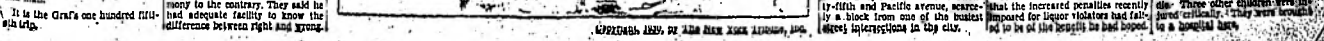

CLOSE CONTESTS IN COUNTRY'S VOTE PROLONG CANVASS

Commissioners Check and Re-check Count of Election Returns; Dr. H. N. Lette Wins With 4-Vote Margin

Twin Falls county commissioners on their return to the county building last night, after completing their canvass of the votes cast in Twin Falls county at the general election last Tuesday, checked and double-checked the results of the official canvass as finally given out by the county clerk. The canvass of the returns was completed on Wednesday, with a margin of only 14 votes, Dr. Lette polling 249 and Mr. Drake 235 votes.

Beginning with Twin Falls and dual precincts and continuing down the list in alphabetical order the tabulation showed first one candidate and then the other first elected and in all precincts had been voted and then re-voted that the result was final.

Another close contest was recorded in the race in which Dr. Lette defeated Dr. H. N. Lette, Republican candidate for re-election by a margin of 73 votes.

The official canvass gave to Senator Doran, who carried all precincts by a handsome margin, a total of 1835 as against 1838 for Joseph Tyler, Democratic candidate for United States senator.

Congressman Addison T. Smith, Republican, re-elected for a tenth consecutive term, polled over 4000 as against 3703 for W. F. Alworth, Piler, Democratic candidate, and carried all precincts in the county except Bull 1, Dull 3, Deep Creek, Piler, Lawrence, and Maria. It was the congressman's closest contest for this county's vote in his entire career.

John McMurray, Republican candidate for governor, received in this county 2346 votes as against 1601 for C. Ben Ross, Peckinpaugh, Democrat, who was swept into the governor's chair.

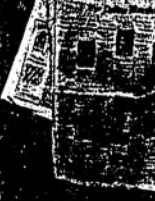
