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CHICAGOANS SELECT ONE-ARMED SHERIFF

World War Veteran, William D. Moyerling Owns Distinguished Service Cross

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—A one-armed man, William D. Moyerling, is to assume the most difficult law-enforcement job in populous Chicago—sheriff of Cook county.

Moyerling, whose right arm was shot away during a German raid on the American trenches before Verdun in 1918, was elected November 4. He is a Democrat.

As sheriff Moyerling will control the "bridge," as the county is called, and its 1200 to 1500 inmates, many of them desperate and dangerous gunmen.

"Terrible Tommy" O'Connor, awaiting execution, escaped from the county jail and gave one sheriff several troublesome weeks. Terry Druggan and Frankie Lake, so-called "bar" bangers, had for many weeks legs in the "bridge," and a sheriff again was in trouble.

The ex-captain of doughboys, still-living, youthful-looking Moyerling, eight years on the board of aldermen. He was a persistent opponent of many projects advocated by Mayor Thompson.

Moyerling opposed the closing of William McKinley, superintendent of schools, in Thompson's anti-union campaign.

Moyerling commanded company E, Twenty-third infantry, second division in April, 1918, and was awarded a stump of an arm. Moyerling raised two companies to the first state machine gunners, and then failed.

General Pershing recommended him for the distinguished service cross and the French added the croix de guerre. Moyerling was the fourth distinguished service cross award and he was the first to be presented with it.

Pershing made him a captain for his heroism and called him to serve in headquarters.

GARDEN CITY, Kansas, Nov. 13 (AP)—Cattle soon will give five muskrats on a ranch near Garden City.

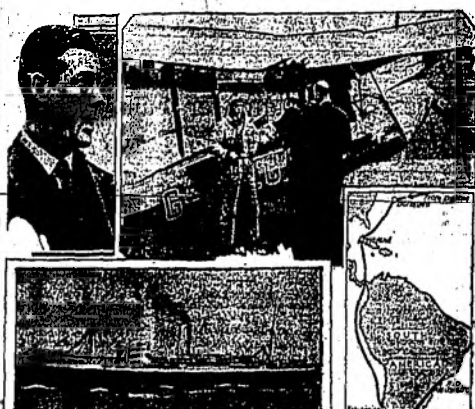

CUT IN FREIGHT RATES HELPS IDAHO FARMERS

BOISE, Nov. 13 (AP)—The public utilities commission estimated today 20,000 bushels of wheat remained in Idaho which would profit by decreased freight rates if they go into effect January 1 as scheduled. Of the 20,000 bushels, about 11,000,000 bushels were declared to be the hands of farmers and 10,000,000 in elevators.

The lower rates, representing a saving of about 6 cents a bushel, would mean \$1,400,000 saving to growers and dealers in the state, the commission pointed out.

The Weather

FORECAST FOR TODAY AND TOMORROW — Cloudy and cold; probably snow in southeastern portion of Idaho.

Minimum temperature in the vicinity of Twin Falls was 29 degrees in the 24-hour period preceding a P. M. yesterday, according to the reports of the government weather observer here. Maximum for the same period was 46 degrees. Two inches of snow, representing 11 of an inch of precipitation fell during the period. The snow, brought by the westerly wind, began falling at 4 P. M. and fell intermittently during the day.

ARBITRATION DECIDES SCHNEIDER RACE FATE

PARIS, Nov. 13 (AP)—The fate of the 1931 Schneider cup airplane race will be decided in November by an arbitration board meeting here. If satisfactory arrangements are made by the board, it is probable that at least Great Britain, France, and Italy will engage in the air speed contest scheduled for next fall.

MEASURE CLOUD HEIGHTS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Weighted balloons are used by the weather bureau airport observers to determine the height of overhanging clouds in the night. For each reading a small balloon is placed on a scale and inflated until its weight indicates a definite rate of ascension. It is then liberated and timed until it disappears in the clouds and the altitude calculated.

FENCES AND DITCHES MAKE FLYING SAFER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—Fence building and ditch digging form a good part of what the department of commerce will do to make aviation safer.

Completion of 90 intermediate landing fields by the government before the end of the fiscal year involves the construction of 120 miles of fences and 30 miles of ditches.

