News Flashes

Commission At Geneva Faces Stormy Session

GENEVA, Nov. 13 (AP)—Caught in a tangle of parliamentary procedure, the League of Nations' disarmament commission adjourned yesterday without reaching an agreement on how to limit land war material.

The confusion came from a profusion of proposals by various delegations, none of which was accepted, masked that the U.S. and British delegations threw their hands in the air and exclaimed to Chairman Loudon: "We have nothing else; and decided to vote out."

The session continues in the morning.

Imperial Conference Fails to Reach Goal

LONDON, Nov. 13 (AP)—The imperial conference, which—for a week has been trying to perfect arrangements for closer imperial trade and communications tomorrow without having reached a single major decision.

The prime ministers of the various dominions concluded in sessions late in the night in an effort to wind up the conference affairs.

Workers Hunt Bodies In French Town Ruins

LYON, France, Nov. 13 (AP)—This morning there was little work to do in the ruins of Le Vernet, the debris of 12 ruined homes, half fearing of what they would find beneath as they continued to search through the debris of 100 lives.

As night fell, they had recovered only three bodies in the ruins along the slope of the Fourviere hill where the ground from under a stone had burrowed into them and burying them in upon themselves, and burrowing men, women and children.

Mexicans Worry Over Drop In Metal Prices

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 13 (AP)—Mexican miners were worried today by a decline in the value of both gold and silver, and as a result plans were hastily made for a conference of miners and government officials with government officials.

LONDON, Friday Morning (AP)—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Peking said that bandits had raided Hainan, in eastern Kiangsi province, China, killing 2000 persons, kidnapping 5000, and carrying off \$100,000. Damage was estimated at \$400,000.

Tardieu Government Continues in Power

PARIS, Friday Morning (AP)—The chamber of deputies early this morning voted confidence in the government of Paul Tardieu, 323 against 310 votes.

The balloting followed upon discussion of the government's foreign policy, which was defended yesterday by Foreign Minister André Tardieu, who said it was in the nation's interest to far into the world by Premier André Tardieu.

PERUVIAN SOLDIERS RULE TOWN AFTER RIOT CLAIMS LIVES

Troopers With Fixed Bayo-
nets Guard Against Re-
petition of Disorders
Fatal to Two Americans

(By the Associated Press)
LIMA, Peru, Nov. 13.—Soldiers with fixed bayo-
nets tonight patrolled the muddy streets of Mapano, the Andean mining town where two Americans were killed and several others wounded in labor riots yesterday.

Troops were gathered in the streets of Lima as a protest against possible disorders from a general strike called by the workers of the mines, oil fields and a group of Communists, charged with responsibility for the disorders, were in the city.

Three hundred foreign refugees, landed in a fiery truck train, tramped into the city from Malpaso and intermediate towns toward the center of the city, where they were discovered, and told the first detailed story to come out of the mining area.

The engineer of the refugee train, Alfonso Diaz, a Minas, Brazil, and the driver, a native, were killed in the first fire, he had had in many hours.

CHICAGOANS SELECT ONE-ARMED SHERIFF

World War Veteran, William D. Moyering Owns Distinguished Service Cross

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—A one-armed man, William D. Moyering, is to assume next January one of the most important law-enforcement jobs in populous Chicago—sheriff of Cook county.

Moyering, whose right arm was shot away during a German raid on the American Legion home in Verdun in 1918, was elected November 4. He is a Democrat.

As sheriff Moyering will control the "Bridewell," the county jail, and its 1,000 inmates; and the 1200 to 1600 inmates of the state prison at Joliet, Ill., and a short distance from Chicago.

GARDEN CITY, Kansas, Nov. 13 (AP)—The muskrat is taking the place of livestock on a ranch near Garden City.



**CUT IN FREIGHT RATES
HELPS IDAHO FARMERS**

BORO, Nov. 13 (AP)—The public utilities commission today cut down 24,000 bushels of wheat shipped in Idaho which would profit by decreased freight rates if they go into effect, as scheduled.

Of the 24,000 bushels, about 11,000 bushels were declared to be in the hands of farmers and 12,000 in elevators.

The cut in rates represents a saving of about 6 cents a bushel, would mean \$14,400 saving to growers and dealers in the state, the commission pointed out.

Completion of 90 intermediate landing fields by the government before the end of the fiscal year involves the construction of 120 miles of fences and 30 miles of ditches.

Man-Made Temblors Topple Chimneys and Split Boards

STANFORD STUDIES EARTH VIBRATIONS WITH NEW DEVICE

Laboratory Quakes Furnish Information to Aid in Construction of Buildings

UNBALANCED FLY-WHEEL GIVES SHAKING EFFECT

Heavy Platform Reproduces Earth Movements and Provides Valuable Data

PALO ALTO, Cal., Nov. 13

Man-made earthquakes rumble and crash in the vibration laboratory of Lehigh Stanford university.

There they are nicknamed "civilized quakes," but they tear loose the nails and split boards of wooden panels nearly as big as a room.

The crack, rock and tumble flattened brick chimneys. They set great planks vibrating with the freedom of reeds and show the "hammer" effect of water on a dam.

They are part of a new kind of earthquake study. In a laboratory originated by Dr. Bailey Willis, famous seismologist, the work is conducted by Dr. Lydia Jacobson.

The earthquakes are produced by a "shaking table," a three-ton platform mounted on iron wheels on a car track and buffered at each end with huge steel springs.

Unbalanced Fly-Wheel


An unbalanced fly-wheel gives the effect of rhythmic shaking. In the first experiment, an iron pendulum striking a piano spring on the end of the platform gives the crashing, rending power of a different type of earthquake.

These laboratory quakes give engineers information on two phases of designing buildings at practical cost.

One is the action of two types of construction, rigid and flexible. The other is the action of soils of different properties.

Dr. Jacobson finds plaster does not crack as readily in a wall having diagonal shoring as it does in a better shock absorber for some types of building.
