

OAKLEY CLUB MEN WANT SCENIC ROAD IN CITY OF ROCKS

Proposal Calls For Highway
From Old Oregon Trail to
Strevel Through Strange
Area of Stone Figures

A City of Rocks highway leading from the town of Creek to the City of Oakley and the City of Rocks at United States Highway No. 91 south of Street, is the subject of a proposal for the construction of a scenic highway (December 6) by the Oakley Valley Commercial Club. The project would open to traffic in 1952. It would pass through the scenic area of strange stone figures and shorten the distance between southeastern Idaho and Utah.

Charles Brown is chairman of the City of Rocks highway committee. J. A. Mercer, president of the club, and Mrs. Raymond Richardson, secretary, are the other members of the committee.

Lester Green, situated on hill two miles above the rock city, was an old-time rendezvous of Redskins who from this place of vantage kept watch over the trail. The Indians had bands of rangers. That the marauders were sometimes successful in their depredations is evident from the many dates to be found on the rocks—truly a remarkable record.

At least as early as 1871 there were legends of treasure buried in City of Rocks. Men have been seen digging for treasure there in the last 25 years.

There is now a semi-improved road along the proposed route and this road reduces the distance from Creek to Strevell to 10 miles. Prismatic Glass In Skyscrapers Throws Light Into Rooms

CERTAIN TYPES OF WINDOW PANES AID IN DIFFUSING RAYS

Distribution of Daylight Illumination Depends On Qualities of Diffusion

MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY CONDUCTS EXPERIMENT

Professor H. H. Higbie, Electrical Engineer, Aids in Study of Light Improvement

(By The Associated Press) ANN ARBOR, Mich., Dec. 6.—New styles in the use of glass in windows that restore some of the daylight lost in city canyons have been developed at the University of Michigan.

They have a lighting effect to bring the "skyline" down below tops of buildings which shut off the sky view.

Such effects may be produced with certain varieties of glass if they are applied properly, according to H. H. Higbie, of the department of electrical engineering, who has been studying how to restore light.

"The distribution of daylight illumination in a room," he says, "is likely to be better when even plain glass is used than when no glass is used, but the improvement is much greater with some kinds of figured or prismatic glass."

Hayes Head

The reason is that rays of light passing through such glass are bent back by the edges of more of them reaching the back of the room.

"Some kinds of glass," Professor Higbie says, "mounted in a particular way, will reflect light and create the minimum illumination to a value distinctly higher than it would without any glass, perhaps as much as 20 per cent."

"Ordinary window glass" illumination means better lighting of the darker parts of the room. In fact, the glass transmits more light near the window than far from it, where there is more need of it, to the rear of the room, it is needed.

"It appears that the combination of prismatic glass in the upper half of the window with clear glass in the lower half can be practical as good results.

"Glasses which deflect, scatter or diffuse appreciably the light rays that pass through them are useful, as in a window facing wall or other obstruction, and which thereby improve the distribution of illumination," he says. "The effect of pulling down the skyline in a location not so far below the top of the building is to increase the amount of light reflected from the ground."


In experiments it was found that dirt on windows cut off at least 20 to 25 per cent of the light, perhaps because the dirt reflects the light. Windows were cleaned once in four months.






