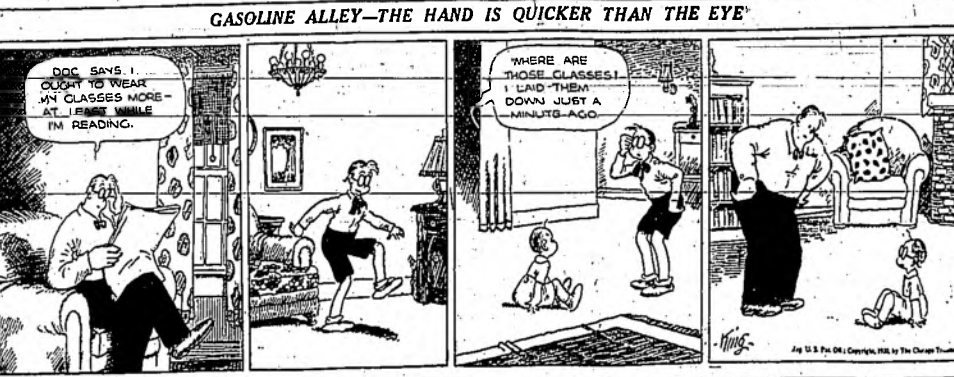

### COMMISSIONER OF WATERWORKS ASKS FOR MORE STORAGE

#### Council Takes No Action On Recommendation For Vote on \$90,000 Bond Issue For Clear-Well

Along with a review of Twin Falls municipal waterworks operations during the past eight months, showing 28,000 feet of iron pipe laid at total expense of \$23,228, Thomas Sanderson, commissioner of streets and waterworks, submitted a report to Twin Falls city council last evening a statement outlining need for increased storage capacity in connection with the waterworks system.

In support of argument that additional storage would be a notable improvement of the city's water supply, the commissioner laid before the council a letter written by J. L. Walter, former Twin Falls city chemist.

Council members at once entered into spirited discussion of the commissioner's recommendation, and there was indicated no unanimity of opinion on the subject, and no action was taken in respect to the commissioner's proposal for a \$90,000 bond election.

"We will do nothing at all about it without the advice and counsel of our attorney," said Mayor E. H. Miller, declaring that he would not support the bond issue.

Here is Commissioner Sanderson's report:

The water department, during the season from March 1, 1930, to November 1, 1930, has laid 6,075 feet of 4 inch iron pipe, 1,135 feet of 3 inch iron pipe, 9,064 feet of 4 inch iron pipe, making a total of 18,274 feet of iron pipe laid this year.

The cost of pipe, valves and fittings is \$3,504; labor, \$7,250; making a total cost of \$10,754.

Since money available is \$10,000, we then have a total of 7,000 feet of wood pipe left to be replaced. Out of this year's appropriation, we will have funds available to lay 5,000 feet more of iron pipe, leaving 2,000 feet to be completed out of next year's budget. There is a total of 14,274 feet of replacement wooden pipes. These pipes were re-banded with 3/8 inch two-piece repair bands and should have a life of eight years without fixing any trouble.

This season's replacement, with iron pipes under the supervision of E. L. Barboun and his assistant, John Heron, has been done in a highly efficient and economical manner.

"We still have the problem of a clear well or storage basin at the filter with the rise in the water increasing. It is becoming more and more urgent that we have added storage facilities. As conditions now exist it is impossible to give the filter plant a proper and thorough cleaning. This cleaning should be done at least once a week during the hot months of June, July and August, in order to eliminate as much as possible of the algae in the water. This is impossible to do without a storage basin, as the filter plant would have to shut down in order to do this work properly. Also, the advance of 24 hours storage would give the water a chance to cool off, and there is no doubt but that the clarity and taste would be greatly improved.

The fire hazard should be given some consideration, also, there is always the possibility of power being shut off or a break may occur in the main, as we well know the filter plant is hard to clean.

Consumption Increasing

The consumption of water is increasing more rapidly than in previous years. There are now an average of 50 permits for water taps granted each year. Without this added storage it will hardly be possible to get through another season without raising the water for drinking purposes, as I have stated in a former report, the same amount is still being used and written up that we should and must have a clear well. I believe it is a long-sighted policy to deprive the water department of this necessary equipment.

There are probably a number of people within the city that have some hopes of securing some other source to supply the city with water. Engineers have surveyed and investigated these sources, but their report has invariably been unfavorable. The most source is drilling wells in the north-south of the city, but this source likewise is more or less of a pipe dream. Even admitting the possibility of such sources the storage of water would still be a necessity.

Recommend Bond Election

"I earnestly recommend that the city council call a special election to vote bonds for this improvement with the refunding of the city bonds. We have evidence that the bond market is the

most favorable that it has been in years, this election it called should be called as soon as possible; if this election should be favorable to the bond issue, the time is none too long to get the preliminaries out of the way and to build and complete the storage tank in time for use during the coming season.

If the taxpayers of the city could see fit to defray the bond issue, that is their business and privilege. The city engineer, in his preliminary survey has estimated the cost of a clear well with a capacity of 4,000 gallons would amount to \$10,000, with the heavy cost of laying iron pipe practically out of the way. The earnings of the water department will be able to take care of bond interest and sinking fund, even though we reduce the minimum monthly water rental to the former schedule.

"This morning, the Canal company shut the gates in the canal and they will be closed for three days. Our storage supply of water in the canal will probably last for that length of time, but should the canal company, for any reason, be delayed in opening the gates the situation might become serious. This further emphasizes the fact that the water department is in need of storage water.

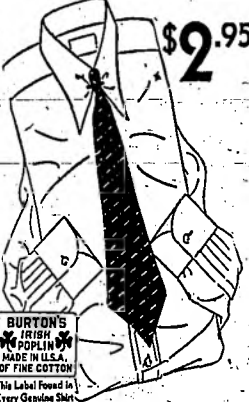
