News Flashses

Western Road's First Conductor Passes On

RED LODGE, Mont., Nov. 12 (AP)—Fred Swettman, 59, whose varied career included the diamond business, the lumber trade and as Pacific Railway company conductor, died here today after a long illness.

He was a conductor for that railroad for 30 years, when the first rails of its track were laid near Duluth, Minnesota. For many years he was the person of the first word to greet the passengers at Red Lodge.

Swettman once accused Gen. Ulysses S. Grant of refusing to use the general's private car while the president was en route to the West.

Later, while hauling supplies to Klondike, Swettman was one of the first to return to arrive at the Custer battlefield after the massacre.

Collapse of Building
Burleson Many Persons

LYONS, France, Nov. 14 (AP)—A number of houses were leveled by the ruins of old houses in the St. Jean quarter which collapsed about midnight. Efforts are being made to extirpate the victims who, it is feared, are numerous.

The collapse is believed due to undermining of foundations as a consequence of heavy rains.

One building, six stories high, fell against an adjoining building, which also broke down under the strain.

Twelve persons and several persons were injured, but the number of victims when there was a further collapse and they in turn were buried.

Cries of the victims could be heard outside the ruins.

The buildings crumbled, none had been removed from the debris.

**Granges Want Boise
Valley Roads Oiled**

BONNE, Nov. 12 (AP)—Furman Grange, president of the state, has recruited the department of public works through resolutions to oil all state roads 150 miles of market roads in Boise Valley, Commissioner C. H. Wood, state public works director, said yesterday.

The resolution pointed out that the Boise Valley was the largest producer of oil in the state, and that the collection of the state, contributed most to the gasoline tax, and yet had only 60 miles of state highway in the valley.

Commissioner Wood said an extensive system of market roads had been worked out for the valley.

HEAR TABER PLEAD CAUSE OF FARMERS

Sixty-Fourth Annual Conven- tion Opens in New York With Keynote "Equality For Nation's Agriculture"

ROCHESTER, New York, Nov. 12.—With the keynote "equality for nation's agriculture," the sixty-fourth annual convention of the National Grange opened here today. Delegates from more than 30 states heard National Master Louis J. Taber in his annual address urge a program which included better farm credit, regulation of meat packing, a national milk control, grain storage restriction and a more justly distributed system of taxation.

Mr. Taber's address sounded a note which will bring more than 2000 delegates and visitors to Rochester.

The Grange master offered a program which he said was needed to help agriculture establish itself on a firm economic basis. They were:

1—Stabilization of values.

2—Higher price level for farm commodities.

3—Justly distributed system of taxation.

4—Extension of the federal farm

Cuban—Immigration—Authorities Refuse Evangelist Permission to Land

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 12 (AP)—Ammie McPherson, whom Cuban immigration authorities refused to allow to land here, has been given permission from Pan American under the fictitious name of "Dolly Adams," remained aboard the S. S. Tidesight yesterday.

The evangelist was indignant with the Cuban officials over her refusal to give up the power of the ship.

Miss McPherson insisted that her name was Adams but did not further identify herself under that name.

She previously had issued instructions to the ship's officers to let her go ashore and she left Tides docked here, "regardless in her cabin with a group of friends."

Pan American said Miss McPherson had enjoyed the trip up from Panama, even posing in the uniform of the chief engineer for amateur photographers. She refused to pose for the press photographers, however.

She told immigration officials that she would remain on board until she could get into New York or Miami, wait over Christmas for New Orleans tomorrow.

tions and special privileges may be taken away.

The Democratic statement was issued shortly after the election and gave the impression that the party would not obstruct the administration on constructive legislation. It was signed by two party leaders, Rep. John W. Davis, of Arkansas, and Rep. Representative Orman, Texas, Chairman Rankin and Joseph Shantz of the Democratic National Committee, and the three party presidential candidates, James M. Cox, John W. Davis and Alfred E. Smith.

"We have reached the rank of a party leader and being unable to speak for any other senator, perhaps we should not venture to comment at all on the election," said Cox, putting aside the question as to the right of an undegraded group of gentlemen great or small to pledge to a party what it had no right to in Congress. "It is a properly devised course of action, I confess to some shamedness that anybody should feel impelled to apologize for an unimportant numerical victory at the election" or could even feel constrained to attempt a justification.

