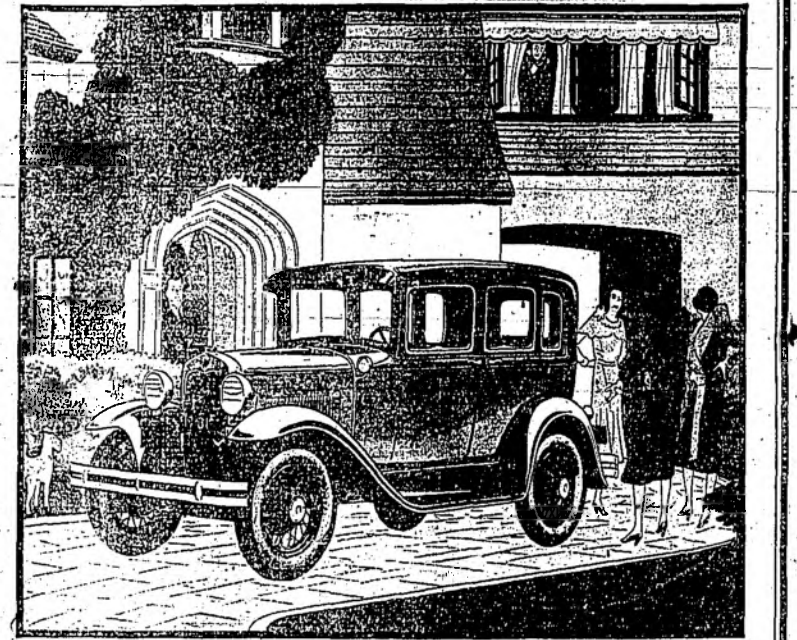

GANG'S HELMISMEN APPEAR MARKED BY OPPOSITION GUNMEN

Few Chieftains of Gangland "Cheat Coroner" During Years of Warring Activities.

DEVOTEES OF KIPLING MAN MACHINE-GUNS

Series of Killings Extends Over Long Period Since Murder of Founder of Gang

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Few leaders of Chicago's North Side gangster "mob" have cheated the coroner.

First it was Dion O'Banion, the "mob's" founder, who was shot to death. Then Edw. "Hymie" Weiss, Vincent Drucel, the Gusenberg and a score of others went the same way.

Now Joseph, eldest of the four Alzola brothers, has been killed, and Pat Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney, said Joe Alzola's death "the last means that endangers Al Capone has been eliminated."

Machine gunners, who sat beside their "speakeasies" for several days, reading Kipling's "Soldiers Three," finally got Alzola in their range. The coroner counted 20 wounds.

Four years before, trigger men walked in a room overlooking O'Banion's flower shop for Weiss.

Bullets Chipped Coroner's Horn and three companions chipped the corner stone of the holy name cathedral which bore the legend: "In the name of Jesus every knee should bow in heaven and on earth."

Alzola was murdered as he left a friend's home. In his pocket was a letter to Brownville, Texas. Police said he was to have been arrested.

Once before Alzola had fled. A gangster had demanded the Alzola had hired him to kill Capone and Antonio Lombardo, president of the United Sicilians.

Alzola was arrested, but was released the next day and was out of Chicago 18 months, returning only when Philadelphia locked up Capone.

MANILA, Nov. 1—How to keep down the number of Japanese coming to the Philippines is occupying the attention of both the executive and legislative departments of the island government.

The Japanese have entrenched themselves in the Davao hinterland districts of Mindanao, their number here being estimated at from 100,000 to 150,000. They already control through lease, most of the desirable land there and in their present conditions, it will be only a few years before the Philippines will be in the hands of the Japanese.

Fear Outcome
They have agreed that the islands are inclined to the newcomers for changing Davao from a virgin land into one of the finest agricultural sections in the world, but that does not ease the official misgivings of the legislature.

The problem is difficult because an exclusion law would be out of the question. The most that can be done is to limit the number of Japanese coming to the government areas to the extent of an alien land law which would prevent the Japanese from getting title to the lands they have leased.

Fear Complications
Another phase of the situation that is keeping some officials awake at night is the possibility of numerous international complications. The sugar Davao tribes have been stirred to public back by the Japanese in various ways and the establishment of new plantations. The land has been taken from time to time and they have tended their displeasure by attacks upon the members of some of the tribes.

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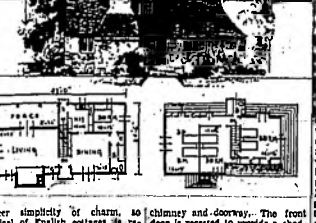

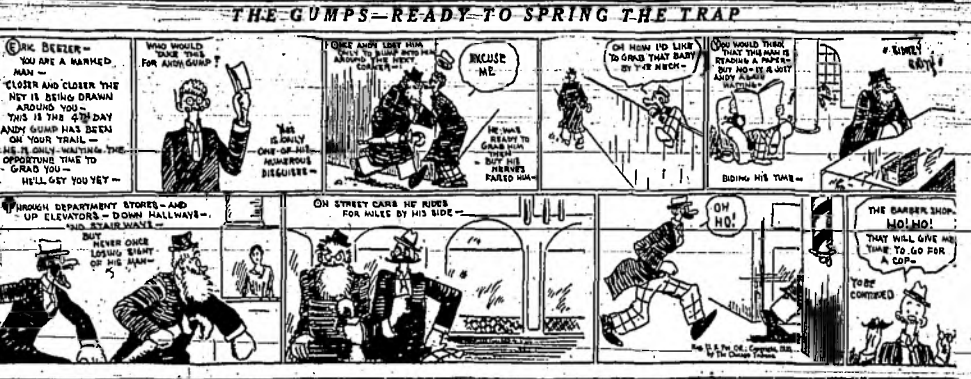

DEMOCRATIC SPELLBINDERS.

The frantic efforts which the Democrats have been making to gain control of the national legislative bodies have been concentrated largely upon a capitalization of the depression and there is no doubt that there are many voters who are always willing to listen to such forms of propaganda, as long as it may seem to inhibit persons. But the Statesman reiterates its belief that while the Democrats undoubtedly will gain some seats in both branches, the Republican majority will remain intact.

The time worn admission of Abraham Lincoln, "Don't let a few houses in the middle of the street," is applicable.

The Democratic campaigners would have us believe that the Republican party is responsible for the country's economic situation. The fact that leading Democratic newspapers, and severe critics of the Hoover administration, have refused to take this view in itself is a commentary upon the sincerity of Democratic leaders in reaching this goal, but even if one grants that the campaigners are sincere and really believe themselves that the depression is a political, rather than economically based, it is difficult to see how they can hold out any hope for bettering conditions by electing a Congress which would be hostile to the administration and naturally at cross purposes with it.

There is reason to believe that the backbone of the depression is broken and the measures which President Hoover has taken certainly have been a potent factor in accomplishing it.

Should the unexpected happen and the Democrats gain control of the senate and the house the Statesman predicts that this country will experience something more than depression, an actual panic, with industry running for cover for fear the Democrats meddling with the tariff will make bad conditions many times worse. In other words, all the confidence which business has been building up and which presages an early return to normal conditions will be knocked over with a wave of the hand.