In addition there is the laying of 11 miles of pipe and 160 installation of 100 sets of field border markers, and the clearing of nearly 500 acres of timber.

The government will spend \$200,000 of its own money and \$100,000 from cooperating municipalities to bring the number of intermediate landing fields well above the 500 mark.

Babson Declares Short Selling Of Stock Not Objectionable But Cites Many Abuses of Practice

Bay State Statistician Says Brokers Should Not Be Permitted to Loan Securities Without Consent of Customers

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 13.—Owing to severe losses incurred from wide stock price declines, a public opinion has arisen for abolishing short selling. While I hold no brief for the abolition of short selling, I do not believe I do the over-enthusiastic high the fact remains that if we are to have a free market of any kind, short selling cannot be eliminated.

tion which will do neither the investor, the investment business nor the public any good. It is certainly to be hoped that stock exchange authorities will do this house-cleaning themselves because nothing would be more damaging to business and to security prices than for the stock market to become a political football kicked about first by one radical piece of legislation then by another.

While I have had enough experience already with arbitrary restrictions affecting the free play of supply and demand. In that free market, the law of supply and demand for stocks will determine their price just as it determines the price of other commodities. I always advise against short selling or margin buying because both involve borrowing. The borrower must pay the interest on the loan. The fact that the majority of speculators and many investors do operate on a margin basis if they insist on trading on margin they must accept the fact that market prices cannot be prevented from going too low in a period of depression, if they have gone too high in the preceding period.

One question in connection with short selling seems to me to require a serious answer and to require a new set of rules by the exchange itself. I see no reason why brokers should be allowed to loan their customer's stocks for short selling purposes without the written consent of the customer. If the customer is to be allowed to allow his stock to be loaned that is all right. He may in fact have a short line of stocks himself.

Abuses Should Be Curbed
While it is always dangerous to try to interfere arbitrarily with the free play of supply and demand, whether it be by commodity price-fixing or other restrictions, we should insist that traders play the game according to the rules. It is plain to all who are interested in the circulation of funds among men who circulate unwise ideas about the financial responsibility of companies, financial houses or individuals. That question has nothing to do with the economic justification of short selling. It is, however, one of the abuses which have recently occurred in connection with professional short selling.

Moreover, merely because short selling is dangerous is not an adequate reason to abolish it. Matches are dangerous in the hands of children, but matches properly handled serve a useful economic purpose. It is unquestionably true that the carrying operations of short sellers during a rapid market decline provide a measure of support and fill up many empty pockets in the market.

Stopping of short selling now is not in fact short selling known to the stock market. It is a technical operation not clearly understood by the average investor and, therefore, the average investor is not so temporarily suited to be

In a case of high blood pressure, the blood vessels the heart supplies have become reduced in size and the heart automatically increases its pressure in an effort to keep up a normal flow of blood.

Professor Wiggers referred to present research the world over to find out why the blood pressure does not usually lower blood pressure.

A lowered pressure, however, he said, diminishes the supply of blood to the heart, causing it to weaken and falter.

Contrary to current belief, the heart, if injured to a valve becomes leaky, compensates immediately for the leak. Professor Wiggers has found, on the very next beat, its pumping has more force.

Current belief is that the heart requires years to develop compensation for a leak, by enlarging. After watching the heart's behavior for years, Professor Wiggers believes a person suffering from high blood pressure should not worry too much about it.

in some instances fall. Hence, he said, it is fully as dangerous to diminish the pressure of the blood as to permit pressure to remain high.

A picture of the way the heart compensates is obtained by Professor Wiggers through use of an apparatus almost unique in this country.

It consists, roughly, of a manometer which can be inserted into the blood stream of an anesthetized

animal and a tube which may cause injury to a heart, valve.

Attached to the manometer is a mirror that reflects the motion of the heart wall onto a moving photographic film.