"Certainly the only two Democratic administrations the country has had since the Civil War stand out in the annals of history. In the two it is a fact I can't administer within that period, Cleveland averted a default of our currency, pulled us out of the civil service and made the most rapid industrialization of the earth respect us completely."

Speculative Pendulum Swings

Widely But Rallies Wipe Out Earlier Decreases

The rally, like yesterday's, came in the afternoon. Its basis was an overall situation in the market which needed to be clarified before it could be covering. The impetus was afforded by the half-cent increase in copper prices, the first advance in six months. A general advance in oil stocks was reflected after corrections showed a drop of about 4 per cent for the last week, and loadings of freight cars brought the tonnage record for the season.

The actual trade returns, reconciled to an unimproved immediate outlook, are talking of an upturn in January.

Fairly Unconvincing.

Shorts who had little faith in the rally, in view of the fact that scores of stocks had just registered new lows, and were still holding, were not so sure. An advance had started, found their immediate position uncomfortable for the market closed at the top. The upturn was not so strong, but the stocks, which have had such scant cheer in these many months of declining earnings and prospects, did not decline. Good news was quickly translated into substantial gains. Kennecott and American Smelting and Refining, both 10 cents ahead of the October increase, were the leaders.

Gold futures were 16 cents higher than in the Cuban negotiations, but price movements were somewhat irregular, with operators inclined to hold gains. The market was not so sure of the Cuban representatives in launching the stabilization plan. ROAD BUILDERS OF IDAHO DECLARE FOR STATE COMMISSION

Highway and Good Roads Districts' Delegates Go On Record For Share in Gasoline Tax Revenues

Idaho road builders, represented by 17 delegates at an annual meeting of the Idaho Association of Highway and Good Roads Districts, yesterday, went on record in favor of administration of Idaho state highways by a commission instead of state commissioners of public works.

Resolutions adopted by the meeting declared for alteration of state law to provide for a share of highway and good roads districts from payment of the five-cent gasoline tax; for division of gasoline tax revenues between state and local districts; for participation by the state in the purchase of road rights of way, and for payment of \$3 per day by the state to local districts commissioners.

The association voted to hold its next meeting at Coeur d'Alene in February.

Claud H. Durst, Nampa, was elected president to succeed J. H. Payette, Durley, N. M., Jensen, Payette, Durley, and Jerome, and W. H. D. Bowker, Nampa, was appointed secretary and treasurer.

Hack of Program

A legislative committee was named with instructions to attend the session of the state legislature to present statutory changes proposed by the association. Members of this committee are J. T. Pendleton, Twin Falls; W. J. McMillan, Hillside; A. E. Johnson, Rathdrum; A. L. Sloat, Inkom; Anton Diederichsen, Payette.

The association's executive committee includes W. E. Thompson, J. T. Windle, Twin Falls; W. J. Burkhardt, Bliss; E. R. Talboy, Payette; L. J. Montgomery, Athol; S. J. Kippen.

On roll-call on the proposition to abdicate a commission for the commissioner of public works, only the delegates from Nampa voted in the negative. Paul Falls delegate declined to vote without first conferring with other members of his board, who were not present.

One speaker referred to the proposed committee as an agent for "political purposes," but another argued that the commissioners could make savings sufficient to justify payment of salaries of two or four members of the proposed commission.

Although the resolution adopted did not suggest a date for the proposed convention, delegates during discussion of the proposition repeatedly referred to a "three-man commission."

Gas Tax Districts

Those not asking gasoline tax exemption for their districts, which districts were proposed to exemption to apply to gasoline used by the districts only in road construction and maintenance, voted in the negative. It was carried by a vote of 16 to 1.

Without a dissenting vote, the meeting adopted the resolution calling for a reduction of gasoline tax revenues between the state and the local districts.

Speaking in support of the proposal, Paul Falls delegate said that his district had paid two-thirds of the cost of all the state highways in that district, besides building and maintaining them.

Twin Falls county paid, and obligated itself to pay \$30,000 for construction of roads later taken over by the state highway department. Twin Falls highway districts' supervisor of highways, however, declined to meet the meeting.

He estimated gasoline tax payments in his district would be \$10,000, or \$30,000, of which nearly \$30,000 will be paid in Twin Falls highway district.

Delegates expressed their opinion that part of gasoline tax revenues should be made available to assist local districts in meeting obligations incurred for construction of state highways.

All delegates favored statutory provision for payment of mileage traveled by highway commissioners and districts who, under existing law, are compensated only for mileage traveled in attending meetings or on in-
