Governor Baldridge's Defense Council Committee Urges Spending of \$20,000,000 to Aid Labor

ANDRE TARDIEU'S SECOND MINISTRY CONCLUDES WORK

Grave "Elder Statesman" of Third Republic Goes Down Smiling and Fighting to End and Cabinet Resigns

(By The Associated Press)

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Premier Andre Tardieu's second ministry was placed in a minority of eight votes by the senate today. The premier, President Doumergue at the Elysee palace tonight and resigned the resignation of the entire cabinet.







Experts Plan Aqueduct from Colorado River to Coast City

350-Mile Pipeline Looms as Largest Of Kind In World

Thaddeus Merriman, Chairman of Board, Reports On Magnitude of Project

COLEMAN (Associated Press Science Writer) NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The new 250-mile aqueduct from the Colorado river to southern California is called the greatest water supply undertaking in history. Thaddeus Merriman, chairman of the engineering board that will pick its route, classifies the project as such, since six or eight years will be required for construction. Miles of electric lines, highways, railroads and steel water pipe will have to be built to bring supplies and power to the scene of construction.

Water from the milling mills of Colorado and Wyoming, impounded by the Hoover dam, will be brought to Los Angeles and 10 other southern California cities by the aqueduct. The magnitude of the project was described here by Merriman, chief engineer of the New York water system.

The aqueduct will be a huge concrete tube, so large that a direct handgrip can be driven through it with plenty of room on top for the head. It will have a capacity of 1,000 cubic feet of water a second. The water actually will be brought to steel over high points where the aqueduct crosses mountain ranges. Water falling through the tube down one side of a ridge will be used to generate electricity that will help drive pumps raising water on the other side. In desert lands of eastern California workers building the aqueduct will face a water shortage, although millions of gallons later will

(By The Associated Press.) MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 6.—Flurries of the first snow, it is signaled for another harvest—the felling and packing of Christmas trees to have as the symbol of Yuletide in a million homes.

Woodmen of northern Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan have sharpened their axes, and by train, truck and lake steamers trees are beginning their trips to fireplaces in dozens of states.

From the pine and spruce belt that hugs the Canadian border will come trees with the aroma of deep woods to be trimmed and decorated for holiday festivities.

Whereas this harvest once was derided by conservationists, scientific cutting employed today is regarded as a boon to forestry.

Young trees now are cut at intervals out of thick stands of new growth and their removal makes possible entrance of sunlight into the mass of husky youngsters which have been needed before.

From northern Minnesota alone, where the harvest has become a seasonal major industry, more than 1,500,000 will be cut this year.

and from Michigan gather thousands of trees will go that way.

Trains also will carry hundreds of cars filled with trees to distant points from the big woods.

Clearing trees will be cut which will stand in streets to serve as centers of municipal celebrations. And thousands of yards of branches from these trees tops which once went to waste will be strung to serve as decorations for streets, lights, stores and homes.

A carefully conceived and well laid-out plan is the only way to insure success for the future investment.

If business and the stock market progress in a straight line, then all one would need to do is to buy a diversified list of common stocks and bonds, put them away, and forget them. Unfortunately business and finance do not move in a straight line. Instead of the smooth curve of a straight line, the actual movement of the market is a jagged line. Therefore, the investor must have a definite plan.

A certain times should be bought at other times stocks are the best purchase. At other times short-term notes, bank deposits and cash should be held. But at all times one must be ready to work for him to the fullest extent consistent with the safety of principal.

MONTREAL, Quebec, Dec. 4.—The National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues today selected West Baden, Indiana, for the 1931 convention, extended the association agreement for one year, deferred consideration of the proposed amendments to the major league.

It took a constitutional amendment to allow the selection of West Baden, but at the request of the association the convention will be held in a city in which there is a member baseball club, but still clause was voted out of the constitution in order to permit the meeting to be held in the Indiana health resort, Springfield, Massachusetts, in a special bid for the meeting.

Originally it had been expected the national association agreement under which the association extends its authority would be renewed for 10 years, but at the request of the association, International and Pacific Coast leagues, it was extended for one year only.

The convention met at 11 A. M. and adjourned until 1 P. M. out of respect to William F. Baker, president of the Philadelphia Nationals, who died of a heart attack here early in the day.

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