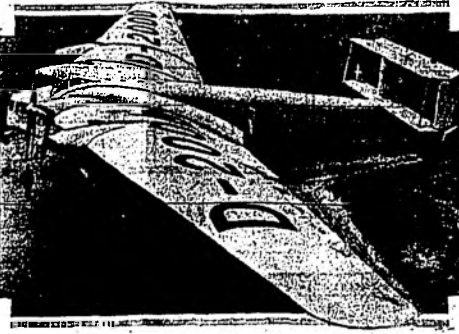

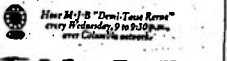

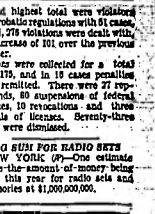

His latest checkup is through Dean Snyder, Los Angeles, whose fame as a boxer goes great and has spread beyond the confines of his home town. Snyder is this department's first choice for the presidency of the "Association of Publicity Men Who Know Alvin Karpis' Elmer's Business." If such association ever is formed.

Wade Denies Weight's Responsibility For Alabama Victories

Mentor Supports Contention With Cold Statistics

Regular Alabama Line Averages 193 Pounds and Backfield 176, and Only Two Men Weigh More Than 200

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Nov. 13.—The exceedingly rough waves of the Alabama Crimson tide this year generally are regarded as the creation of one of the hottest football lines in the South. But according to Coach Wallace Wade that's not true. Cold statistics back him up.

The impression of bulk in a Crimson line has rolled over Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Kentucky toward a Southern conference championship comes from the way the line hits. On the offense it's a sprightly pile driver that gains power through getting the line in charge.

Wade, pointing out his eighth year at Alabama, and set to take a coaching job next year at Duke university, knows personally what a line should do. He played guard for Brown university, 1914, '15 and '16, though rather an amateur.

The regular Alabama line averages 193 pounds and the backfield averages 176. The starting great bulk in the line—average, 215 pounds—occurs when it is realized that Fred Egan, left tackle, and Captain Charles Clements weigh 215 pounds each.

"A good line has been one of the outstanding things about Alabama teams," Wade remarked after the 14-0 victory over the Kentucky Wildcats.

A number of writers have caused the impression to get about that Alabama has a huge team. We have only two players who weigh more than 200 pounds. The average down around 170 to 180 and our backfield averages only 175.

Alabama's greatest team, those of 1924, '25 and '26, gained much of their greatness from this play. After the team's victory in the championship of boxes in Los Angeles in 1926, "Pop" Warner, Stanford coach, said "Alabama has the best line I ever saw."

Alabama favors no particular system. "Give me" Wade said, "a backfield that can mix reverse and punts, and a line that will take the game as they come."

The Alabama attack starts from the 25 or just forward back of an unbalanced line. Wade picks his men for ability to get under way. Of the regulars he has picked this year nine live in Alabama, one comes from Arkansas and one from Mississippi.

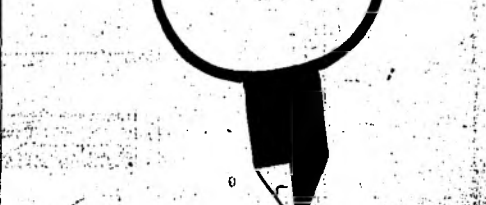

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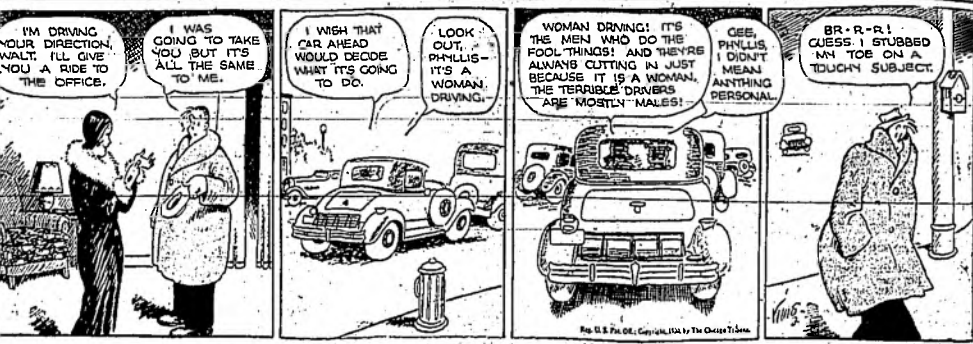
