### Commission in Geneva Makes Good Progress

GENEVA, Nov. 19.—The preparatory disarmament commission made good progress today, adopting a major part of the draft agreement for limiting the world's fleets.  
"Three articles approved today and are probably ready to be presented to the commission tomorrow," said the principal negotiator in the Washington and London treaties, who provides a general abolition of limitation of warships beyond an additional limitation by classes of ships, right of transfer of a portion of the tonnage from one class or category to another and limitation of armaments and gun armaments.  
Tomorrow the commission will take up aircraft carrying, with the "Washington treaty" limited to 10,000 tons, and details of aircraft limitation.

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## Storm Claims Lives Of 18 Persons in Oklahoma And Arkansas And Leaves Ruin

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 19.—Sweeping parts of Oklahoma, Arkansas and Kansas tornado winds whose violence centered at Bethany, Oklahoma, tonight had exacted a toll of 18 dead, injured scores, and had done great property damage.  
The greatest damage was reported at Bethany, seven miles west of Oklahoma City, where the 17 deaths were lost. At least 100 persons were injured and more than 200 buildings destroyed. A large portion of the business district at Ola, Arkansas, was wrecked. A city official there was killed.  
Four pupils were killed at the Canal Creek schoolhouse, three miles south of Bethany. Property damage at Bethany was believed to approximate \$750,000.

### CURRICULUM EXPERT DISCUSSES TEACHING

Dr. Thomas Hopkins, Columbia University Specialist, Meets Committee Here

That the academic intelligence formerly considered as the principal criterion in determining the capacity of a pupil or student to acquire an education, is now being viewed from several other, according to one of the ideas stressed last evening at a meeting of the curriculum committee for the Southern Central Idaho district, by Dr. Thomas Hopkins, New York, curriculum specialist of Columbia University. The meeting was held in the office of the superintendent of Twin Falls schools. The five factors considered by the principal being: (1) the social, economic, effort, health, achievement, taste, fourth and academic intelligence last but, the value of education, outside of formal subjects, his considered of less importance than formerly thought to be the case. Social background, he stated, had an important effect on determining the quality of education. He doubted the wisdom of a large number of courses in small high schools, but Hopkins thought it was more fact rather than a specific instruction in them by the teacher. He stressed the importance of the young people learn in connection with the curriculum. He stated that the teacher should be one who has no hurry to have pupils begin to read those who started late, as soon as they began to read.
