AVIATRIX SWIMS TO LAND AFTER WISHPAP

Winifred Spooner, English Heroine, Becomes Mermaid When Plane Falls

BELMONT, Italy, Dec. 4 (AP)—Winifred Spooner's airplane came down in the dark on the Tyrrhenian sea two miles from shore some time after dawn today. She peered over her heavy flying goggles into the water, swam two miles to shore and woke up some people in a boat.

She asked them to get somebody out to the plane where Captain E. C. E. had been waiting to be rescued, then she sat down to catch her breath.

This 22-year-old girl is known as England's racing aviatrix. She and Edwards started out from Capri yesterday for Capri, but she was rescued by a couple of fishermen, and together the two ways came over here to report the night in the mayor's house.

When it became known that Miss Spooner had swum two miles in the dark, still wearing her heavy goggles and a wadded shirt, almost everybody in Belmont came over to the mayor's place to see this young English heroine.

Technique Of Radio Transmission Appears Younger Men's Business

CHICAGO, Dec. 4 (AP)—The technique of radio broadcasting is a young man's business.

At the National Broadcasting company's new studios here, directing the operation of apparatus which ranks among the largest and most complicated in the country, three of the chief technicians are under 30. They are: Howard Luitgens, 28, division engineer; J. R. Miller, 24, control room supervisor; and W. R. Rife, 23, field supervisor. O. B. Hanson, manager of the plant, operation and engineering departments at New York, is only 32.

Complicated Systems
In the control room which will be a big matter, control desk. It plays the same part in broadcasting as the switching tower does in a railroad. Through it programs are directed to local stations, to the net and the networks and the supplementary air.

Experts Plan Aqueduct from Colorado River to Coast City

350-Mile Pipeline Looms as Largest Of Kind In World

Thaddeus Merriman, Chairman of Board, Reports On Magnitude of Project

COLEMAN (Associated Press Science Writer) NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The new 250-mile aqueduct from the Colorado river to southern California is called the greatest water supply undertaking in history. Thaddeus Merriman, chairman of the engineering board that will pick its route, classifies the project as such, since six or eight years will be required for construction. Miles of electric lines, highways, railroads and steel water pipe will have to be built to bring supplies and power to the scene of construction.

Water from the milling mills of Colorado and Wyoming, impounded by the Hoover dam, will be brought to Los Angeles and 10 other southern California cities by the aqueduct. The magnitude of the project was described here by Merriman, chief engineer of the New York water system. The aqueduct will be a huge concrete tube, so large that a direct handgrip could be driven through it with plenty of room on top for the head. It will have a capacity of 1,000 cubic feet of water a second. The water actually will be brought to steel over high points where the aqueduct crosses mountain ranges. Water falling through the tube down one side of a ridge will help to generate electricity that will help drive pumps raising water on the other side. In desert lands of eastern California workers building the aqueduct will face a water shortage that through millions of gallons later will

From northern Minnesota alone, where the harvest has become a seasonal major industry, more than 1,500,000 trees will be cut.

Throughout November and the first part of December cutting goes on, with most of the trees being cut to go to holiday duty in the Mid-West. But late seasons will take many east.

Those investors who have come through the last year of a "bull" market in a strong position are those who have worked on a definite plan. No one would start to build a stock position without first obtaining complete working plans. Baseball Officers Plan for Session In Indiana 1931

National Association of Professional Ball Leagues Decides to Meet in West Baden Next Year

By HERBERT W. BARBER (Associated Press Sports Writer)

MONTREAL, Quebec, Dec. 4.—The National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues today selected West Baden, Indiana, for the 1931 convention, extended the association agreement for one year, deferred consideration of the proposed amendments to the major league.

It took a constitutional amendment to allow the selection of West Baden, but at the request of the association the convention will be held in a city in which there is a member baseball club, but still clause was voted out of the constitution in order to permit the meeting to be held in the Indiana health resort, Springfield, Massachusetts, in a special bid for the meeting.

Originally it had been expected the national association agreement under which the association extends its authority would be renewed for 10 years, but at the request of the association, International and Pacific-coast leagues, it was extended for one year only.

The convention met at 11 A. M. and adjourned until 1 P. M. out of respect to William F. Baker, president of the Philadelphia Nationals, who died of a heart attack here early in the day.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—There is no argument between Howard Harkness and Knute Rockne to stir up the warring clans of the gridiron. Both are advocates and teachers of football's much debated shift, with the accent on speed, deception and speed.

The idea has been in the councils of the game.

Nevertheless, the football battle of the year, if not of the much overworked century will find their pupils representing Southern California and Notre Dame arrayed against each other in flashing action in the Los Angeles Coliseum, December 6.

It is the climax game of the season for the standard contest of the year between two of the best offensive gridiron machines yet developed.

The game and its figures may suffer from a lack of interest during the intervening few days but they seem in advance certain to bring forth the national football championship of 1930.

Power of Officials
